

ITEM 1: RECITATION OF FEW VERSES FROM THE HOLY QURAN

The Meeting called to order by WMO President Mr Suliman Noor Mahomed at 3.00PM and followed by recital of a Quirath by Hafez Abubaker.

ITEM 2: WELCOME ADDRESS BY THE PRESIDENT

Welcoming all. President Mr Suliman Noor Mahomed thanked everyone for their presence and specifically thanked Mr Iqbal Dawood and the Middle East RMC for hosting the AGAM and Mr Haroon Karim and the Board of Trustees and Mr Nowsad Gani and the rest of the Office Bearers for their presence and support during past 2 days.

The participation at this AGAM is the largest ever with a large delegation from USA & Canada and participants from Indonesia, Portugal and Lesotho. The 5 Founders of WMO must be very happy with the progress in the past 13 years. Speaking further he stated the Office Bearers are a great team working together to make a difference in the WMO and he is blessed to have such a team to work with.

The Memon community is blessed, but yet 60% of the Global Memon Community is living on less than \$1/day and WMO can and must make the difference. WMO through Education, Vocational Training, Housing, Orphan/Widow funds, Medical etc. is touching thousands of Memon lives across the globe and serving Mankind, but more has to be done.

The Audit and Finance Committee has done a wonderful job in getting the finances of the organisation streamlined and on One Single Accounting Platform. The Global Balance Sheet is a great achievement after 12 years of existence, and now WMO is self-sufficient and we can manage our expenses with the return on investments.

Legal and Compliance has improved tremendously with few more issues to be resolved.

"The Memon" has given a global exposure to WMO like never before and Zubair and his team in the Marketing and Communication Committee has done wonders for the WMO image internationally.

The Membership Development Committee has implemented a cloud based Membership Database and now the global membership status is available real time at the touch of a button. However more needs to be done to enrol new blood into WMO.

The Ladies Wing performance has to be further improved. The Youth Wing performance has improved since Mr Yunus Suleman started guiding them.

Thereafter a very visibly emotional President called upon Dr Taheera from South Africa to address the audience on her Life Journey.

Addressing the audience, emotional Dr Taheera spoke of her life journey in South Africa from Poverty and Discrimination to a position of success and peer recognition due to her hard work, persistence, courage and self-belief. The support and encouragement of her family, friends and her Memon financial benefactors who stood by her and believed in her enabled her to carry forward with her dreams and stand where she is today.

Board of Trustee Chairman recognized a New Life Member from Saudi Arabia. He stated the message from Suliman Noor Mahomed will inspire others to join WMO and serve Mankind as was amply demonstrated by Dr Taheera.

ITEM 3: TO RECEIVE AND APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE 13TH AGAM

The minutes being circulated with the Annual Report was considered read. There being no amendments the minutes was proposed by Mr Pir Mohamed Kaliya and seconded by Mr Moosa Carrim.

ITEM 4: TO RECEIVE AND APPROVE THE REPORT FOR WMO PRESENTED BY THE SECRETARY GENERAL MR SHOAIB ISMAIL MANGRORIA

The report circulated was considered read and was unanimously adopted and approved by the House.

ITEM 5: TO RECEIVE AND APPROVE THE AUDITED ACCOUNTS OF WMO FOR FINANCIAL YEAR ENDING 31ST DEC 2015 PRESENTED BY TREASURER MR. YUNUS SULEMAN

Presenting the financials, the Treasurer explained there are 2 sets of Accounts circulated with the Annual Report.

- Consolidated Accounts These accounts consist of WMO Europe, WMO Middle East, WMO Pakistan and WMO Charitable Foundation, This is the first time in history Consolidated Accounts are being presented of WMO.
- 2. Compiled Accounts These consist of the Consolidated Accounts and WMO Africa and WMO Far East Audited Accounts. Africa and Far East can't be consolidated since these are separate legal entities.

To a question from the audience, why a Charity should be having Investment Properties, the Treasurer explained, the rental income from the Investment Properties pays the operational expenses of WMO. It is very important for WMO to be independent and self-sufficient as a charity. This also ensures the Zakat and other donations we receive as an organization is not used on overhead and expenses.

Answering a question from Mr Feizul Ayob on the expenses of over US\$ 850,000, he explained that the majority of this expense is the salaries and operational expenses of MITI which has a staff of 226 and WMO Pakistan which has a staff of 25.

Mr Muhammed Rafeek Noorani questioned about the use of US\$1.0M donated by Trustee M.H. Omar at the last AGAM. COO Mr Shahid Sangani explained this money is deposited with a Sharia Compliant Savings Account in Sri Lanka and as per the wishes of Mr M.H. Omar will be used for the development of Darussalam Maha Vidyalaya in Colombo, Sri Lanka. The Master Plan for the development of the school is been finalized by Far East Chapter with the Ministry of Education in Sri Lanka and once the plans are finalized the money will be used for this purpose.

Mr Khamisani from USA sought clarification why there is cash in hand of \$ 2.0M and why no returns are earned on these cash. COO explained Zakat funds are not invested and maintained in current accounts. However the MH Omar Donation was received just before the financial year end and these funds were deposited in a Savings Account after the financial year end earning a Rupee Return of about 10%. On further question on the profit mark up, COO explained this amount varies from a country to country and we are earning anything between 5-10%. He further explained Trustee Fee is classified as Investment Property and Income from these investments are used for expenses. All Zakat and Donations are maintained in Current Accounts.

