Minutes of the 15th Annual General Assembly Meeting 7th October 2017, Ras Al Khaimah, UAE.

ATTENDING: ANNEXTURE I

ITEM 1: RECITATION OF FEW VERSES FROM THE HOLY OURAN

The Meeting was called to order by WMO Deputy President, Mr Nowsad Gani at 10.30AM and followed by recital of a Quirath by Sir Igbal Sacranie

ITEM 2: WELCOME ADDRESS BY THE PRESIDENT

President Mr Suliman Noor Mahomed (Solly Noor) commenced his speech by thanking everyone for their presence including the Office Bearers, Trustees and all the other members and staff of WMO and specially thanked Mr Haroon Karim, Mr Ismail Gadit, Mr Ahmed Shaikhani, Mr Mahmood Shaikhani, Mr Shabbir Merchant and the Middle East RMC for hosting the AGAM.

He stated that WMO is the only Global Organisation for Memons and that the Memon community is one of the smallest communities with a population of 2 to 3 million in the entire world, but we are affluent and we are influential and we have the power to be an Organisation that can leverage. But 60% of the Memon Community is earning less than \$1/day and WMO can and must make the difference. WMO is now a seamless Organisation and anyone who is elected as an Office Bearer, the platform is laid and they can continue with their work and take WMO to another level.

In recognising the chapter for the progress WMO has made over past 3 years, he commended the chapters for their effort and good work, with a special note on the following;

- Africa Chapter Has to progress and expand to regions like Malawi and Zimbabwe, Tanzania and other African countries where there is a substantial Memon population.
- Europe Chapter Have to spread their wings by going to Portugal, Scotland and other European countries.
- Far East Congratulated the performance of the Chapter despite the small number of Memons and being there in the time of need to help the community and mankind.
- Middle East Thanked the members of Middle East Chapter RMC for bearing the entire cost of hosting the AGAM.
- Pakistan We are blessed to have the team in Pakistan who delivered what was required and being 100% compliant in all aspects. He

- requested Pakistan Chapter to do more on collecting the funds and not rely on the centre for funding.
- North India Not much progress for the past 3 years and expects a major change with the new team appointed.
- South India with the help of Ashraf Bha and Farook Bha Darvesh, we were able to form the new chapter and they will be donors and not recipients.
- North America Remains a major challenged with a vastly scattered community. With the new RMC we will do a roadshow and expand to Canada, Insha Allah.

All the Chapters were advised that the Office Bearers of the Chapter must work tirelessly to make a difference in their relevant Chapters.

Further he mentioned that while WMO will continue to do Zakat distribution, we need a paradigm shift on how to move forward in other fields that touch lives. The B2B session was a game changer with the young blood who showcased how affluent they are in our community, and thanked Solly Suleman Bha, Yunus Bha and Dania Hanif for organising such a great event. Further he added that now its time to recognise the Memons for their achievements and contributions by celebrating their success. The ExCo has decided to host the Memon Awards at the next AGAM in order to recognise the achievers in our community in the fields of Business, Profession, Sports, Philanthropy and Social Service.

The President voiced his concerns about the poorest of poor Memons who are not even getting the basic healthcare facilities and suggested to have a health insurance scheme to address this issue.

He stated the importance of having projects where we can leave a legacy for the generations to see, such as Hospitals, University, School or a Frail Care Centre. We have received our first \$1 million commitment from a anonymous donor last night for this initiative.

WMO is now self-sustained. We are planning to appoint a CEO to overlook the foundation globally, and to steer its growth to the next level. He reiterated the need for appointing Regional General Managers at the Chapters, before the end of the year, and this will make the Chapters efficient and effective.

Deputy President, Mr Nowsad Gani welcomed the first member from Mauritius Mr Shehzad Ahmed

who is attending the 15th AGAM, and thanked him for the generosity of offering to host the next AGAM in Mauritius

ITEM 3: TO RECEIVE AND APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE 14^{TH} AGAM

The minutes being circulated with the WMO Annual Report was considered read and there being no amendments, it was proposed by Mr Pir Mohamed Kaliya and seconded by Mr Yoosuf Gadit.

ITEM 4: TO RECEIVE AND APPROVE THE REPORT OF WMO FOR 2016, PRESENTED BY THE SECRETARY GENERAL MR SHOAIB ISMAIL MANGRORIA

The report circulated was considered read and there being no comments was proposed by Mr Farooq Ahmed and seconded by Mr Farook Kassim.

ITEM 5: TO RECEIVE AND APPROVE THE AUDITED ACCOUNTS OF WMO FOR FINANCIAL YEAR ENDING 31^{5T} DECEMBER 2016 PRESENTED BY TREASURER MR YUNUS SULEMAN

Presenting the financial the Treasurer explained there are 2 sets of Accounts circulated with the Annual Report.

- Consolidated Accounts This consist of, WMO Europe, WMO Middle East, WMO Pakistan, Audited Accounts which are consolidated with WMO Charitable Foundation the registered Charity and Parent entity.
- Complied Accounts Amalgamation of the above consolidated Accounts and WMO Africa and WMO Far East Audited Accounts, India, America & Canada Chapters. Those chapters cannot be consolidated since these are separate legal entities due to prevailing local laws.

Treasurer highlighted that for the first time we have split the Trustee funds from the General funds of the Chapters and presented as restricted funds in the Financials.

To a question from Mr Farooq Ahmed, why there is \$1.4mn funds lying in the current accounts, the Treasurer responded that the most of it was yearend Zakat collection which was disbursed during February and March this year, and some part of it was matured investments which was in turn invested in January 2017.

Answering a question from the floor, whether there is a Zakat calendar for WMO, the President responded stating, we have a policy that whatever is collected within the year is to be distributed before the end of the year. Also most of the Zakat is collected during the month of Ramadan and we ensure that this is distributed before the next Ramadan. The Zakat committee chairman mentioned, that sometimes the disbursements for Education is done during January in the following year in which case the Zakat would be in reserve for this purpose.

Responding to a question from the floor, about the rental income and where it is being distributed or utilised, Treasurer explained that the Rental Income of AED 1 million is received from the Property investment in Dubai, and this is being utilised for the operating expenses of the central body, and other overheads incurred for different projects in different parts of the world.

The Consolidated Accounts were proposed by Mr Pir Muhammed Kaliya and seconded by Mr Ghaffar Variend. The Complied Accounts were proposed by Mr A K Ismail and seconded by Mr Pir Muhammed Kaliya.

The President commended the effort of the Treasurer and his team for presenting the Consolidated Audited Accounts for the first time in the 15 year history of WMO

ITEM 7: APPOINTMENT OF AUDITORS

The present auditors have consented to continue as the Auditors for 2017 and the ExCo was given the authority to decide the fees and to get the confirmation of the Auditors, this was proposed by Mr Arif Lakhani and seconded by Mr Ilyas Mohamed.

ITEM 8: WMO BUDGET FOR 2017

The Treasurer explained the Central body budget to the general assembly, item by item for better understanding. The income derived from the Dubai properties is spent towards the Salaries of the COO/CFO, Marketing and Legal expenses incurred for the charitable foundation. The Regional General Manger salaries of Africa, Europe and Pakistan Chapter are projected for the current year. He explained that we have also provided for the salary of the proposed CEO to be recruited in 2018.

The Budget for 2017 was thereafter proposed by Mr Farook Kassim seconded by Mr Pir Muhammed Kaliya There was question from the floor inquiring whether there is a budget for the Youth Wing, the Deputy President responded stating that this would be discussed in the next item which is related to youth. Also there was a suggestion from a member to consider the change of Financial Year end to 30th June because we are now approving previous year accounts and current year budgets after 10 months have passed in the current year. Mr Bashir Sattar responded that we take note of this suggestion for the future and informed that actually as per the

constitution we have to hold the AGAM within six months of the Financial Year end.

ITEM 9: APPROVE THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION, FOR WHICH DUE NOTICE HAS BEEN GIVEN UNDER ARTICLE 46 OF THE CONSTITUTION

The Secretary General read out the following changes to the constitution referring to the pages 51 to 53 in the Annual Report

- to re-form the current single India Regional Chapter into two Regional Chapters - the Northern India Chapter and the Southern India Chapter;
- to promote greater involvement of young Memons in their community; and
- 3. to amend Article 46.5 with Article 24.5.5 and 35.1.3 in order to harmonise these Articles.
- a review of the WMO Standing Orders and Rules for Regional Chapters which will need to be amended to take into account the above developments.

The General Assembly unanimously agreed and accepted the amendments to the constitution, and it was proposed by Mr. Hussain Lawai and seconded by Mr. Farook Kassim.

ITEM 6: TO RECEIVE THE REPORT OF THE ELECTIONS 2017, PRESENTED BY THE ELECTION COMMISSIONER SIR IQBAL SACRANIE

The Vice President, Mr Nowsad Gani thanked Sir Iqbal Sacranie for his contribution as the Global Election Commissioner and requested him to present the report of the Regional Management Committee Elections 2017 - 2020.

The Election Commissioner read out his report and thereafter announced the members who were elected as the Regional Office Bearers in the respective RMCs.

Secretary General's Report for the Year 2017

Respected President of WMO Mr Solly Noor, Chairman of WMOCF Mr Haroon Karim, the Office Bearers of WMO & WMOCF, the Members of the Board of Trustees, the Members of the Management Committee, the Office Bearers of the Regional Chapters, Members of the Regional Management Committees and all members of WMO. Assalamu Alaikum Warahmathullahi Wabarakathuhu.

It gives me great pleasure to present before you the Report of the Secretary General of WMO for the year ended 31st December 2017.

The year 2017 has been a year of remarkable reforms and development at WMO. Very important improvements have been made in the overall structure and management of WMO by amending the Governing Documents of WMO. As you are aware, WMO always lays great emphasis on keeping itself upto-date with the changing times. For this purpose, the WMO reviews its management structure, governing documents and Policies & Procedures from time to time and tries to make required changes where and when necessary.

The first major improvement that WMO has made is regarding the Youth, who can now become a part of the management structure. Although, the youth have always been encouraged by WMO and every Chapter has its own Youth Wing where numerous social and welfare activities are held regularly, this is the first time ever that the youth are part and parcel of the management system.

Any Memon (male or female) from age 18-40 can become a member of the Global Youth Wing, and that too, free of cost. The structure of the GYW consists of Global Youth Wing Chairman, Global Youth Wing Secretary and Global Youth Wing Vice Chairpersons from each chapter along with Global Youth Wing Executives. Founder Trustee Mr Bashir Sattar was appointed as the first Global Youth Wing Chairman at the 3rd Management Committee Meeting.

This amendment was necessary because, as in every Memon Welfare Organization, there is a general trend that only senior and elder people become the Office Bearers and Members of the organization. This soon creates a void when the youth cannot fill in the gaps created by retirement, resignation or death of the member. The younger generation also faces factors of inexperience and dilemma of being treated as a junior by other senior members. But when the youth are part of the system from an early age, they benefit from the experience gathered, the know-how from their elders and also gain a thorough understanding of how Memon Charities work.

Another major development in the year 2017 was the launch of the WMO South India Chapter – WMO-SIC. As you are aware that India is a very big country with Memons scattered all over. The former WMO India Chapter (now it is called the WMO North India Chapter – WMO-NIC) was finding it very difficult to cover such a large territory, both in terms of management and distribution of funds. This led to the launch of the South India Chapter which covers the southern states of India mainly Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Andhra Pradesh and Karnataka.