Ms Aysha Anwer enquired if all Investment Properties are in the name of WMO, to which Mr Yunus Suleman explained

only 14 out of 30 properties in Dubai are under WMO name and the Balance 16 properties are held by Trustee Mr Ismail Gadit in trust for WMO due to prevailing law of Dubai which does not permit charities to hold investment assets in UAE.

Sir Iqbal Sacranie queried if any expense for Office Bearers and RMC meetings are paid from WMO funds which the treasurer responded in negative.

Thereafter the treasurer requested any further questions to be taken off line and for the Consolidated and Compiled Accounts to be proposed and seconded by the house.

The Consolidated Accounts were proposed by Mr Ashraf Shabdia and seconded by Mr Ahmed Shaikhani.

The Compiled Accounts were proposed by Mr Pir Mohamed Kaliya and seconded by Dr Haroon Gutta.

ITEM 6: WMO BUDGET FOR 2017

Chairman Audit, Finance and Zakat Committee Mr Gulaam Abdoola first thanked his fellow committee members Mr Haroon Karim, Mr Yunus Suleman and Mr Farook Kassim for their support to carry out the mandate of the committee. The Accounts in the Chapters are presented in their local currencies but the consolidation is done in US\$ and this creates fluctuations in values of investment, income and expenses due to exchange rates.

The Zakat collection has been growing over the past few years, but it has been very difficult to collect. However the needs are growing faster than the collection and if we are to care for our people and serve mankind, we need to collect lot more. In the past the majority of the collection was given to specific projects in India and Pakistan. However, some donors were not happy with this arrangement as they wanted to know on what projects their Zakat is spent. Hence from 2017, Chapter must present specific Zakat projects with details for Zakat allocation and donor will have the option to pick what projects their funds will go. Zakat Committee will permit specific contribution provided the funds are routed through WMO. In future "The Memon" will feature specific Zakat Projects.

Answering Mr Muhammed Rafeek Noorani on how Zakat will be disbursed. Mr Abdoola stated that all Chapters will have to submit their Zakat Projects to the Office Bearers for their approval. Once the Office Bearers have approved the project in principal then the Zakat Committee will thereafter allocate and disburse the funds based on the donors' request and availability. A process for this system will be introduced soon. Mr Farooq Ahmed suggested looking beyond Zakat and to Sadqa projects. Sponsorship of Water Well projects by his family through WMO PC was one such example and in future his family is prepared to support more such projects if WMO can identify and sanction such projects. Mr H.M. Shahzad VP for WMP PC agreed to submit a report on the Water Well Project.

Presenting the Budget, Mr Abdoola stated, there might not be a surplus in 2017 if the new Regional General Managers are hired, and B2B and The Memon Awards are implemented, but under no circumstance the Capital will be used for expenses.

The Budget for 2017 was thereafter proposed by Mr Ashraf Sabdia and seconded by Mr Haroon Joosub.

ITEM 7: APPOINTMENT OF AUDITORS

The present auditors have consented to continue as the Auditors for 2016 and this was proposed by Mr Rashid Godil and seconded by Mr Pir Mohamed Kaliya.

ITEM 8: ANY OTHER BUSINESS

President Mr Suliman Noor Mahomed called up on all the 6 Sub Committee Members, the Chapter Vice Presidents,

Regional Assistant Secretaries, Regional Treasurers and the International Ladies Wing and Youth Wing Members to the podium and requested the COO Mr Shahid Sangani to introduce each one of them to the house.

Thereafter Mr Qadir Usman of Pakistan made a request for the reduction of Patron Fee to US\$ 10,000/ from the current US\$ 25,000/. The same request has been made to the Pakistan RMC and the RMC has forwarded the request to the Office bearers. However a change in the Fee can only be done at a General Meeting with 8 weeks notification hence could not be accommodated at this AGAM, however this proposal will be considered and put to the house at the next AGAM.

Mr Bilal Moti stated this is his first interaction with WMO and he was very impressed. He asked what targeted efforts are made to get successful businessmen around the globe and the elite to join WMO and contribute to the WMO Journey. In reply the President stated, globally over 40 such people have been contacted by him personally and he is in constant touch with them and lot of them will join WMO once we become 100% compliant. In future we are expecting lot of people of influence to join WMO. Mr Sikander Sattar Head of KPMG in Portugal who was in the audience was recognised as one such person and he stated there are more to follow. Mr Yunus Suleman requested Mr Moti to connect WMO to people he knows and reach out.

Mr Hanif from Pakistan inquired about the future of "Education for All" program in Pakistan. There is an issue of on time payment of School fees, and this is creating a very bad image of WMO in Pakistan in addition to very adverse impact on children's education and requested the issues be resolved soon. Mr Suliman Noor Mahomed in reply stated that the Office Bearers can't go to bed for a peaceful sleep knowing thousands of our children in Pakistan may be deprived of education and are working closely with the PC Official to resolve all pending issues. Mr H.M. Shahzad and Mr Pir Mohamed Kaliya have assured to resolve all pending matters and become 100% compliant in the next 3 months and InshaAllah thereafter all should run smoothly.

A delegate from Pakistan requested to have a Memon Job drive and all Memon Business to give first priority to recruit Memons, create a Memon Business directory and post vacancies. In reply the President stated the planned B2B Conference next year will help in this matter and we will also look at the Business Directory suggestion in the future.

Mr Ahamed Shaikhani, stated there are two new Trustees joining WMO this year. Last year there were 2 new Trustees and in total there are 62 Trustees in 14 years, this is a good achievement.