Similarly, Africa Chapter is being divided into two at the equator. The countries north of the equator in the African continent will come under Northern Africa Chapter and those countries in the south of the equator will come under the Southern Africa Chapter.

The need of the hour is unity. I do recall that in the 1st International Memon Convention held in Dubai in the year 2001, our founder members and elders laid special emphasis on Unity. I recall that Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (ARY) and Mr. Aboo Tayyob of

South Africa requested the Memons to forget their differences and join hands to work together. In these modern times, in this age of science and technology, pooling of resources and working together is the key to success.

I take this opportunity to request all Memons, all Jamats, all corporate bodies and Memon businesses to consider social welfare as everyone's social responsibility and join hands to work together. This is our only solution.

Moving on to the performance of the Chapters, I wish to state that the performance of all the Chapters has been very satisfactory. However one area of concern has been the implementation of WMO Policies and Procedures which have not been very consistent across Chapters, and hope we will see greater emphasis by the Regional Office Bearers to improve on this aspect.

Although, the respective Chapter Reports are presented in the Annual Report, I wish to highlight the main points.

Africa Chapter

As the saying goes, "Africa always brings something new". The WMO Africa Chapter has some very unique welfare and socio-cultural projects. The other thing with the Africa Chapter is that it works together with other like-minded organizations to achieve common goals.

For example, the Africa Chapter partnered with "Purposeful Giving" during Ramadan 2017 to distribute Iftar packs, grocery packets, gift hampers, etc. to people in various cities. They joined hands with Jamat-un-nissa to host a 5-star dinner in Durban where 175 orphans attended. They also distributed 10 tons of dates (khajoor) inside and around South Africa and arranged Iftar and Eid Gift Hampers. By working together with other like-minded organizations, they were able to reach out to more and more people in orphanages, masajid, madrasas, home for the elderly and other needy families. The Chapter also regularly distributes Wheelchairs to the handicapped and the elderly, working in conjunction with other organizations. Twenty Braille Machines worth Rand 250,000 were also distributed to visually impaired students.

The Ladies Wing of the Africa Chapter raised Rand 100,000 for the Syrian Refugees with the support of Jamat-un-nissa and also supported skill development and women empowerment programs. The ladies also regularly distribute food, blankets and gifts in cash and kind to students, orphans, the elderly and the needy.

The highlight of the youth activities of WMO Africa Chapter was the two-day long Debate Championship with Oliver Dickson, the renowned African debater and debate coach as the Chief Adjudicator.

The Chapter has contributed towards the Rohingya Muslims Relief Work and to hospitals, skill development centers and other organizations. It also supported micro businesses run by women, distributed computers and sewing machines.

Europe Chapter

The Europe Chapter has its unique welfare activities. It provides legal aid on family disputes, housing matters, welfare benefits and immigration matters. They also support needy Memons with hospital expenses and funeral expenses.

The Youth Wing with the Memon Association of UK has taken a key role in assisting with organizing social events. They regularly hold many sports activities such as cricket, volleyball, basketball and badminton in London and Leicester.

The Ladies Wing have collected £6,000 and £11,000 and sent it to India and Malawi respectively for projects related to Women Empowerment; providing jobs; supporting widows, orphanages, the destitute and sick; for distribution of food packs and rations to hospital patients, widows, the needy and the Rohingya Muslims. They have even supported the digging of two water wells in Maharashtra, Alhamdulillah. They also operate the Memon Connection, a matchmaking service. The WMO Europe Ladies Wing was once again awarded the BATCA Award by the Mayor of Wandsworth. Masha Allah.

The Far East Chapter

Micro Finance bears great importance for the uplift of small scale entrepreneurs. The WMO has been running Micro Finance Schemes at various Chapters for a very long time.

The Far East Chapter is also running a Micro Finance Scheme since 2013. Under this scheme, small-scale entrepreneurs are given interest-free loans to further their businesses. About 80 such small-scale business people are being helped by the Far East Chapter. The wonderful thing is that, as soon as the loan is paid back in full, the applicant is again eligible to take another loan. Usually, the amount of the second loan is larger than that of the first time.

Another remarkable achievement of the Far East Chapter has been the Project Aman, for the Rohingya Muslims. Camp Aman is located along the Bangladesh-Myanmar border where over 1200 refugees have been registered so that they can be regularly provided with food, medicines and other necessities. A Masjid, a school and hygienic sanitary facilities have been planned besides other public facilities.

The Gift of Sight Project is another feather in the cap for the Far East Chapter. Healthy corneas will be donated Globally. The Chapter has already partnered with WMO PC and Hashmanis Hospital in Pakistan to enable free transplants.

The Far East Chapter has identified a 100-year old school Darussalam Maha Vidyalaya (DMV) which has over 1200 underprivileged students. The Chapter is helping the students in a variety of ways, including providing daily meals. Providing with meals serves many purposes, this is a proven and very successful methodology. First, the students can have a nutritious meal every day which will eradicate problems of malnutrition which is common in poverty stricken areas. Second, the parents are more than happy to send their children to school, knowing that they are in safe hands and will be treated well and also be fed properly. Third, this kind of encouraging atmosphere

keeps the children away from bad company and bad

The Chapter played a role in the dengue crisis in certain regions of Sri Lanka and distributed rations and other aid to the affected families.

The Ladies Wing and the Youth Wing of the Chapter are doing excellent work. The ladies have organized Women Empowerment and Women Health Programs and also provide assistance for education and other projects. Masha Allah.

India Chapter

As mentioned earlier, the India Chapter has now been divided into two separate Chapters namely the WMO North India Chapter and the WMO South India Chapter. Alhamdulillah, it is very pleasing to note that both the Chapters are doing so well. I wish both the Chapters and their very capable teams the very best. With the split, Interim Committees for the Management of both the Chapters was appointed at the 1st Management Committee Meeting held on 07th October 2017.

North India Chapter

In the short time the Committee was appointed it was able to carry out many activities reflecting the energy and enthusiasm of the new team and this is a very good sign for future of WMO in India.

Ground breaking ceremony for Memon Housing Colony in Akola was the major achievement in a short period of 2 months. This colony once completed in November 2018 will house 24 less fortunate families of the community.

In addition, the chapter started a Micro Finance Scheme, Matrimonial assistance and support for Children of Special Needs under project 'Farishtey'

As usual the Ladies Wing under the dynamic leadership of sisters Razia Chasmawala and Shabana Darvesh carried out their usual projects of Women Empowerment, Memon Connections and Medical assistance etc.

South India Chapter

In a short period of two months the Chapter has enrolled 75 members across four cities in South India, namely Bangalore, Chennai, Madurai and Coimbatore. This rapid spread cross South India is an ample demonstration of the right decision to split India into two Chapters. The Chapter has also activated the Ladies Wing and carried out two welfare projects in this short period.

Middle East Chapter

As I said earlier, every chapter is developing its unique identity and has its own set of unique welfare activities.

Masha Allah, the WMO Middle East Chapter, besides the usual financial assistance to needy students and those in need for housing, is also helping immigrants with their visa disputes and deporting issues, and helps in their release from prisons and by providing them with return air-tickets. This type of charity work is unique only to the Middle East Chapter.

Other activities include the special lftar program during the whole month of Ramadan where 75,000 immigrant workers were provided with meals. Masha Allah, this is the fourth consecutive year of the lftar program. The Chapter also sent 1000 bags of ration to Pakistan Chapter for distribution.

The Chapter also has very active youth wing and ladies wing, which conduct regular gatherings and events, which is bringing all ages of the Memon community together. One highlight of the Ladies Wing is that

they organized a Thanks-giving lunch to recognize and appreciate the contribution of each volunteer of the Ladies Wing. Here, appreciation certificates and small gifts were given to each member of the Ladies Wing. Masha Allah, the Ladies are working hand in hand with the men and contributing to every project whether it is financial assistance related to payment of school expenses, housing expenses and release of prisoners. Jazakallah Khairan.

America & Canada Chapter

America and Canada Chapter, is a very capable team headed by Mr Abdul Ghaffar Variend and Mr Bashir Akuly. I wish to point out that it is no easy task to coordinate with the widely scattered Memon population, which is spread out both in the USA and in Canada.

The WMO North America chapter is working hard to foster better relationships with other Memon Jamats and communities. An aggressive Membership Drive was launched in 2017, wherein members visited various cities and states such as Orlando, Los Angeles, Miami, Ft. Lauderdale, Dallas, Houston, New York, etc.

Many other activities are in the pipeline. It may be noted that WMO North America chapter has started functioning only a few years back. We wish the chapter the very best.

Pakistan

The Pakistan chapter, during the year 2017, not only remained active in welfare activities like housing, education for all, higher education, micro finance, etc. but also introduced a program for cornea transplantation with the support of the Far East Chapter and Hashmani Hospital, Karachi. About 200 corneas will be supplied from Sri Lanka by the Far East Chapter at its cost, while the Pakistan Chapter will bear the cost of the transplantation.

Under the Education for All Scheme, around 9,000 students are provided with financial assistance for school education ranging from Montessori to Higher Secondary classes. Under the Higher Education Scheme, about 500 college going students are provided with financial assistance to pursue higher education.

Under the Rehabilitation Scheme, the Chapter has provided financial assistance to procure house or flats to over 1000 families. The scheme also supports about 70 families with monthly house rent.

The Micro Finance Scheme of the Pakistan Chapter is the oldest of all micro finance schemes launched by WMO at various chapters. The scheme helps micro entrepreneurs with small loans to further their business. On successful completion of repayment, the applicants are eligible to take bigger loans.

Under the Rozgar Scheme, auto rickshaws have been provided to men and sewing machines have been provided to women to enable them to earn a decent livelihood.

The jewel in the crown is the Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI). Thousands of men, women and young people who were not fortunate enough to complete their formal education now have the opportunity to learn some technical skills so that they can earn better and improve their living conditions. Hundreds of students of MITI are well placed now. Some of them have got jobs overseas and many others have setup their own profession in AC Repairing, Auto Mechanic, Electrician, Lift repair, beautician, fashion designing and other fields.

The youth organized the spark event and other activities. The ladies have been collecting funds and distributing to hospitals (in kind), rations and blankets to villages and for the Rohingya Refugees.

To sum up, the scope and nature of the social and welfare activities of all chapters of WMO are growing, Masha Allah. May Almighty Allah help us all to serve humanity in the most befitting manner. Ameen.

Introduction & Background

World Memon Organization Charitable Foundation is a Company Incorporated in the United Kingdom and registered at the Charity Commission of England & Wales. Formed in 2002, the purpose of the WMO was to bring together all Memon's under one platform from around the globe for the common purpose of uplifting Memon's in particular but also humanity generally.

Since its inception the WMO has expended in excess of \$60 Million Dollars in various projects including educational programs and assistance, rehabilitation, housing, healthcare, micro finance schemes, disaster relief and several other forms of assistance to those most in need.

One of the most significant factors affecting the entire Memon Community worldwide is the preservation of Memon culture, traditions (those that do not conflict with Qur'an and Sunnah), language & philanthropy. A word dedicated to describe these attributes as an adjective of Memon's attributes could be "Memonicity".

It is a fact that we have seen the progressive watering down of Memonicity over the past few decades. believe that unless we have a coherent and practical strategy to deal with this, it is probably true to say that we will see a gradual dissemination of Memonicity and a disintegration of the Memon Community over the next one or certainly two generations.

As the only formally structured and registered charitable global grassroots organization run by Memon's for Memon's and now with an emerging coherent structure for Memon Youth, it is the WMO who must focus and deal with this very serious threat to our existence as a familial global community.

It is a fact almost wherever we travel in major conurbations worldwide, we meet Memon's. It is also a fact that many Memon's are blasé or even negligent about being a Memon. Here are a selection of statements that you may have encountered even within one's own families;

- I am a Muslim first and foremost....I am not too concerned about being a "Memon"
- It is discriminatory to call yourself a Memon we are all "Muslims"
- You only give money to Memon's and that is discriminatory and unfair

- I do not speak Memony language and I am not concerned about learning it
- I am shy to speak Memony
- Memony language does not get spoken anywhere within our home or wider family
- My Mum and Dad speak to us in Urdu and/or English so we never got the chance to learn Memony
- I don't and / or cannot relate to Memon culture and traditions.
- Memon events and functions are boring
- I do not want to marry a Memon because I can't handle all the issues that come with a being part of a large Memon family and wish to get away

Another fact to add to those above is that when a Memon reaches a certain age or certain level of maturity and realization or when they realise they would prefer their children to learn about the values of being a Memon, perhaps in an attempt to find suitable marriage partners, they become quite keen on the idea to be engaged with Memon organizations and change their social environment. They are then realistic about expressing their need to better understand and draw closer to their roots as Memon's. The problem is that by this time their children are not interested and this cycle repeats

Why does this happen? Why do mature Memon's of very diverse demographic and social standings reach this same or similar points in their lives about these issues?

Yusuf Ali Translates from the Holy Qur'an: O mankind! We created you from a single (pair) of a male and a female, and made you into nations and tribes, that ve may know each other (not that ye may despise (each other). Verily the most honoured of you in the sight of Allah is (he who is) the most righteous of you. And Allah has full knowledge and is well acquainted (with all things). The Glorious Qur'an Surah Hujuraat 49:13

Whilst the reference of this ayah is to the one who is more favoured by our creator through their connection with Allah SWT and not based on their national or tribal origins, another clear teaching that should be drawn from this ayah is that Allah SWT's actions were totally deliberate in creating us in "Nations and Tribes" and not as one homogenous group of people.

According to our holy scriptures therefore there is clarity and guidance about the structure of our existence as world citizens;

The Ummah - This comes first and foremost. We are all part of the Ummah of Rasoolullah (Sallalahu Alayhi . Wasalaam)

National Identity - The second stage down in the hierarchical structure; Whether we are British, Pakistani, Indian, African or of any other national origin we always associate ourselves as being proud of that origin

Tribal Identity - The third stage of the hierarchical structure; We could be originating from any of the tribes Allah SWT created us as such as Memon, Gujrati, Punjabi, Pathan Etc (this can then be broken down further into smaller tribal denominations), which generally have a geographical relevance.

The Family - The most frequently used identity denomination we engage with is our own family Therefore, the logical and natural inference to be drawn is that the preservation of one's National or Tribal attributes is be a part of one's actions as part of one's faith / Deen, so that future generations can continue to exist and be recognized by the tribal origins that Allah SWT structured individuals with.

Mission

Shortly after my appointment as Chairman, WMO Global Youth Wing ["GYW"] embarked on developing a formal structure for Youth in April 2017. This strategic proposal and draft structures were presented and discussed at the highest level within the organisation during the summer of 2017 and subsequently approved to be formally considered for adoption at the AGM in Ras Al Khaimah, UAE in October 2017.

Furthermore, with an ageing Board of Trustees ["BOT"] and Management Committee ["MC"] it was considered important for there to be an age balance within the working teams throughout the WMO.

Hence, with this forward-looking approach the WMO MC at the General Assembly held on 7th October 2017 in Ras Al Khaimah unanimously approved the formation of the new structure of the GYW including amendments to the Constitution, Standing Orders and Rules for Regional Chapters. The following paragraph was added to the constitution of WMO and is the basic premise upon which the WMO GYW was formed. The GYW vision statement reads;

"To promote and recognise the importance of young Memon's in particular by developing the WMO Global Youth Wing with a view to preserving and protecting their sense of the value of their Memon identity and encouraging their desire to become more deeply involved in furthering the objects of the WMO in order to enable them to participate more fully in the development of their families and the Memon community worldwide". WMO Constitution -Article 7:10

The GYW was established with the intent of strategically engaging Memon youth globally not only for their personal benefit & development through relevant programs and projects but also with the aim of providing a unique platform for communicating and harvesting Memon philanthropy, culture, traditions and language for future generations to recognize and adopt into their family lives.

During this process, WMO would also utilize this opportunity to identify, prepare and groom, suitably qualified professional and entrepreneurial Memon youth for future leadership roles within the WMO and the wider world. The initial task of the GYW on the ground was to ensure as a team we...


- Engage with Memon youth in each regional chapter
- Install a suitably robust communication platform for GYW
- Install a suitably robust administration platform
- Identify suitable GYW projects for each chapter
- Provide a visionary and aspirational program to attract GYW funding on a local level from businesses
- Rollout the regional programs and workshops

The formation of the WMO Global Memon Youth is historic, as it is for the first time ever that the Memon Youth were formally introduced into the WMO governing documentation, the MC and the Regional Management Committees ["RMC"] globally.

Structure

The Global Youth Wing is a wholly integral part of the WMO that will work hand in hand with the Regional Chapters aiding their work and regional effectiveness - It is ultimately the Regional Chapter's that will provide the conduit to those members of GYW and wider Youth fraternity deemed to be appropriate and worthwhile candidates to go onto higher office within the WMO. Hence the responsibility of GYW as a team is as follows:

- → Implement projects and programs with the RMC that serve our youth community
- → Provide a conduit to develop visionary, aspirational and unifying leadership programs and future leaders



The GYW structure above shows how the personnel fit into the WMO hierarchy and reporting structure.

GYW Chairman - Bashir Sattar. The GYW Chairman reports into the MC which is headed up by the President Mr Solly Noor.

The GYW Chairman has appointed 3 advisors; Advisor to GYW Chairman - Mr Khurram Kalia Advisor to GYW Chairman - Dr Sana Durvesh Advisor to GYW Chairman - Ms Sumrin Imran

GYW Secretary - Ms Reeda Sheikhani - Administratively responsible for GYW

GYW Treasurer - Mr Arsalan Tabani - Treasury responsibility for GYW

GYW Regional Youth Vice Chairman Pakistan Chapter - Mr Arsalan Hashmani

GYW Regional Youth Vice Chairman Far East Chapter - Mr Muhammed Saad Iqbal

GYW Regional Youth Vice Chairman Middle East Chapter - Mr Kamran Ghani

GYW Regional Youth Vice Chairman Europe Chapter - Mr Arshad Gani

The remaining chapters have yet to have appointed their RYVC's.

Each Regional Youth Vice Chairman ["RYVC"] appointed for the tenure would have to form a team of Regional Youth Executive's ["RYE's"] and recruit the RYE's (as mandated by the WMO Constitution) to run the affairs of their respective chapter.

All the office bearers selected for the GYW must share the values and vision and possess the requisite attributes of being a Uniter & Uplifter upon which the WMO stands and wishes to disseminate it global mission. Both the RYVC's and RYE's have a term of 3 years ["the term"] to run concurrently with the office period of the MC, however one significant difference is that all appointees are selected based on merit by the GYW Chairman and jointly approved by a team of office bearers from the MC. All GYW members appointed by the GYW Chairman have a one-year probationary period to ensure that they are able to work and aspire to the objectives of serving our global community. Their appointment for the term is only confirmed after one year's successful service.

Post the recruitment of the RYVCs, the GYW team had come up with a number of projects for global implementation on a regional basis - It was agreed that all projects would be tailored to address the requirements of both female and male youth. The broad categories of the projects are as follows, although as a moving feast this can and will change according to the needs of youth on the ground:

Conferences & Workshops; To conduct various conferences and workshops for example; Women's health & Men's health, Marriage Introductions -Family heads, Entrepreneurship / Internships - All conferences and workshops would be designed to meet regional requirements

WMO Global Youth Wing Membership; To conduct membership events to welcome and induct youth into WMO Global Youth Wing, to understand the workings and objectives of the WMO

Business Training / Internships; Conduct partnerships to help promote internships. There are many entrepreneurs and established professionals within the WMO membership and wider Memon community, to provide career guidance, job opportunities and even conduct a Memon's Dragon's Den entrepreneur development program

Competitions; Hold various competitions including all favoured sporting events, Memoni Language, Islamic knowledge, Inter-chapter competition and finals held in the UAE

Culture & Heritage; workshops and conferences to be organized which would promote Memoni culture, heritage and language

Philanthropy Training; Place interested Youth for volunteering at globally established humanitarian organizations for training at best practices and procedures, coaching and mentoring youth for a career in the humanitarian, aid and development arrange networking with organizations and arrange placements for our youth

Training & Education; Hold seminars for; Public Speaking & Professional Writing Skills, Basic Financial and Accounting Principles, Basic Business Management & Entrepreneurship basics, New Technologies & Software for business management & Leadership

Along with the above-mentioned projects the GYW is also working on another mega-project which is exclusively being designed for WMO and is known as WMO Memon Connect.

WMO Memon Connect harnesses the power of the internet & the social media revolutions and will establish an exclusive "platform" for our community to connect, collaborate and coordinate through. In a nutshell, WMO Memon Connect would have some of the features of LinkedIn, Facebook, WhatsApp & Ali Baba bundled together but exclusively for Memons.

The key objectives of the WMO Memon Connect are as follows:

- A. Provide an exclusive, unique and versatile APP both desktop and mobile based to Connect Memon's globally - much like we do through Facebook and WhatsApp.
- B. benefit the entire community through B2B, B2C & C2C communications in a tangible, enhanced and traceable fashion
- C. use the APP to coordinate and generate employment opportunities
- D. facilitate and structure Memon businesses and corporates
- E. provide opportunities for training and grooming our youth
- F. provide a platform for giving back to the community through social, humanitarian and disaster relief programs
- G. to allow the WMO to reach out to the global Memon Community and provide a medium for its engagement, development and protection of the preservation of the identity of the Memon Community

The WMO has come a long way since its inception in the work it has conducted for the benefit of humanity and the community it serves. However, there is much work to be done to unite the community and ensure the preservation of our culture traditions and language.

It is important to educate our people both old and young to demonstrate what type of people we are and who were the forefathers of the community and what they stood for and did for the benefit of mankind with immense vision, sacrifice and selfless effort.

Memon's generally are a philanthropic, articulate, generous, talented, modest, gifted and most of all god fearing community of people of the Ummah of Rasoolullah (Sallalahu Alayhi Wasalaam). We must ensure our community survives the challenges it faces today for its existence and survival whilst preserving the very values that make us a community that other communities value and aspire towards. WMO GYW hopes to contribute towards this most essential of causes by ensuring: - OUR YOUTH

Treasurer's Report

Assalamu Alaikum Warahmathullahi Wabarakathuhu

We have presented the compiled financial statements of the Audited Accounts of WMO chapters for Financial Year ended 31st December 2017, for the 16th AGAM in Karachi. The compiled financial statements are prepared in view of Africa Chapter, Far East Chapter, North Indian Chapter and America & Canada Chapter being separate legal entities.

The Compilation is based on the following Audited Accounts.