Mrs Raziya Chasmawala made a plea to all Memons to reduce the amount of money spent in marriage functions and give part of this money to poor girls' marriages. Already one family in India has agreed to her request and gave US\$ 4.500/ for this cause and more have agreed to do so in future. She requested this to be done across all chapters. Also the contribution of the Woman in WMO needs to be acknowledged and applauded.

Thereafter the President called upon Deputy President Mr Nowsad Gani to deliver the closing remarks. Mr Gani speaking in Memoni requested the support and guidance of all to build WMO and thanked the host Middle East Chapter for a Wonderful job done.

Mr Haroon Karim, Chairman Board of Trustees announced 4 New Trustees and 1 new Patron have joined WMO, namely Ms Fazila Ismail, Mr Arif Lakhani, Mr Tanvir Merchant and Mr Abdul Azeez as Trustees and Mr Kamran Gani as a Patron.

Mr Pir Mohamed Kaliya proposed a Vote of Thanks to the Chair from the Members and thereafter the AGAM concluded with Dua by Hafez Abubaker.

We have been able to help people in very far-off places and have provided instant help, especially during times of natural disasters and communal unrests. But we have to groom ourselves to deliver even better. Dear brothers and sisters, we have in these meetings, many guests who have come from different countries and from a variety of backgrounds. I humbly appeal to all people present here that the need of the hour is UNITY. We need unity in spirit and we need unity in pooling of our resources. We can do a lot more if we are united and work as one force. I appeal to all people present here that UNITY is what we all need. Let us resolve today in our hearts that we are one, that we are united. May Almighty Allah help us all. Ameen.

Coming to the Report of WMO for the year 2016, I wish to state that, Alhamdulillah, by the Grace of Almighty Allah, the WMO has had a very successful year at the Centre as well as at all the Regional Chapters namely Pakistan, India, Far East, Middle East, Africa, Europe and America & Canada.

The last AGAM (I4th) which was held in Dubai on 29th October 2016 had the largest participation ever with so many delegates coming from different countries, especially from the USA and Canada. Delegates from remote countries like Indonesia, Portugal and Lesotho were also present. This type of active participation clearly indicates that the Memons everywhere support the mission of WMO and support the role played by WMO as a global unifying body of the Memons living around the world.

Like any other corporate body or non-profit organization of international standards and repute, the WMO is trying to maintain high standards of governance, enforce checks and balances, ensure transparency and be fully accountable to its members, donors and well-wishers. For this purpose, WMO constantly reviews its Governing Documents, Policies & Procedures, Accounting Standards and other Rules & Regulations so that all Chapters maintain international standards of governance and welfare services.

At WMO, it is very important to us all that everybody concerned with WMO should always retain a high level of trust and confidence in the activities and performance of WMO and all its Regional Chapters. Whether they are the donors, wellwishers, the members of WMO, the concerned government authorities, the beneficiaries or the general public, all of them must have a high level of confidence in WMO.

The needy people should always find WMO a reliable source of consolation and financial assistance whenever they need any of the services provided by WMO. The WMO is trying to monitor the positive change it is bringing among the masses by regular interaction and follow-up with the beneficiaries. The WMO is trying to maintain a healthy P2P relationship with the poor and needy.

The WMO is trying to be at par with other international NGOs. And for this, it is always studying ways and means to improve its internal functioning and quality of service so that it can be considered as one of the leading NGOs of the world. InshaAllah.

Each Chapter of WMO has submitted a detailed Report of their Performance during 2016. These Reports are all found in the Consolidated Performance of Report of WMO 2016. However, I will briefly present the highlights of each Chapter's activities.

Africa Chapter

The Africa Chapter has had a very active Membership Drive with 17 new life members and 1 new Annual Member joining WMO during the year 2016. Besides, a lady member upgraded her Patronship to Trusteeship. Masha Allah.

Among its social welfare services, the WMO Africa Chapter offers Monthly Financial Assistance and Medical Assistance to the needy people. During Ramadan 2016, the Chapter made arrangements for distribution of daily Iftar, clothing, groceries and food hampers. The Chapter continues to distribute Wheel Chairs in Gauteng, Durban, Natal and Pretoria. Some social gatherings and dinners were also organized during the year under review.

During the year 2016, the Ladies Wing of Africa Chapter engaged in distribution of water during the water crises in KZN, assisted the Xenophobia Victims both with cash and kind. They also held the Annual Pamper Day for the Elderly, distributed burkahs to madressah girls, distributed gifts to cancer patients on Cancer Day, distributed warm winter blankets, arranged school feeding and many other activities. The Youth Wing organized the Africa Chapter Youth Symposium and also partnered with the Ladies Wing to jointly arrange the Wonder of Women (WOW) Program.

Europe Chapter

The WMO Europe Chapter is providing free legal counselling services for housing, family disputes, immigration and other matters. It also provides financial assistance for healthcare and funeral expenses. The Memon Connection Service, run by the Ladies Wing, introduces Memon families to find suitable matches for their children.

The Youth Wing of Europe Chapter is very active and generally works in collaboration with Youth Wings of Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester. It arranges meetings, gatherings, lunches and other social events on regular basis both in London and Leicester. It organizes weekly indoor and outdoor sports activities and training sessions, especially for cricket, volleyball, basketball, football and badminton.

The Ladies Wing of Europe Chapter is also very active and organizes various charity events. They have raised sizable amounts for different projects in India, Malawi, Syria and Nepal. The Office Bearers of Europe Chapter will be providing the details in their Report.