- 1. Africa Chapter
- 2. America & Canada Chapter
- 3. Europe Chapter
- 4. Far East Chapter
- 5. Middle East Chapter
- 6. North India Chapter
- 7. Pakistan Chapter

The Compiled Financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2017, are presented excluding South India as the audit of the SIC financial statements could be done only after we receive the 80G Tax exemption certificate from the relevant authorities.

We have achieved greater consistency in the policies adopted across the chapters and improved the presentation for better transparency and accuracy of the Audited Accounts. The Pakistan Chapter accounting policies and estimates have been revised to be in line with the approved accounting standards comprise of International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board as are notified under the Ordinance, "Accounting Standard for Not for Profit Organisations" (NPO Guidelines) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP) and provisions of and directives issued under the Ordinance.

As per the compiled financials the Zakat collections for 2017 (Approx. \$3mn) was 33% less than that of the year 2016. The reasons for the reduction are;

- » As per the fund based accounting, the Restricted funds would only be recognized as Income or Expense at the time of its utilization. The actual Zakat collection for the year is (\$3.25mn)
- » North Indian Chapter collections are way lower than the previous year due to the restructuring of the Region since last AGM,
- » Pakistan Chapter collections fell short of 40%, due to their restrictions imposed by the regulators, as iNGOs are not allowed to collect funds locally.
- » Restrictions on Dubai Banking operations.
- » Some of the Zakat were distributed by the donors directly to the beneficiaries or given to the Chapters in kind, due to various constraints posed by countries in some regions.

The Zakat distributions (\$2.835mn), is mainly focused on Education schemes for Pakistan and Housing for India. There is a major drop in the housing projects in Pakistan and India. The India Chapter activities were curtailed and hence impacted the Zakat distribution. Africa Chapter have spent 75% of their collections on local projects such as Widows and Orphans, Education, Bursary, Medical etc.. Middle East spent their local collection on the local welfare projects such as legal cases, debt settlements and Ramadan Appeals. Far East chapter collection was used for supporting Ummeed Foundation, a school for Special Children in India.

The collection of Trustee fees during the year 2017, has almost doubled compared to 2016, due to better collection and rescheduling of arrear Trustee membership fees. Currently the number of WMO Trustees stands at 50. We could also see an increase in membership fees by three folds during the year, due to the efforts put in by the Regions to increase membership.

We could expect a reduction in the overheads by around \$150,000 in 2018 as the MITI is now shown as a project of Pakistan Chapter where the asset written off is included in the project expense, and better management of expenses by the Chapters.

Auditors of Dubai and Pakistan have accepted the fair valuation of the investment properties done by a third party since the current market value of the properties, both Dubai and Pakistan, are approximately the same as at 31st December 2017. Investment income from Dubai is similar to the previous year and we are thankful to Leisure Homes for managing this portfolio for WMO free of charge in a very professional manner.

Increase in Investment and other Income during the year is mainly due to the investments being made for a full year compared to a few months in 2016 and the receipt of sponsorships for the events.

African Chapter is continuing to make investments in the equity market selectively within the permissible territory utilizing the Trustee Funds. At the beginning of the year there were 12 different share portfolios, which was reduced to one. The realized loss on sale of these shares amounted to \$ 31,000 The investments in shares earned \$6,200 as dividends during the year, resulting in a net loss of \$24,800. The total cost of the investments up to December 2017 was US\$ 220,837

The significant cash and cash equivalents as at the balance sheet consists of mainly the unutilized Zakat funds of Pakistan, Europe and Middle East Chapters, which were fully utilized by March 2018. This also comprises of Far East Chapter matured investment including its returns, which were reinvested during the year 2018.

The financial year 31st December 2017, ended with a Net Asset value of US\$ 8 million. Zakat funds have

been utilized during the year 2018, to comply with the Sharia principles.

I take this opportunity to highlight the following areas where we have to improve on.

- » The increased attention required by the Regional Treasurers and the RMC towards Management Accounts. We hope the RMC officials would increase this attention and monitor the Management reports in the future.
- » The implementation of WMO Policies needs to be followed by all Chapters during the year.
- » Increased usage of the Sage online accounting platform to ensure full benefits are achieved.
- » The Financial Audits have been completed timeously by all the Chapters within six months of the financial year end.

Overall, we have reached a level similar to an international charity, and we shall improve further on this status in the future. Insha Allah, this will lay a strong foundation for WMO to grow from strength to strength in a more transparent manner that will result in recognition by global humanitarian bodies and result in a significant increase in membership and Zakat collections in the future.

Notes to the Compiled Financial Statements

1. Accounting Policies

a) Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entries (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by charities.

b) Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included on Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

c) Resources Expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where cost cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

d) Foreign Currency

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into dollar at the rates of exchange prevailing on the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the date of the transactions. All differences are taken to the statement of financial activities.

e) Financial Assets / Investments

- i. Held to Maturity: These are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity that the chapter has the positive intention and ability to hold to maturity.
- ii. Instruments Designated as available-forsale: Listed investments classified as available for sale. Financial assets are carried at fair value which is calculated by reference to the stock exchange closing prices at the balance sheet date.

f) Bank Profit Receivable

Return on Investment/Bank profit share on funds held on deposits are included when receivable by the charity.

g) Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Designated funds are funds set aside by the trustees out of unrestricted general funds for the specific future purposes or projects.

h) Shariah and Zakat donations

The WMO complies with Shariah law as provided in the Holy Quran and Sunnah.

i) Taxation

As a registered charity WMO is exempt from taxation of income and gains to the extent these are applied to charitable objectives.

Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements

1. Accounting Policies

a) Accounting Convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with FRS102 - The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

b) Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included on Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

c) Resources Expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where cost cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

d) Allocation & Apportionment Of Costs

All costs relate to the single activity of the charitable company and are recognised accordingly.

e) Foreign Currency

Transactions in foreign currency are translated at the foreign exchange rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the balance sheet date are translated at the exchange rate ruling at that date. Foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in the income statement. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction.

f) Investments

Fixed asset investments are shown at cost less amounts written off. Provisions are made for permanent fluctuations in value.

g) Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Designated funds are funds set aside by the trustees out of unrestricted general funds for the specific future purposes or projects.

h) Going Concern

We have adequate resources and are well placed to manage the business risks. Our planning process, including financial projections, has taken into consideration the current economic climate and its potential impact on the various sources of income and planned expenditure. We have a reasonable expectation that we have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. We believe that there are no material uncertainties that call into doubt the charity's ability to continue. The financial statements have therefore been prepared on the basis that the charity is a going concern.

i) Investment Properties

Investment properties are included in the financial statements at open market value. No depreciation is provided on such property in compliance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities. This departure from Companies Act requirements is necessary to show a true and fair view.

i) Taxation

As a registered charity WMO is exempt from taxation of income and gains to the extent these are applied to charitable objectives.

h) Shariah & Zakat Donations

The WMO complies with Shariah law as provided in the Holy Quran and Sunnah.

The RMC expressed their sincere appreciation to the outgoing Office Bearers for all their assistance and support and noted the strong bonds of friendship formed over the last few years.

WMO Africa Chapter Properties:

Claudius Property: Donated by Mr Sayed Mia. As per agreement by the RMC, this property was sold for R.3

Erasmia Property: Donated by Mr Haroon Karrim. Compliance Committee has indicated a 2-year period before the land can be developed. At the local AGM a request was made for Mr Karrim to ensure that all the additional costs (rezoning, transfer costs etc) are settled before the property is transferred to WMO.

Social Welfare Projects:

Africa Chapter continues to offer financial assistance monthly to Memon and Non-Memon families who are in dire straits. These include:

- Payment of rent, water, electricity, groceries and tertiary school / madressah fees. These cases are funded monthly.
- Offering financial medical assistance to Muslim patients countrywide with a strict process of application approval as well as medical assessment by qualified personnel.
- Offering financial assistance to University students to cover expenses of text books etc

Ramadan 2017 Activities:

Gauteng/Pretoria partnered with Purposeful Giving

- Daily Iftar packs provided to residents from the Itireleng community.
- Africa Chapter, Purposeful Giving and the ABS Youth Group distributed basic grocery items, hygiene packs, party packs and meals for the children with an additional 300 hampers, which was to be handed over during the month.
- Purposeful Giving & WMO sponsored and distributed personalized Ramadan Shoeboxes as an Eid gift and gift bags, stationery packs, fruit and meals to the children of the community.
- Annual Ramadan food hampers distributed to the community of Klipspruit West.
- Annual food hamper distribution to the community of Westbury / Newclare, Gauteng, in partnership with Hadjie Lutfie and his team.

KZN partnered with Jama'atun Nisaa

In the KZN region, Jama'atun Nisaa hosted a 5-star Iftar dinner under the banner of WMO. This event took place on the 17th June 2017 at the beautiful venue; Exotic Convention Centre in Durban. With over 200 guests including: 175 orphans, their Madressah educators and volunteers

- WMO supported a project of Darul Ihsan whereby 10 tons of dates (kajoor) were funded and distributed nationally and outside South African borders. The distribution of the dates (kajoor) packs focused on Masaajied, Madaaries, Musallies, Correctional Service Centres and needy families.
- Cauldrons (degs) of Haleem were distributed regularly.
- Savouries for Iftar meals were distributed to various masjids in KZN.
- Complete Iftar meals were distributed.
- Food hampers were distributed and cash offered to purchase Eid clothing for the children. This was handed over to the parents at an Iftar organized by Addington School.
- Vouchers distributed to purchase groceries as per each families' personal requirements were handed over to needy recipients throughout the month of Ramadan.
- Eid gifts and goody bags were personally packed by our team of volunteers and delivered and presented to the following Institutes:
 - 1. Baitul Hifazat Home for the elderly
 - 2. Baitul Firdaus Home for the elderly 3. Baitul Aman - Orphanage

 - 4. Izizwe Islamic Centre Orphanage
 - 5. Islamic Guidance
 - 6. Kenilworth Respite Centre Home for abused women

Eidul Adha 2017 Celebrations

- Distributions of clothing and Eid gift parcels to deserving orphanages.
- Celebrations with the Elderly at Old Age Homes serving scrumptious meals and treats, gifted with hygiene hampers and Eid treats.
- A number of distributions made to many needy families, spoiling the little ones with Eid Treats and cash was donated to parents.

Local Zakat Collections:

Majority of the cases presented to WMO need financial assistance with payments of water, electricity, groceries etc. Some cases are regular and dealt with monthly but the requests are increasing rapidly. There is also an escalating need to offer financial assistance of school / madressah fees and books for university students. Many of these cases are Memon and Muslim families in dire straits.

We continue to appeal to Members and the Memon Community to forward their Zakat or even a portion of their Zakat to WMO throughout the year and especially in the month of Ramadan. This will assist us in funding current and future projects

International Zakat Collections:

At the last AGAM, the Africa Chapter committed to collecting the International Zakat of \$680,000 USD

Donations:

- R50 000 donated to Blind SA towards literature for the blind and 2 desktop computers. WMO advocates for education towards improving one's circumstances and striving towards the upliftment of society.
- R170,000 donated food hampers and offered financial assistance to the Itereleng community,
- A piece of land belonging to a Memon family from Laudium has been donated on which a Masjid and other structures have been built. There is no running water and electricity and talks are ongoing with the council to provide infrastructure.
- "Neighbourly Needs" is an organization working towards getting the people and the community economically independent with the goal of eventually sustaining themselves.
- R100,000 donated by Africa Chapter towards the distributions of food hampers to Zakat eligible members of the community.
- Mr Moosa Carrim has been a stalwart of Africa Chapter for over a decade now. He has always been on the forefront to support every worthy cause. Be it the distribution of wheelchairs for the aged and infirm, delivering water during Operation Hydrate to those afflicted by the drought in South Africa or offering steadfast support towards orphanages, in and around Johannesburg. Last year, on witnessing the dismal conditions of the orphans and elderly, living together in a cramped Klipspruit shelter, the Africa Chapter and Mr Carrim donated a unit consisting of 8 rooms, a kitchen, a dining area and a lounge to provide space and comfort to the confined inhabitants. This unit was purchased at a cost of R250,000 a majority of the funds coming from the Carrim family.
- R23,000 was donated towards the George Masjid.
- R100,000 donated towards the renovations of the Muslim Aids Programme Orphanage.
- R150,000 Lillah donated toward the "Smile Foundation Project" [WMO gets naming rights of the Training Programme]

Wheelchair Campaign 2017:

- An ongoing project where brand new wheelchairs are donated to needy recipients in various regions of South Africa. Issuing of these wheelchairs are subject to the approval of application. We would like to thank Trustee Yusuf Kamdar who continues to provide us with these wheelchairs, Alhamdulillah.
- Some recipients are handicapped and lack easy and convenient mobility during their everyday activities. It has become apparent that many of them require a specialized wheelchair which is much costlier than that of the standard wheelchairs we offer. When such a case is presented to us, a special appeal is made and funds are immediately raised to accommodate this appeal. Alhamdulillah, In the KZN region, R100,000 was pledged towards purchasing specialized wheelchairs.

• WMO & Jama'atun Nisaa Wheelchair Campaign: Jona Vaughan Home is a project of Durban and Coastal Mental Health. The home caters for 84 children and adults with profound intellectual and physical disabilities. Residents receive 24 hour care in a safe and secure environment. As part of their care, residents receive nutritional meals, medical management and participate in stimulation programmes. Alhamdulillah, the WMO & Jama'atun Nisaa could contribute towards the needs of these residents by providing them with 8 wheelchairs, this will alleviate the everyday difficulties of getting the elderly to and fro.

July 2017:

On the 23rd of July, the ladies of WMO & Jama'atun Nisaa participated in the Nelson Mandela Day activities by distributing blankets to orphans who attended a picnic hosted by "Gifted Hope" at Mitchell's Park in Durban. The ultimate gift was given back to all these volunteers by seeing the joy on the orphans' faces and reminding them that they are special.

September 2017:

On the 14th September 2017 at the 13th Clinics Anniversary Function of RK. Khan Hospital, 250 patients were treated to eats and treats.



WMO Africa Chapter Ladies Wing:

The Africa Chapter Ladies Wing has been extremely active and has continued to participate and coordinate various projects driven by the committee members and continues to make a meaningful impact on the lives of the need, Alhamdulillah.

- R100,000 raised by ladies of Jama'atun Nisaa and was pledged as WMO / Jama'atun Nisaa contribution to OPERATION SA for relief aid to refugees of Syria.
- WMO & Jama'atun Nisaa contributed towards computer classes at the South Coast Madressah School.
- Ms Shirin Arbee efficiently manages all ladies activities in the KZN.
- Dr Khudaija Suliman has taken on the responsibility of managing Ladies Wing activities coordinated in the Gauteng region.

February 2017:

Empowerment through technology: Jama'Atun Nisa & WMO empower students using technology. More than R6,000 was donated to the South Coast Madressa to assist children learning to make their own video games. This has played a huge role in boosting technology and supporting computer science education in communities that are in need.

March 2017:

Playground for children who suffer of Cerebral Palsy: On the 26th of March 2017, a special playground for 41 children with cerebral palsy was opened.

April 2017:

The sisters of Jama'atun Nisaa together with WMO Ladies Wing organized a special braai on the 11th of April 2017 for the 90 orphans at Iziswe Islamic Centre in Durban – KZN in celebration of the Annual Memon Day.

May-June 2017:

WMO Ladies Wing, Jama'atun Nisaa & Purposeful Giving participated in numerous Ramadan projects as mentioned above.

On the Day of Ashura the Ladies Wing once again with the support of Jama'atun Nisa celebrated Youmul Ashura, raising R6,400 and reaching out to underprivileged children, distributing party packs.

Meetings

Two Board meetings, five RMC meetings and 8 RMC conference calls were held during the year. Numerous calls between Office Bearers took place during the course of the year to sort out various issues pertaining to the WMO.

WMO Europe Chapter since the inception of WMO has been entrusted to take care of the Audited Accounts and other statutory responsibilities for the Organisation and the Trust which Alhamdulillah they have fulfilled.

Zakat Collection

The WMO in conjunction with the Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester made great efforts to collect Zakat. Around five hundred Zakat Appeal letters reflecting the WMO activities were sent out by emails during the month of Ramadan, which resulted in the awareness of WMO among the Memon community. During this period, we revealed new donors, who have committed that in future they would pay their Zakat to WMO. Many calls had been made by officer bearers to the potential donors. This is the first time we got good response to Zakat Appeal letters and we got Zakat directly into the designated Zakat account of WMO.

We have already collected \$420,000 USD towards our commitment of 2017. Detailed breakdown is given below.

Welfare Activities

The Europe and especially UK has its own welfare system which provides legal aid, housing supports, medical assistance etc. by respective professionals, which are also advertised on the website. We intend to have regional advisors giving advice on matrimonial, family disputes etc.

We support Memon's with hospital expenses and funeral expenses where necessary.

A Memon Connection service exists which introduces young adults and their families. Eight ladies from the Ladies Wing have been designated to manage this service.

The ladies committee is having good progress in introducing the marriage introductions among Memons and every year at least 25 to 30 introductions take place.

Youth Wing

The Youth wing of WMO Europe Chapter consists of Youth Wing of Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester.

The Youth Wing has been active with cricket, volleyball, basketball and badminton activities at both the Memon Centre in London & Leicester.

We have organised a total of 4 functions and these have been very well attended by both the youth and members at large. The youth have taken a key role in assisting with the organising of social events and their input and participation is ever increasing, Alhamdulillah.

In 2017 following activities have been undertaken by the Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester in collaboration with WMO EC:

- 9. Indoor Football every Friday in Leicester.
- 10. Outdoor Football every Friday in Leicester.
- 11. Talim classes for youth in Leicester every Monday at MC Leicester.
- 12. Youth Club every Friday in Memon Center Leicester.
- 13. Mehman Lunch Club at Memon Center Leicester every Thursday.
- Leicester and London provides free use of Memon Centre for funeral services.
- 15. Memon Association Leicester is going through a very large extension of the sports centre. Once we have our own purpose built sports centre completed we will be able to increase our youth activities and invite Memon's worldwide for sports competitions Insha Allah.

As can be determined from the above list, youth activities have been extensive and vibrant and further improvements are planned to the engagement with youth for 2018/19 Insha Allah.

Ladies Wing Report 2017

WMO Ladies Wing has been active in collecting funds for projects in **India** and **Malawi**. The charity work are focused on Women Empowerment, providing jobs, supporting widows, the destitute and sick.



We donated £17,000 to India and Malawi before Ramadan for the following projects:

Rohingya Relief Mission - Project Aman

Funds were collected for the Rohingya community to make a tangible difference on the ground - to alleviate the pain and ease the hardships endured by the refugees, dwelling in the subhuman conditions of the uninhabitable Balukhali camps.

Project Aman

Location

Camp Aman is situated between Balukhali and Kutupalong Refugee Camps in the Ukhia Sub-district of Cox's Bazar, along the Bangladesh - Myanmar border.

The Team

WMO Far East Chapter team: Mr AC Saleem. Mr Anjum Asmath, Mr. Yaseen Gani and Mr Shahid Sangani. Two humanitarians from UK - Mr Amir Farooq and Mr Adil Abbasi are collaborating with WMO on this project.

Preparation

- → Registration of 300 families, almost 1200 members, in the designated area of the camp will be taken care of by WMO.
- → Formation of a supply chain to receive and distribute relief aid on a regular basis to the earmarked families.
- → Establishing communication links with leaders of the Rohingya communities.

Food Distribution on a weekly basis

- → 300 food packs. Each pack contains 10 kg rice, 2kg lentils, 2kg onions, 1 litre cooking oil, 2kg potato, 1kg salt, 1 kg of sugar and spices. Each pack feeds a family of 4 for 7 to 10 days.
- → 150 packs of baby milk for infants and children
- Relief Goods Distribution
- → 500 Solar powered lamps for Shelters.
- → 2,000 pairs of clothes for men, women and children.
- → 500 sanitary sets. Each set contains a body soap, towels, soap to wash clothes, nail clippers, comb and razors.
- → 500 metres of tarpaulin to build shelters and overheard roofs.
- → Sleeping mats.
- → Battery Flashlights.
- → Utensils.
- → Firewood.

Gift of Sight Project

Far East Chapter is spreading the light with the invaluable gift of sight. Healthy corneas are donated to the visually impaired in all corners of the World from Sri Lanka

Far East Chapter will donate eyes to countries that are reeling under the onslaught of curable blindness, starting with delivering 200 corneas to Pakistan in the year 2017/2018. In a majority of these cases, the sight lost due to an opaque cornea (the outermost, transparent layer of the eye) can be restored by replacing it with a clear one. This remarkable endeavour that the Far East Chapter has embarked upon will bridge the gap between availability and requirement of healthy corneas.

WMO has partnered with the Hashmanis Foundation and the Sri Lankan Eye Bank Society to provide free Corneal Transplant services to the Memons of Pakistan. Under the agreement, the Sri Lankan Eye Bank Society will provide the donated healthy corneas to the Far East Chapter which will be sent to Pakistan Chapter.

Darrussalam Maha Vidyalaya (DMV) Project

Far East Chapter has identified Dharussalam Maha Vidyalaya, a 100 years old School with over 1,200 under privileged students enrolled, which needs lot of attention on basic Infra Structure and other amenities.

- WMO FC is continuing to provide assistance in the following areas;
 - » Needy students with daily breakfast for nourishment.
 - » Conducting extra classes for students facing major exams.
 - » Conducting additional classes after school hours.
 - » Supporting to uplift sports activities, (Sport gear, coaches salaries, and meals)

Cost incured for DMV project is \$ 10,000.

 WMO FC has also under taken to develop the Infra structure of the said school with a total estimated cost of \$ 1.6mn over a period of 2-3 years. This development is based on a Master plan to take this school to a new level with improved infrastructure and other facilities.

The Master plan is to provide 39 class rooms, Auditorium, Fully equipped Science Laboratory, Library, and with other amenities such as toilets and dining area.

Ration Distribution to the Dengue Affected Families in the Rural Kinniya.

There were 2,000 reported cases and 21 deaths as of March 19 in Kinniya (Eastern Province of Sri Lanka).

Far East Chapter with the participation of Memon Aid of Sri Lanka initiated the project of distributing Ration to the affected in the Kinniya area at a cost of US\$ 10,000. Rations were distributed among 300 families who were affected by the Dengue outbreak.

Year 2017 Middle East Chapter focused on Education and provided financial assistance to 127 students for an amount of AED 600,730, bulk of it went towards scholarship of needy students of Pakistan Education Academy where 89 students benefited from this initiative.

Visa Disputes



WMO Aashiyana - Akola Housing Colony.