Far East Chapter

The Chapter has been actively campaigning for new members and Alhamdulillah its Membership Database has seen a significant increase.

One important project at the WMO Far East Chapter is the Micro Finance Loan scheme, which has already supported small-scale 50 to 60 Memon entrepreneurs. WMO Far Chapter is also providing various types of support at the Darussalam Maha Vidyalaya (DMV) Project which includes daily breakfast for needy students, extra classes for students and supporting of sports activities. WMO FC had also under taken to develop the Infrastructure of the school with a total estimated cost of \$ 1.6mn over period of 2-3 years. The Master plan is to provide 39 classrooms, auditorium, science lab, library, and with other amenities.

The Youth Wing is very active in this chapter also. They organized a Futsal tournament for the Memon youth wherein 8 teams participated. A debate competition was held by the Youth Wing.

The Ladies Wing of the Far East Chapter organized Women Empowerment Programs, a luncheon, workshops and fundraisers.

After the cyclone in Sri Lanka on 15th May 2016, about 250 Memon houses and 500 Memon families were severely

affected with most houses submerged in water up to 8 feet. The WMO Far East Chapter in collaboration with Memon Association of Sri Lanka (MASL) stepped forward immediately with a relief program for those affected. WMO FC is contributing LKR 46 million, which is over 50% of the rehabilitation program, Masha Allah. The Vice President of the Chapter will soon give you more details.

India Chapter

The WMO India Chapter was incorporated in India under the Companies Act in the year 2014. The Chapter has got a growing membership database, Masha Allah, with frequent Membership efforts organized by the Chapter.

The Youth Wing of India Chapter is also very active and had organized Medical Camps, Free Books Distribution Camps, Food distribution in the month of Ramadan, Monsoon Relief Initiative and Memon Premier League India.

The Ladies Wing of WMOIC has also been active and has organized a Skill Development Workshop and distribution of Ration to the poor.

Middle East Chapter

The Middle East Chapter is very keen to help the needy Memon workers and their families who come to the UAE for employment and better life. The Chapter serves the Memon families under the following categories: Housing, Education, Medical Aid, Visa Disputes, Jobs Replacement and other kinds of help. The Chapter held many get-togethers, lunches, dinners and even breakfast programs for better networking and socializing with key Memon personalities.

The Youth Wing of Middle East Chapter organized during the year - a Quran Recitation Competition, a Workshop on Time Management and the first ever Dubai Youth Conference, the Chazi Vahedna Sports Festival and the Memon Bowling Championship 2016 Season 4.

The Ladies Wing of the Chapter organized One Dish Party, Get-Together & Lunch, Cultural Visit to Dubai Heritage Village, Family Picnic, Ramadan Iftars & fundraiser,

America & Canada Chapter

The WMO America & Canada Chapter is relatively a new chapter of WMO. But within a short span of time, they have achieved quite a lot. The Chapter has very aggressively campaigned for more Membership and it's membership database is steadily increasing. A team consisting of Mr. Ghaffar Variend, Mr. Bashir Akuly and Mr. Qasim Lawai recently made many visits to other cities in the USA and met with numerous Memon gentlemen and received very positive response from them regarding WMO.

The Chapter collected Zakat and amounting to USD 11,350 during the year 2016 whereas for the current year 2017, the collection has already crossed double the amount.

On behalf of WMO, I congratulate them for their excellent performance and wish them the very best for the future.

Pakistan Chapter

The WMO Pakistan Chapter has many major welfare projects. The Education for All and the Higher Education Projects cater to 11,500 school and college students with financial assistance. The Education Endowment Fund has been established to help students with non-Zakat funds. The Micro Finance Scheme provides interest free loans to small-scale Memon entrepreneurs and Rozgar Scheme provides Auto Rickshaws and Sewing Machines. Besides, the Rehabilitation Scheme provides financial assistance for housing and the Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI) provides quality technical and vocational training to students at nominal fees.

Masha Allah, the Youth Wing and the Ladies Wing of the Chapter are very active and dedicated to their work. The

Youth organized the Career Guidance Program and Think Wise Event during the year.

Dear brothers and sisters, as I mentioned at the beginning of my report, that the need of the hour at WMO is unity. It is the coming together of all Memon individuals, Memon Welfare Organizations and Memon Corporate Bodies to work together as one force.

Alhamdulillah, this trend can already be seen at various chapters of WMO, where other likeminded organizations are working with WMO such as in the Africa Chapter, the Europe Chapter and the Far East Chapter.

I do humbly request the corporate sector of the Memon Community to take more interest in the various projects of WMO everywhere in the world and try to implement their Corporate Social Responsibility by joining hands with WMO.

Thanks & Acknowledgement

In the end, I am grateful to the President of WMO, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Members of the Management Committee especially the ExCom and the Office Bearers, the heads of the seven Chapters of WMO, the Deputy Secretary General Mr. Mahmood Shaikhani, the COO and all members of WMO for their continuous support and encouragement to WMO, particularly in executing my duties as Secretary General. I sincerely thank the donors and well-wishers of WMO for their timely donations and Zakat due to which so many mega welfare projects are being run efficiently and effectively.

The Audited Accounts for Financial Year ended 31st December 2016 have been compiled and published for the 15th AGAM. The Audited Accounts have been compiled in view of Africa, Far East, India and America & Canada Chapters all being separate legal entities.

The Compilation is based on the following Audited Accounts.