On 31st December 2017, WMO Ashiyana project ground breaking and the foundation stone laying ceremony was held in Akola. This housing project will provide homes for 24 under privileged Memon families in the region. Akola is a town situated in the state of Maharashtra in Central India with a sizeable Memon population. The ceremony was attended by prominent members of the Memon Community, headed by the Chapter Vice President.

Project Farishtey

Farishtey, is the NICs special Education Programme started by Ladies wing, which was commenced with the intention of providing education to children with special needs. NIC continues this project by supporting such children of the Memon Community.

This project supports the following categories;

- Significantly sub average intellectual functioning: an IQ of approximately 70 or below on an individually administered IQ test (for infants, a clinical judgment of significantly sub average intellectual functioning).
- Mumbai based mentally challenged and Autism Memon Community deserving Children who wish to join any special school or are studying in any special schools other than above may also contact for financial assistance towards their school fees.
- Will also support to continue studies in other schools besides the 2 identified schools

Nikah (Marriage help in Gujarat & Maharashtra)

Individual Marriage help was provided every Saturday during the month of December 2017. Financial assistance and household items were provided to help 04 deserving families under Individual Marriage Help Programme.

Ladies Wing Activities

Memon Matrimonial Event at Mumbai.

The activities of all the programmes are set out in detail in the later part of this report. Since my team and I took over the management in the last quarter of the year, my predecessor, Mr H. M. Shehzad and his team deserve the full credit for the excellent performance of PC for the year 2017. I also thank our staff and all the volunteers for their hard work and devotion.

We look forward to the continued support of our donors, staff, volunteers and all concerned in future to vigorously pursue the noble objective of up-lifting our community and the humanity at large.

It is my pleasure to present the Performance Report of the Pakistan Chapter for the year ended 31st December 2017.

PC is working for the welfare of Memon Community in Pakistan, specifically, in the field of education.

Education for All:

Education is our top priority; our goal is to provide a better quality of education to our community.

Higher & Professional Education:

In the same manner, we are encouraging the



students to go for higher and professional education. More than 500 students qualify annually helping their families to come out of poverty and distress.

Rehabilitation:

Another important activity is to provide housing to the shelter-less community members. A poor family where the bread earner is only one person normally finds it extremely hard to pay even the monthly house rent. Buying a small flat by such individual is therefore out of question. We have to help such poor and needy families. In recent years, the cost of flats has increased many times due to inflation which has seriously impaired our ability to buy houses for the needy families, therefore we have revised our policy of giving homes to the needy families. Instead, WMOPC now mostly provides financial assistance to the needy families to enable them to pay house rents. Currently PC helps around 70 families.

Memon Industrial & Technical Institute

MITI is a state-of-the-Art Vocational Institute in Pakistan for the training of Youth offering more than 70 trades qualification to boys and girls. MITI is also offering 3 years Diploma program.

Micro Finance Scheme:

The Micro Finance Scheme continues to provide up to Rs.25,000 interest free loan to small business owners for expansion of their existing business.

Rozgar Scheme:

Our target is to reduce poverty from community by providing respectable business resources like auto rickshaws and sewing machines to those who desire to earn livelihood from these resources. Hand pumps are also installed in remote villages of Sindh by PC. We also distribute cash and ration to the needy people in the month of Ramadan.

Census of the Memon Community:

Census is a very difficult area to work due to continued changes in data. It needs continuous efforts to update the database. During the year we regularly met with various Jamaat leaders in this respect. We also plan to prepare a Memon Business Directory and Memon Professional Directory in the near future.

Welfare work:

The welfare work of PC has spread over many diverse activities. We are pleased to give the details of such activities so that one can appreciate the volume of welfare work carried out by PC for the benefit of the Memon Community in Pakistan. We are grateful to all the well-wishers for their support to achieve our targets. We earnestly hope that all well-wishers would continue to help us so that poor and needy people of the Memon Community are looked after.

- 3. Memons are living in many countries but mostly in Pakistan and India. Conducting a census is a huge and a very difficult task. For this purpose we have been in touch with all the Memon Jamaats in Pakistan and have received a very positive response from them.
- 4. Since 2004 we have been collecting and updating the census data from the Jamaats and other sources.
- 5. Memon population in Pakistan is estimated to be about 1.3 million, of this over 60% being youth and equal gender ratio.

Report of the Rehabilitation Committee

WMO PC launched the WMO Rehabilitation Scheme in 2004, in order to address the housing problems faced by the Memon Community. The scheme received an overwhelming response with 7225 applications pouring in within few weeks. The numerous applications are itself proof of the existence of large scale housing issues faced by the Memon Community in Pakistan.

WMO started providing flats to the needy families after scrutinizing applications from late 2004 on

ownership basis. After consulting with renowned Ulemas of the society, the WMO decided to provide flats on partnership basis with the ownership of 5% share of WMO and 95% share of applicant to protect the property of applicant, who is unaware about the misuse of documents. It was also decided to withdraw the 5% share of WMO and handover the said documents of the properties to the applicants after 10 years. In order to fulfill the above commitments WMO Rehab Committee has started giving original property documents to the applicants, who have fulfilled the above criteria.

Report of the Education for All Committee

I am thankful to the former chairman, Mr Qasim Lawai, for his support and guidance since 2008. Since its inception in 2009, the Education for All Committee (EFA) has been endeavoring to provide financial support to the needy Memon students from pre-nursery to intermediate classes up to grade 12. Around 9218 students are registered under this program and the school fees are paid by WMO directly to the respective schools. At present the financing by the WMO per child is Rs. 2,000 per month.

From the year 2017 EFA has been focusing on the quality education and achieving reduction in the number of schools.

We regularly evaluate the standard of education of all the schools. The schools, whose standard is considered poor, are delisted.

Report of Higher & Professional Education

WMO PC has been striving since 2004 to help the youth of the Memon Community to acquire career oriented graduate, post graduate and other professional qualifications. Under this Scheme, financial assistance of up to Rs. 100,000/- per calendar year is given to each needy and deserving Memon student, on basis of past academic performance/ results

This assistance, which is provided from the Zakat Fund, is given in the shape of direct payment of fee to educational institutions and any other expenses such as purchase of books, transport, etc.

The criteria for disbursement of financial assistance is as follows:

- a. The beneficiary must be a member of a recognized Memon Jamat.
- b. The beneficiary must be a eligible for financial help from the Zakat Fund.
- The beneficiary must have an admission offer from a recognized and well reputed educational institution.
- d. The beneficiary's past academic performance should justify the level of the financial assistance sought.

The following table shows the percentage of financial assistance given to the student out of the total requirement of fees, on the basis of academic performance.

In case the student fails in a particular paper/ semester/term, the WMO does not pay his/her fees for that term and the student has to bear the expenses himself or herself until a satisfactory result is achieved. Students seeking financial assistance are required to complete a comprehensive application from and submit it with the required supporting documents. The students are called for interview within one week of the submission of the application.

The Higher & Professional Education Committee holds weekly interviews of the students seeking the financial assistance and disbursements of the funds are made within one week of the interview without any hassle.

Report of Micro Finance Scheme

The Micro Finance Scheme of Pakistan Chapter was launched in the year 2009 with the support of some honorable Trustees and Patrons of WMO. Under this scheme, small business owners are provided interest free loans to advance their business. Initially, the Scheme was run on a trial basis, wherein about 40 small entrepreneurs were given loans of up to Rs. 10,000 each. These loans were repayable by the applicants in 12 easy installments of either Rs. 833 per month or installments of Rs. 1,000 in 10 months.

The Micro Finance Scheme continues to provide loans of up to Rs. 10,000 to first time applicants. The borrowers who repay these loans become entitled to bigger loans up to Rs. 25,000

The WMO-PC Micro Finance Committee is planning to increase the loan amount limit to Rs. 15,000 and Rs. 40,000 for the first time borrower and the subsequent borrower respectively.

Report of Rozgar Scheme

The Rozgar scheme of PC was launched in May 2011. Under this scheme, Auto rickshaws and sewing machines are provided to poor and deserving families of the Memon community to help them earn a decent livelihood.

The response to the Rozgar Scheme has been overwhelming, 402 applications for rickshaws and 862 applications for sewing machines have been received since the start of the Scheme.

However, at present the pending applications are 201 for auto rickshaws and 316 for sewing machines.

We need substantial funds to cater to the pending applications and humbly request the philanthropists and other well-wishers of the Memon Community to support this scheme so that poverty in the community is reduced.

Karachi Memon Students' Organisation (K.M.S.O.)

The Karachi Memon Students' Organisation (K.M.S.O.) is a very old study center of the Memon Community located in Bombay Bazaar, Old Town, Karachi. Over the decades, the Study Center has served thousands of students to pursue their studies.

In the year 2008, when the K.M.S.O. was facing financial difficulties, the Management of K.M.S.O. had approached the then Secretary General of WMO, Mr Abba Ali Yousuf, for financial support.

In response, WMO had taken upon itself to help the study center financially so that the center can carry out its activities without any difficulties. The WMO has been providing financial grants to K.M.S.O. since 2008. In 2017, the financial help given to K.M.S.O. for their recurring expenses was PKR 300,000

Over the years, a major chunk of the Memon Population has moved out of the Old Town Area. Therefore, plans are underway to shift the Study Center to an area where a considerable number of Memons live.

Report of the Youth Wing

Youth Entrepreneurship and Business Conference "The Titans"

"When everything seems to be going against you, remember that the airplane takes off against the wind, not with it". On 12th March 2017, the Youth Wing held the first ever Youth Entrepreneurship and Business Conference titled as "The Titans". This was the first time ever that a conference of such a magnitude with such an impressive guest list was organized by the Youth Wing.

The main agenda of this conference was to inculcate in the youth the idea of pursuing entrepreneurship. In a rapidly globalizing world, we have witnessed the promotion of entrepreneurship as a possible source of job creation, empowerment and economic dynamism. Report of Memon Industrial & Technical Institute

This report provides details about the activities, projects and events accomplished during the year 2017. These activities further the cause of WMO whose mission is the welfare and rehabilitation of the marginalized population of the Memon Community in particular and all Pakistan in general. The MITI is playing a pivotal role in the TVET Sector of the country by imparting technical and vocational training to rehabilitate the less fortunate youth of the society who could not complete their education and were fated to become street children with all the risk factors involved especially leading to violence and extremism. MITI came into existence as a project of WMO-PC in 2009 at the premises provided by CDGK. It is now 9 years since MITI started its operations by enrolling 254 students in June 2009 in 7 courses for boys only and since then MITI has remained focused towards achieving the goals of WMO and MITI which included providing affordable and quality vocational education to the youth of low income group and continuous improvement in quality and services of the Institute while strictly adhering to the principles of charity, welfare and service to humanity.

MITI has a highly subsidized fee structure but for deserving students it is still free. In the early years, financial viability of MITI remained linked to the philanthropic assistance of WMO and its members. However, the management strived to increase admissions and explored other avenues of funds for further development.

MITI has been progressing steadily in providing good quality vocational training to Men and Women. Initially, our focus areas were Landhi, Korangi, Shah Faisal Colony and Malir. This has also expanded to other towns such as Lyari, Sultanabad and in fact all of Karachi. Government and international training organization, impressed by our facilities enlisted MITI as their training partners. Consequently, MITI is now a service provider for Benazir Bhutto Youth

Development Scheme, Karachi Youth Initiative, UNDP and Prime Minister's Youth Development Scheme. As a result, MITI has been able to come close to achieving self-sustenance without sacrificing the ideals for which MITI was built. And by the Grace of Allah SWT, we are successfully progressing in that direction by strict financial discipline.