- 1. Africa Chapter
- 2. America & Canada Chapter
- 3. Europe Chapter
- 4. Far East Chapter
- 5. India Chapter
- 6. Middle East Chapter
- 7. Pakistan Chapter

India and America & Canada Chapters have been included for the first time to the compilation.

I am happy to report that we have applied the Accounting policies consistently throughout the chapters in preparing the compiled financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2016. Also the Trustee Funds are now shown separately, by splitting the General Fund accounts of the chapters.

As per the compiled financials the Zakat collections for 2016 (\$4mn) was 60% more than that of the previous year. This is including the Zakat collections of the Indian Chapter, whereas this was not considered during the year 2015. The Zakat distributions (\$4.25mn), which is mainly focused on Education schemes for Pakistan and Housing for both India and Pakistan, was 75% higher when compared to previous year. This too is mainly due to the inclusion of Indian Chapter numbers to the compilation and Zakat activities within the local chapter sare shown as the specific Zakat projects. Local chapter specific Zakat includes the Sri Lankan Flood program and the African local activities such as medical and education. Iftar Camp in Dubai, Empowerment projects in India and Pakistan.

We have an Exchange loss of \$41,000 in the Europe Chapter due to the fall in value of GBP as an impact of Brexit.

During the year 2016, the collection of Trustee Fees has shown a reduction when compared to 2015, which was over US\$ 150,000. Despite the increase in number of members, we can observe a 30% decline in the collection of fees from other members.

The operating expenses are lower than 2015, but the nonmonetary expenses increased owing to the Pakistan Chapter writing off fixed assets and Memon Alam receivables.

The Fair value of the properties in Dubai and Pakistan are approximately same as at 31st December 2015, therefore Auditors have accepted the fair valuation of the investment properties done by a third party as of April 2016. In Dubai we continue to have a better rental income from the investment properties and we are thankful to Mr. Solly Dockrat and Leisure Homes for managing the portfolio for WMO free of charge in a very professional manner.

Investment and other Income has declined compared with previous year in which WMO FC had gains on AGAM & MPL sponsorships and Forex conversion.

We have continued to increase our portfolio in equity investments in African Chapter during the year. The total cost of the investments up to December 2016 was US\$ 192,313. This had a fall in value when marked to market, the fair value as at 31st December 2016 was US\$ 163,660 with an unrealized loss of US\$ 28,750. Total revenue from these share investments for the year was \$10,000. WMO has incurred a loss of \$ 4,891 on disposal of some of these investment during the year.

The significant cash and cash equivalents as at the balance sheet consists of mainly the unutilized Zakat funds of Pakistan, Europe and Middle East Chapters, which were fully utilized by March 2017. This also comprises of Far East chapter matured investment including its returns, which were reinvested during the year 2017.

World Memon Organisation's financial year 31st December 2016, ended with a Net Asset value of US\$ 7.7mn due to the reduction in fund accounts, and revenue deficit of US\$ 167,907 through the financial activities of the organization. The deficit is due to the fact that the brought forward Zakat for 2015 was disbursed during 2016.

The significant post balance sheet events is the sale of Claudius Property in Africa for \$ 219,780 and the receipts of 02 apartment in Dubai in lieu of Trustees fees \$246,500. It should also be noted that the short-term advances of \$193,000 was invested during January 2017 into long-term investments including mutual funds.

Alhamdulillah I also wish to highlight the progress in the following areas globally:

- » Trustee fund split from the General Funds
- » Implementation of consistent accounting policies and procedures;
- » Usage of a Common Accounting platform (SAGE) commenced and implemented throughout 2016 by all Chapters.
- » Submission of Chapter wise Quarterly Management accounts through SAGE from the 2nd Qtr. 2016
- » Preparation of Compilation Statements for WMO including all the 07 chapters.
- » All the chapter audits were completed within six months of the financial year end

Overall, a lot has been achieved since the last AGM and Insha Allah, this will lay a strong foundation for WMO to grow from strength to strength in a more transparent manner that will result in a significant increase in membership and Zakat collections in the future.

COMPILED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended 31st December 2016

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REPORT ON THE COMPILED FINANCIALS

We have compiled the accompanying statements of financial position of World Memon Organisation ("WMO") as of 31st December, 2016, and the related statements of comprehensive income, changes in equity, and cash flows for the years then ended.

The compilation was based on the audited financial statements of the below mentioned chapters, which were prepared and fairly presented in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standard for Small and Medium-sized Entities.

1. Accounting Policies

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entries (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by charities.

b) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.

c) Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where cost cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

d) Foreign Currency

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into dollar at the rates of exchange prevailing on the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the date of the transactions. All differences are taken to the statement of financial activities.

e) Financial Assets/Instruments

- **i. Held to Maturity:** These are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity that the chapter has the positive intention and ability to hold to maturity
- ii. Instruments Designated as available-forsale: Listed investments classified as available for sale. Financial assets are carried at fair value which is calculated by reference to the stock exchange closing prices at the balance sheet date

f) Bank Profit Receivable

Return on Investment/Bank profit share on funds held on deposits are included when receivable by the charity.

g) Fund Accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which include buildings and equipment necessary for the proper functioning of the charity and other funds available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the charity's objectives. Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. Restricted funds are funds which are subject to specific restrictions as imposed by the donor or nature of the appeal.

h) Shariah and Zakat donations

The WMO complies with Shariah law as provided in the Holy Quran and Sunnah.

g) Taxation

As a registered charity WMO is exempt from taxation of income and gains to the extent these are applied to charitable objectives.

1. Accounting Policies

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entries (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by charities.

b) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable. There is an inconsistency in the Income recognition where Middle East Zakat is not recognized in the Income Statement as per the regional practises all other Chapters these incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities whereas in MC these are recorded in the Fund Statement.

c) Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where cost cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Zakat expended from the Middle East chapter was not recorded in the Statement of Financial Activities, and hence inconsistency in treatment for the expenditure of the charity. Resources expended are recognised in the year in which they are incurred.

d) Foreign Currency

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into dollar at the rates of exchange prevailing on the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the date of the transactions. All differences are taken to the statement of financial activities.

e) Investments

Investments held as fixed assets are revalued at cash in value and net value at the balance sheet date and the gain or loss taken to the statement of financial activities.

f) Bank Profit Receivable

Return on Investment/Bank profit share on funds held on deposits are included when receivable by the charity.

g) Fund Accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which include buildings and equipment necessary for the proper functioning of the charity and other funds available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the charity's objectives. Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are subject to specific restrictions as imposed by the donor or nature of the appeal.

h) Shariah and Zakat donations

The WMO complies with Shariah law as provided in the Holy Quran and Sunnah.

i) Taxation

As a registered charity WMO is exempt from taxation of income and gains to the extent these are applied to charitable objectives.

It was my privilege to be appointed the Election Commissioner to hold election of Members to the Regional Management Committees (RMC) for the period 2017-2020. I thank the Management Committee for their confidence placed in me to conduct this very important function in WMO

Under the provisions of the Constitution, elections should be held every 3 years to elect the following number of members from each Chapter for their respective Regional Management Committees.

1.	Africa	5 Elect + 1 Lady
2.	America & Canada	5 Elect + 1 Lady
3.	Europe	5 Elect + 1 Lady
4.	Far East	5 Elect + 1 Lady
5.	India	10 Elect + 2 Lady
6.	Middle East	5 Elect + 1 Lady
7.	Pakistan	10 Elect + 2 Lady

However, since there was a proposal at the last AGAM to split India Chapter into two regions, the constitution amendment for this purpose is to be passed at the 15th AGAM. It was decided NOT to hold elections in India and the RMC members in North and South India Chapters are to be appointed by the Management Committee, subsequent to the amendments to the Constitution.

In the case of America & Canada, since the Chapter had just been activated and the total number of Members eligible to vote was small, it was decided NOT to hold elections for America & Canada Chapter and instead appoint members to the RMC through the Management Committee.

Under Articles 23.2.2. of the Constitution the following members were appointed by me as Regional Election Commissioners (REC) to assist me in the conduct of the Elections in respective Chapters.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

With reference to Articles 24.5.3(a), 24.5.5, 26.3(a)&(b), 35.1.3 and 46.2 of the current WMO Constitution dated the 28th January 2017, it is hereby proposed to make the following constitutional amendments to the WMO Constitution by way of a Special Resolution, to be made at the 15th Annual General Assembly Meeting of the WMO which is to be held on 7th October 2017 at Ras Al Khaima, UAE, insh'Allah:

[1.] To re-form the current single India Regional Chapter into two Regional Chapters - the Northern India Chapter and the Southern India Chapter:

Article 25.1.1

With reference to Article 7.27 above, the members of the General Assembly shall organise themselves worldwide by establishing Regional Chapters in the regions in which they reside, identified as follows:

- a. Pakistan;
- b. Northern India (all states except Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala and Tamil Nadu);
- c. Southern India (the states of Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala and Tamil Nadu);
- d. Southern Africa (south of the equator);
- e. Northern Africa (north of the equator);
- f. Europe;
- g. America and Canada;
- h. the Middle East;
- i. the Far East and Other Countries.

Article 25.2.3

Each RMC shall be composed of the following members:

- a. 10 Members plus 2 Lady Members from Pakistan;
- b. 10 Members plus 2 Lady Members from Northern India;
- c. 5 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Southern India;
- d. 5 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Southern Africa;
- e. 5 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Northern Africa;
- f. 5 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Europe;
- g. 5 Members plus 1 Lady Member from America and Canada;
- h. 5 Members plus 1 Lady Member from the Middle East;
- i. 5 Members plus 1 Lady Member from the Far East and Other Countries.

Article 25.4.1

With reference to Article 26 below, each RMC shall nominate the following numbers of its members to serve as elected members of the WMO Management Committee:

- a. 7 Members plus 2 Lady Members from Pakistan;
- b. 5 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Northern India;
- c. 3 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Southern India;
- d. 4 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Southern Africa:
- e. 4 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Northern Africa:
- f. 4 Members plus 1 Lady Member from Europe;
- g. 4 Members plus 1 Lady Member from America and Canada;
- h. 4 Members plus 1 Lady Member from the Middle East:
- i. 4 Members plus 1 Lady Member from the Far East and Other Countries.

Article 13.4.1

Any national umbrella organisation of the Memon community which is recognised under the relevant law of any country shall be eligible to become an Apex Member of the WMO by applying on the prescribed form to the MC. With reference to Article 24.1.1 below, there can only be 1 Apex Member per country, except that Pakistan and Northern India may have 2 Apex Members each and Southern India, Northern Africa and Southern Africa may have 1 Apex Member each.

Article 13.4.2

With reference to Article 24.1.2 below, any organisation accepted as an Apex Member shall be eligible to have up to 3 of its Memon representatives as voting representatives at any General Assembly Meeting of the WMO, except that a maximum of 6 voting representatives in total shall be permitted for Pakistan, and a maximum of 6 voting representatives in total shall be permitted for Northern India.