MITI has two major goals: Continuous development and increasing admissions. Several initiatives in this regard are summarized below. The success of these efforts is visible in the steady increase in enrollment over the years to 2,100 and 4,000 in the Men's and Women's sections respectively by December 2016. Another milestone in its operation, 96,250 Men and Women have benefited from the facilities of MITI since its inception.

- i. Promotional Activities were undertaken to increase awareness about MITI
- j. Relationships with Partners were enhanced

The new Motor Bike workshop was completely developed with all tools, equipment and machines by Pak Suzuki. In addition, training were arranged by them for the students of CNG, Auto Mechanic and Motor Bike at their plant.

3. United Mobile

Relations with United Mobile flourished and they have developed the new bigger workshop for a larger number of students.

4. Ardent elevators

They are currently installing an elevator in the Institute as part of the studies.

5. Christine Cosmetics

They have provided facilities for a new Beautician Clinic which will be used for conducting short courses in beauty and cosmetology. They also provide their cosmetics for class room practice.

6. Millat Fans

They have most generously provided their most popular Millat Fans for installation in MITI.

7. Glamorous FACE U.S.A.

They have provided their cosmetics for class room practice. Workshops and short courses in beauty and cosmetology are conducted.

The Future

MITI prides itself in becoming a premier institution for vocational training in the country and the management and staff of MITI are committed in its continued growth to help the destitute people of society for upward mobility. We are humbled by the achievements and are grateful to Allah SWT for guiding us in the right direction and giving success in our ventures. But the progress of MITI lies in continuous improvement and development. As such a road map of future strategy has been made as given below:

Expansion and Renovation of Facilities

By the grace of Allah, MITI has completed 9 years of operation. In these 9 years, we have served more than 96,250 students. The graduating students have been well received by the industry locally as well as internationally which is due to hard work and commitment of the management and our faculty team. TO achieve these objectives, our workshops

and other facilities were built with limited investment to satisfy the training needs of the time. In the last 9 years many other similar institutes have come up in the city who have taken inspiration from our experience. Some of them are smaller clones but some of them are in a similar class as ours and although we would not like to admit it, they are competing with us in real terms. The time has now come when we are faced with the reality of the following:

1. Attrition of equipment:

Many of the equipment and facilities have become old while new ones have not been added. The present facilities are falling behind the requirements and advancements in industry. Computer hardware is another big area which requires upgrading. Our computers are no longer compatible with the software that are now available and have become standards of the industry and which we are teaching. So far, we have been coping with these requirements by local upgradations but this has a limit. This

Auditorium which is a dire need of MITI which can rightly be called the flagship project of WMO.

Funded Iftari and Dinner for 250 People from the Rural Muslim Town Of Mutur. 50 Families with kids benefited from this Iftari Programme.

» Eid-Milan:

A total of 50 ladies' participated. This event included games and entertainment, followed by fellowship and lunch.

» Annual Picnic:

This was mainly for ladies aged 50 and above. We had a total of 50 participants for this event. It was a fun-filled day and all those who attended enjoyed it very much

» Memon Empowerment Program:

We funded a Certificate Course in Pastry and Bakery. The beneficiary has completed the course and got a break at a leading restaurant.

» Women's Awareness Programme:

An awareness programme was held for the Memon ladies on 6th December 2017 at MASL. 107 Memon Ladies (beneficiaries) and WMO ladies wing members participated at this event. We received more than 150 inquiry forms with their requirements. The committee assessed and then interviewed and identified beneficiaries who will be assisted for education and other courses in 2018.

On behalf of the Audit, Finance and Zakat Committee I hereby present our Annual Performance Report for year 2017.

Audit

The Consolidated Audited Financial Statements for WMO, incorporating the Audited Accounts of WMO CF, WMO EC, WMO MC and WMO PC are given elsewhere in this Annual Report.

For the current year 2017, the Compiled Accounts presented include the Audited Accounts of all the Chapters, excluding South India, as the Audit of SIC financial statements will be done only after we receive the 80G Tax exemption certificate from the relevant authorities.

Both the Consolidated and Compiled Accounts are presented in the WMO Annual Report for Adoption by the General Membership.

We have achieved greater consistency in the policies adopted across the chapters and improved the presentation for better transparency and accuracy of the Audited Accounts. The Pakistan Chapter accounting policies and estimates have been revised to be in line with the accounting standards and recommended practices. Due to the practice of MC Auditors, the presentation of the MC Financials had to be adhered to the regional standards. We will ensure to eliminate this inconsistency and are hopeful that MC auditors will adopt the presentation methodology and disclosures required under the latest IFRS Rules before the next Audit.

Similar to previous year there has been close communication between the Auditors of all Chapters, Regional Treasurers, WMO Treasurer and Deputy Treasurer and WMO CFO in the preparation of the Audited Accounts. Insha Allah, going forward, we hope to improve on any further inadequacies and the Audit for 2018 will be in line with WMO group policies.

The Compiled Balance Sheet has increased by \$300,000 due to the collections during the year end which was in turn distributed within the 1st quarter of the ensuing year.

Finance

The year 2017 was spent on implementing Sage Accounting software and getting the chapter activities and transactions recorded and updated online real time

Quarterly Management Accounts submissions were done through sage starting from the 2nd quarter by few chapters and all of the chapters complied from 3rd quarter submissions.

The attention paid by the Regional Treasurers and the RMC towards Management Accounts was inadequate. We hope the RMC officials would consider this and monitor the Management reports in the future to maintain the status of WMO as an International Charity


The implementation of WMO Policies was not followed by any chapters during the year except for limited implementation by Pakistan Chapter. The Check Lists for Financial Policy & Procedure to make the monitoring of the Policies easier, was not completed by the Chapters to assess the current status of their standard operating procedures.

Even though the newly elected RMC Officials were requested to consider this as very critical and support to implement all WMO Policies and procedures in a very strict manner, none of the chapters showed any progress during the year, due to the shorter time frame after taking over.

Zakat

The WMO Zakat Committee pray Almighty Allah accept all contributions made by the donors, and to shower his blessings on them and their families. We take this opportunity to express our gratitude to all the Zakat Contributors, for entrusting WMO to donate their Zakat.

Alhamdulillah the Zakat Collections recorded a total of over US\$ 3.25mn for 2017. 2017 recorded a shortfall of US\$ 250,000/ compared to the previous year and reversed a trend of annual growth in Zakat collections since 2012. Insha Allah we hope to address the shortcomings and get back to track by the year 2018 with a positive growth.



Zakat Policy

There was no change in Zakat Policy for the year 2017, and the change agreed in 2016 of Project based Zakat Commitment policy continued in 2017.

Zakat Collections

Out of the total commitment of US\$ 4,400,000 a sum of US\$ 3,249,183 was collected for year 2017. This reflects a decline of 24% from 2016 (US\$ 4,009,988) and a 73% success rate of the commitments. The major setbacks for the fall in collections are;


- » North Indian Chapter collections are way lower than the previous year as expected.
- » Pakistan Chapter collections fell short of 40%, due to restrictions imposed by the regulators, since iNGOs are not allowed to collect funds locally.
- » Restrictions imposed on Dubai Banking operations.
- » Some of the Zakat were distributed by the donors directly to the beneficiaries or given to the chapters in kind, due to various constraints posed by countries in some regions.

For the year 2017 similar to previous years the Zakat collections are tilted towards Ramadan. This continues to be a challenge and we request the Chapters to get this unevenness sorted by pushing for collection throughout the year and not wait till Ramadan.

Unlike previous years we have considered only the Zakat collection or distribution pertaining to the financial year 2017. The collections of pledges or commitments for this year is closed by the 31st December 2017. This is to be in line with the WMO accounting policies and best practices around the world.

We commend Africa Chapter for their collection which has contributed over 30% of the total collections and Far East chapter for contributing \$169,000 in excess of their commitment for the year 2017. Pakistan contribution has dropped by \$300,000 compared to the previous year collection. India has failed to collect the committed amount in its entirety due to their change in Management and FCRA restrictions.



Zakat Disbursements

Main Zakat Disbursement by the WMO, continues to be in India and Pakistan, for education and housing projects.



52% of the global Zakat was utilized for Education as the foremost activity, out of which around 41% was for Pakistan chapter Education, supporting more than 10,000 students from Primary to Tertiary education. This year the Zakat utilization for housing both in India and Pakistan was 17% of the total Zakat spent.

Africa Chapter have spent 75% of their collections on local projects such as Widows and Orphan Help, Education, Bursary, Medical etc.. Middle East spent their local collection on the local welfare projects such as loan settlements and Ramadan Appeals.

Far East Chapter collection was used for supporting Ummeed Foundation, a school for Special Children in India.

International Ladies Wing have contributed \$18,642 for Medical Projects in India during the year 2017, remitting the funds through the Centre. Whereas the Chapter wise Ladies Wing has also been involved in many projects through the Chapters.

We have endeavored to distribute all Zakat Collected within one Calendar year is as required by Sharia.

Zakat Disbursement Process

- The Chapters requesting Zakat from the Central Fund has to send the prescribed Zakat Requisition Form to the AFZ committee detailing the project outcomes and the fund contribution from the locally and the requirement from the center.
- The chapter has to send a report on the utilization of previous Zakat received from center
- The Zakat requisition has to be based on the Budget sent by the chapters to the MC at the

- beginning of the year.
- The AFZ committee members will receive recommendation report from the COO along with the summarized details of the usage and requisition.
- AFZ committee then resolve on the approval or rejection of the sanction of Zakat to the chapter.
- If approved, the funds are remitted via EFT to the relevant chapter, from UK or Dubai.

Zakat Commitments for 2018

The Zakat commitments for 2018 was agreed at the same level as 2017, i.e. \$4.4M at the Board of Trustee meeting held on 07th October 2017 at Ras Al Khaimah, UAE.

The disbursement policy will remain unchanged with contribution to be project specific as the donors wish to, provided the contribution is routed through a Chapter and not direct to any project/ 3rd party organization. Education will remain the main priority and serve to the community;

It is with pleasure that I present the Investment Committee Report for the Year 2017. I would like to place on record my sincere appreciation to my fellow Committee Members for their support and enthusiasm in carrying out our task.

The source of funds for WMO Investments has been the Trustee Fees, Donations and Profit earned on these funds.

Alhamdulillah! Our total funds invested stands at over US\$ 5.7M, a significant sum which will ensure the future success of our organization and help in realizing our moto "Serving Mankind". Our gratitude to our Trustees, Patrons, Members and Donors who made this possible.

WMO Investment can be divided into the following Investment Classes;

- 1. Property
- 2. Equity
- 3. Bank Deposits
- 4. Funds

PROPERTY

This consists of the largest asset class and represents 55% of the total investment portfolio of WMO. The property portfolio is the investments in International City in Dubai, UAE in residential and commercial properties, giving monthly cash returns by way of rentals.

International City Dubai, UAE

Properties in Dubai, which consist of 14 Apartment and 16 Shops, are been strictly monitored and reported on an efficient and timely manner. 19 properties are registered in the name of Trustee Ismail A Gadit in trust for WMO and 11 properties are registered directly in WMO name. 3 of the 30 properties were donated to WMO by a Well Wisher with the income from these properties to be considered as Zakat. The Income from the rest of the 27 Properties is used for the Expenditure of the WMO at the Central level.