Article 24.1.2

With reference to Article 13.4.2 above, Apex Members shall be represented by a maximum of 3 representatives, except that a maximum of 6 voting representatives in total shall be permitted for Pakistan, and a maximum of 6 voting representatives in total shall be permitted for Northern India.

Article 25.5.1

With reference to Article 26.2.3 below, all Trustees and Patrons who reside in a particular region, together with 1 Apex Member representative (but 2 Apex Member representatives each in the case of Pakistan and Northern India) and 1 Co-opted Member, shall be the appointed members of the RMC of the Regional Chapter for that region and may be elected as an RMC Office Bearer.

[<u>Note:</u> Any changes to the Contents pages will be made as a final step once any agreed amendments have been inserted and typeset]

[2.] To promote greater involvement of young Memons in their community:

Article 7.10

to promote and recognise the importance of young Memons in particular by developing the WMO Global Youth Wing with a view to preserving and protecting their sense of the value of their Memon identity and encouraging their desire to become more deeply involved in furthering the objects of the WMO in order to enable them to participate more fully in the development of their families and the Memon community worldwide;

[Note: This means that the current Articles 7.10 - 7.28 are re-numbered as Articles 7.11 - 7.29 respectively]

Article 13.1.1

Subject to Articles 14–22 below, Membership of the WMO shall consist of the following nine categories: (a) Trustees:

- (f) Individual Annual Members;
- (g) Youth Members;
- (h) Associate Members;
- (i) Friends of the WMO.

Article 13.8 - Youth Members

13.8.1 Any Memon aged between 18 and 40 years shall be eligible to become a Youth Member of the WMO by applying on the prescribed form to the MC.

[<u>Note:</u> This means that the current Articles 13.8 and 13.9 are re-numbered as Articles 13.9 and 13.10 respectively]

Article 15 - Membership Fees

15.1 Each category of member, with the exception of Youth Members and Friends of the WMO, shall pay either an annual or a life subscription, within the prescribed period commencing from the date of approval of his or her application by the MC, to be fixed by the MC from time to time as set out in the WMO Standing Orders for the time being.

Article 16 - Rights of Members

16.3 All Youth Members shall be entitled to be heard, but not to vote or to stand for election, at any Regional Chapter Meeting or at any Ceneral Assembly Meeting of the WMO PROVIDED THAT they have been Youth Members of good standing for at least 365 continuous days.

16.4 With reference to Articles 15 above and 25.5.3 below, a Youth Member shall not be obliged to pay any subscription, but may only be elected as an RMC Office Bearer or MC Office Bearer PROVIDED THAT he or she has first become a fully paid up WMO Member and has fulfilled the requirements of Article 16.1(b)b above.

[Note: This means that the current Articles 16.3 - 16.6 are re-numbered as Articles 16.5 - 16.8 respectively]

Article 18 - Voting by Proxy and by Post:

18.1 All Trustees and Patrons, and all Apex and Institution Members (through their selected representatives), and all Individual Life Members and Individual Annual Members - but not Youth Members and not, subject to Article 13.8.5 above, Associate Members - whose respective subscriptions have been paid (including those whose subscription payments are not in arrears) shall be entitled to vote by proxy or by postal vote.

Article 23.1 - Organisation and Administration:

23.1 Subject to Article 12 above, the WMO shall have the following organisational and administrative elements:(a) The General Assembly

(b) Regional Management Committees ("RMCs")

- (c) The Management Committee ("the MC")
- (d) The Executive Committee ("the ExeCom")

(e) Global Youth Wing

(f) Specialist Committees

(g) The Board of Trustees ("the BOT")

Article 24.1 - Composition of the General Assembly:

24.1.1 With reference to Article 13 above, the General Assembly shall be comprised of the Trustees and Patrons of the WMO; the representatives of Apex Members (National Bodies), and Institution Members (Regional and Local Bodies); Individual Life Members and Individual Annual Members; Youth Members; and all Associate Members and Friends of the WMO who have been approved by the MC.

Article 25.5.2

With reference to Articles 26.2.3 and 31.10 below, the following members of the WMO Youth Wing, who shall be appointed by the Global Youth Chairman, shall also be included as appointed members of the RMC of the Regional Chapter for the region in which they reside: (a) Regional Youth Vice-Chairman; (b) 1 Regional Youth Executive.

Article 25.5.3

With reference to Article 16.4 above, any WMO Youth Wing Member who is a member of his or her RMC may only be elected as an RMC Office Bearer if he or she has first become a fully paid up WMO Member.

[Note: This means that the current Article 25.5.2 is renumbered as Article 25.5.4]

Article 26.2.3 - Appointed Members

With reference to Articles 13.2.8, 13.3.3, 25.5 and 25.6.2 above and to Articles 27.6 and 31.10.7 below, the Appointed Members of the MC shall include:

- (a) All Trustees of the WMO;
- (b) All Patrons of the WMO;
- (c) The Global Youth Chairman;
- (d) The Global Youth Secretary;

(e) Each Regional Youth Vice-Chairman of the WMO who has been appointed as a member of the RMC of the Regional Chapter in which he or she resides;
(f) Each Regional Youth Executive of the WMO who has been appointed as a member of the RMC of the

Article 27.1

The Executive Committee ("the ExeCom") shall consist of the following Office Bearers selected from and by the Members of the MC:

Regional Chapter in which he or she resides.