The rental income revenue from these properties has declined by 5% in 2017. There were few issues with tenants of commercial property, and the drop in the Dubai property market contributed towards this decline. Leisure Homes manages the Properties on behalf of WMO free of charge with the support of the Middle East Office Bearers

In the year 2017, the value of the properties in Dubai remained similar to that of previous year at US\$ 3,110,545. The fair market value hinges upon the Dubai real estate market conditions.


The Investment Committee is closely monitoring the Dubai property market and will make this decision at the right time.

Africa

Africa Chapter had 2 properties in its portfolio, both being Donations from WMO Trustees. Out of which one property was disposed during the year 2017, and one property remains out of the books.

Claudius Property:

Donated by Trustee Sayed Mia. This property was sold in March 2017 for ZAR 3,000,000 (\$ 230,800). The proceeds were invested in Sukuks along with other chapter funds of ZAR 1,000,000.

Erasmia Property, Laudium Site

Donated by Trustee Haroon Karim. This property has received approval in principle for the site to be developed as an institution. And currently, rezoning remains to be done and thereafter transfer to WMO name, which will enable us to book it in the Africa Chapter Balance Sheet.

Investment in Equity Market

African chapter is continuing to make investments in the equity market selectively within the permissible territory utilizing the Trustee Funds. At the beginning of the year there were 12 different share portfolios, which was reduced to one Share, i.e. 'Naspers'. The realized loss on sale of these shares amounted to \$ 31,000 The investments in shares earned \$6,200 as dividends during the year, resulting in a net loss of \$24,800

The total cost of the investments up to December 2017 was US\$ 220,837

Bank Deposits

A) Trustee Funds

i. Sri Lanka

Trustees' funds of \$ 750,000 from Dubai Bank Account was invested in Amana Bank Sri Lanka, as these funds were not earning any returns for the past few years in Dubai. Amana Bank gives a return of 3.2% per annum on average (this is invested in US\$) and the tenure is 12months with a rollover option.

Far East Chapter trustee funds as at 31st December 2017 amounting to \$ 157,900 (LKR 24,000,000) was invested in the form of Fixed Deposit at Amana Bank. This earns a LKR profit return of 9-10% per annum. The total return for the year 2017 from this fund was \$ 14,210.

B) Education Endowment Funds

i. MH OMAR Education Fund - Far East Chapter

This fund of US\$ 1 million, was invested in LKR Fixed Deposit at Muslim Commercial Bank (MCB), earning a return over 10% per annum. \$330,000 from this education fund was donated to Al Hussain Hameed School in Colombo to partly fund the acquisition of land for school expansion.. The return on this investment in 2017 was \$ 57,800. The return earned from these investments are utilized for education projects in Sri Lanka and the balance is placed in income earning deposits with the bank. Balance fund available at the end of year 2017 is \$ 670,000

ii. Education Endowment Fund - Pakistan Chapter

As of Dec'17 the fund had an accumulated balance of \$ 255,000/- (PKR 28,052,052) and these funds were invested in the forms of TDR. The returns earned through the deposits on average ranges from 5-8% per annum.

The main purpose of this fund to provide non-zakat financial assistance/scholarship to the needy white-collared students in Pakistan. However to date the Chapter has not commenced the scholarship

scheme and the returns are reinvested in short term investments

Mutual Funds - Pakistan Chapter

A sum of PKR 20mn (US\$ 190,476) was invested in Meezan Islamic Fund and NAFA Funds (Mutual Funds). These are Islamic funds, where the rate of return ranges from 8-10%.

The fall in value of the Mutual Fund has resulted in an unrealized loss of \$41,655/ for the year 2017

Report for the Year 2017

It is with pleasure that I present the Legal and Compliance Committee Annual Report for 2017 and convey my sincere appreciation and thanks to my Committee member for his unwavering support.

Constitution

A serious flaw in the Constitution with regard to the representation of Youth in WMO was corrected with an amendment approved at the 15th AGAM held at Ras Al Khaimah, UAE. With this amendment a complete new "Global Youth Wing" structure was introduced to the WMO which has a proper legal structure to empower the Youth in the Community and make them future stakeholders of WMO. My fellow Trustee and Committee Member Bashir Sattar was instrumental in introducing these amendments and played a very key role in drafting the amendments with the assistance of our legal Counsel Mr Ahmed Thompson.

The Amended Constitution and the By Laws were thereafter filed with the UK Charity Commission as required by law. These were approved in July 2018 and have since come into effect.

As reported previously the merger of WMO and WMO CF had been concluded in 2015, however the dissolution of WMO post merger is still pending the transfer of WMO PC license from WMO to WMO CF with the relevant local authorities.

Standing Orders

Amendments to the Standing Orders approved at the 15th AGAM were filed with the Charity Commission through the WMO Legal Counsel and approved by the Charity Commission.

Chapter Updates

- » Africa Chapter No Legal or Compliance issues
- » Europe Chapter Part of the Main body and no legal or Compliance issues
- » Far East No Legal or Compliance Issues
- » India Chapter Split of India Chapter as passed at the 15th AGAM was effected and thereafter 2 Chapters namely North India (NIC) and South India (SIC) were created. India Chapter local registration was transferred to NIC and new legal entity was registered under the Society Ordinance for South India. Both NIC & SIC Constitution compliance with Main Body is pending legal issues to be resolved.
- » Middle East Concerns raised by the local authority "International Humanitarian City – IHC" with regard to Investment Activities as a registered Charity. This resulted in the limitation of Banking functions of the Charity. However, after a prolong discussion the Banking functions were restored in Aug'18 limiting to local activities only.
- » North America and Canada No legal or Compliance issues
- » Pakistan Chapter No legal or Compliance issues

Constitution Compliance

While the overall compliance to the Constitution and Standing Orders is satisfactory considering the diversity within the chapters the concerns raised in the last Legal and Compliance Com Report of 2016 still remain, namely familiarity of the Regional Office Bearers and Board Members with the Provisions of the Constitution and Standing Orders. The New RMC Members may have not got themselves updated with the Constitution and there is a lot of room for improvement in this regard.

One area of concern is the implementation of the Policies. These Policies were developed over 4 years ago with the assistance of KPMG South Africa but remain un-implemented in all chapters and this matter needs to be addressed once and for all by all chapters.

My sincere appreciation to my fellow Committee Member Bashir Sattar Bha for all his support and commitment to carry out our task. In conclusion, I wish to place on record the appreciation of my committee to all the Office Bearers and the Regional Management Committee Members for their support and corporation to carry out our duties

"The Memon":

A monthly e-magazine is published to highlight the prominent, global Memon personalities and update ongoing activities and projects across all Chapters of WMO. The Inaugural issue was launched on April 15, 2016, since then 22 editions were published till 2017. Distinguished Humanitarians and Doyens of Industry such as Mr. Abdul Satar Dada, Mr. Solly Noor, Mr. Haroon Karim, Mr. Iqbal Sacranie, Mr. Yunus Suleman, Mr. Ashraf Sattar, Mr. Nowsad Gani, Mr. Gulaam Abdoola, among others have shared the Cover with the Honourable Abdul Sattar Edhi.

Over the years the popularity of the Magazine has grown by leaps and bounds. The cover has become one of the most coveted spaces, with many distinguished Memon personalities aspiring to grace the Cover. We are very humbled with the response and it's our constant endeavour to make each edition better than the last.

A resolution was made at the end of the year that henceforth causes and projects would be highlighted, rather than personalities on the cover, beginning with the Rohingya crisis as the first cover of 2018.

WMO Video:

This visual medium was extensively used in the year 2016 and much emphasis was given to short videos documenting the pertinent causes and WMO projects throughout 2017. A number of videos were made as teasers for The Memon magazine including a special one for the ladies' edition. A number of live interviews were shot on Facebook during the AGM of prominent members of the organisation.

The membership video was a grand success too with an overwhelming response to membership across chanters

The important causes of education, housing and humanitarian aid were highlighted extensively through 3 short documentaries in the year 2017. They made their debut at the inaugural South India Chapter launch in Bangalore followed by various local AGMs of the individual chapters and were played extensively at WMO CF AGM in Ras Al Khaimah, UAE.

In 2017 we had a total of 884 app downloads. Top app users are from India (2410 sessions) and Sri Lanka (1497 sessions) followed by UK (1371 sessions), South Africa (956 sessions), Pakistan (695 sessions), United Arab Emirates (563 sessions) and United States (326 sessions)

Membership and Contributions

Allowing easy transfer of funds for increased membership and contributions by allowing electronic transfers courtesy of Braintree/PayPal on the App as well as the website.

Alhamdulillah there is a substantial improvement in the Membership Numbers overall (Approx. 21%), 1,212 Members. SIC chapter inclusion is the main contributor to this development. But this could be double in numbers given the Memon community enrichment in the regions.

A major impact in the numbers is, a considerable number of long standing members in arrears were removed from the Membership register. Africa recording a negative growth due to this. Otherwise the actual growth would have been 235 amounting to a 23% increase

The majority of the growth have been in the Annual and Life Members category, which have increased by around 180 with new members from North India and South India. Also there is an increase in Global Youth Wing members after GYW being launched in October 2017

During the year, 17 Trustees and Patrons were removed from the Register due to long outstanding of their subscriptions. Also the irregularities in the Patron member category also been sorted during the year 2017.

Strategy - 2018 and Beyond

The below Strategies for the Membership development need to be implemented for 2018 and beyond. The new management committees appointed at the Regions and at the Center, need to make Membership Development a Priority and implement these Strategies to double the Members by end of 2018.

- Convert the "Friends of WMO" into Annual or Life Members: This needs to be done by personal engagement of the Office Bearers or Membership Development Committees at the Chapters.
- Accepting the Online Applicants as members:
 As shown in the below schedules there is a surge in Online Applications after the AGAM. These are low hanging fruits which are ripe for plucking if a little attention and efforts is made in this area

- 3. Increase in Youth participation: The Number of Youth within WMO is very few, and this is both a big concern and also another big opportunity. Global Youth Wing under Bashir Sattar Bha is planning out comprehensive program for the engagement of Memon Youth at Chapter and Global Level and the RMC's need to support and encourage the GYW Projects to increase the youth participation in WMO.
- 4. Capitalizing the B2B Conference: Make maximum use of the interest in WMO post "Memon B2B Conference" to attract high profile Young Memon's to join WMO
- New Blood from New Chapters: North America, North India and South India, the three (3) new Chapters starting from a low base have the potential to get new blood which has hereto not been exposed to WMO. RMC's in these 3 Chapters

- need to engage with the community and take the message of WMO in to these regions to build a large membership
- With the change in the Zakat Policy from 2017: Use this as a tool to attract new Donors to WMO and thereafter convert these donors to Members.
- 7. Conduct Road Shows Globally: Spread the net wider globally, this especially needs to be done by Africa (Malawi, Kenya, Zimbabwe etc.), Europe (Portugal & Scotland) and Far East (Bangladesh, Myanmar, and Malaysia). There have been commitments in the past by the respective RMCs to travel to these regions and conduct road shows, but so far action has been insufficient.

We propose the VPs to spear head the Membership development campaign and Chairman of membership development committee will also take part in the road shows if requested by the Chapters. This way we could cover most part of the world where Memon communities are living and tap new members to WMO. We believe, that we should portray what WMO stands for and works for and this message needs to be conveyed globally, by presenting our past projects and achievements and future projects and the WMO visions must be spoken of.