- (a) President;
- (b) Deputy President;
- (c) Secretary General;
- (d) Deputy Secretary General;
- (e) Treasurer;
- (f) Deputy Treasurer;
- (g) Regional Vice-Presidents, (1 from each region);
- (h) Regional Assistant Secretaries, (1 from each region);
- (i) Global Youth Chairman.

Article 27.6

Once his appointment has been confirmed by the MC, the Global Youth Chairman shall then appoint, in accordance with the procedures set out in the WMO Standing Orders, the Global Youth Secretary as an additional Office Bearer of the MC.

Article 27.7

As Members of the ExeCom, the Global Youth Chairman and Global Youth Secretary shall have the right to be heard and to vote.

Article 27.8

In the absence of the Global Youth Chairman and the Global Youth Secretary, the MC may appoint any of its members to perform the functions of the Global Youth Chairman and the Global Youth Secretary.

Article 31.10 - Global Youth Chairman:

The Global Youth Chairman of the WMO shall be responsible for promoting, organizing and co-ordinating worldwide the activities of the WMO Global Youth Wing and in accordance with the procedures set out in the WMO Standing Orders and Regulations for Regional Chapters, he shall in particular:

31.10.1 have the power to establish WMO Global Youth Wing administrative structures and projects at global, regional and local levels;

31.10.2 have the power to summon and convene meetings of the WMO Global Youth Wing wherever and whenever he considers it advisable or necessary;

31.10.3 preside over all meetings of the WMO Global Youth Wing;

31.10.4 in the event of there being an equality of votes, have a casting vote;

31.10.5 in consultation and agreement with the ExeCom, have the power to sanction and approve projects for WMO Youth Members run by WMO Youth Members in furtherance of the objects of the WMO;

31.10.6 in consultation and agreement with the ExeCom, have the power to incur expenditure up to a maximum limit as defined in the WMO Standing Orders for the time being without the prior sanction of the MC – but must account for any such expenditure to the MC at its next MC meeting;

31.10.7 with reference to Articles 25.5.2, 26.2.3 and 27.6 above and in consultation and agreement with the ExeCom, be responsible for appointing the following:

- (a) the Global Youth Secretary;
- (b) the Global Youth Treasurer;

(c) for each Regional Chapter, one Regional Youth Vice-Chairman to serve as an appointed member of the RMC of the Regional Chapter in which he or she resides and of the MC;

(d) for each Regional Chapter, one Regional Youth Executive to serve as an appointed member of the RMC of the Regional Chapter in which he or she resides and of the MC;

(e) for each Regional Chapter, as many additional Regional Youth Executives to serve as members of the Youth Wing of the region in which they reside as he considers advisable or necessary, up to the maximum permitted number set out in the Standing Orders;

31.10.8 encourage all members of the WMO Global Youth Wing to become fully involved

and integrate with the activities of the WMO at global, regional and local levels;

31.10.9 organise fund raising activities for the WMO Global Youth Wing at global, regional and local levels.

Article 31.11 - Global Youth Secretary:

The Global Youth Secretary of the WMO shall:

31.11.1 assist the Global Youth Chairman in discharging his duties;

31.11.2 in the absence of the Global Youth Chairman perform the functions of the Global Youth Chairman;

31.11.3 ensure compliance with the Constitution and with any current Rules and Standing Orders of the WMO as from time to time are in force;

31.11.4 carry out such functions as may be assigned to him or her by the Global Youth Chairman and/or the MC;

31.11.5 implement all the decisions of the General Assembly of the WMO and its MC, ExeCom and Global Youth Wing;

31.11.6 convene meetings of the Global Youth Wing;

31.11.7 record in English the minutes of all relevant meetings;

31.11.8 maintain a proper record of all correspondence exchanged between the Youth Wing and the Secretariat of the WMO and its Regional Chapters and its members and others;

31.11.9 prepare at the end of each financial year an Annual Report concerning the activities and progress of the WMO during that year for presentation at the next Annual General Meeting of the WMO.

Article 31.12 - Global Youth Treasurer:

The Global Youth Treasurer of the WMO shall be responsible for:

31.12.1 liaising with and assisting the WMO Treasurer, the WMO Deputy Treasurer and each Regional Assistant Treasurer in discharging their duties; **31.12.2** with reference to Article 31.10.9 above, ensuring that all proceeds from fund raising activities for the WMO Global Youth Wing organized by the Global Youth Chairman are deposited in a dedicated WMO Global Youth Wing bank account established, in consultation and agreement with the ExeCom, for this purpose;

31.12.3 ensuring that any expenditure from the WMO Global Youth Wing bank account is incurred in accordance with Article 31.10.6 above and that, with reference to

31.12.4 making payments in accordance with the decisions of the General Assembly and the MC and the ExeCom;

31.12.5 issuing official receipts for all sums received;

31.12.6 making any payments by cheque or electronic bank transfer;

31.12.7 maintaining proper books of account in English; **31.12.8** ensuring that the annual accounts for Global Youth Wing activities have been completed and sent to the WMO Treasurer at least 12 weeks prior to the AGM, for inclusion in the WMO's annual audited Accounts;

31.12.9 ensuring that the annual accounts for Regional Youth Wing activities have been included in each Regional Assistant Treasurer's annual accounts for each Regional Chapter and, as provided in the Regulations for Regional Chapters, audited and submitted to the WMO Treasurer at least 8 weeks prior to the Annual General Assembly Meeting, for inclusion in the WMO's annual audited Accounts;

31.12.10 preparing the Annual Budget of the WMO Global Youth Wing on behalf of the ExeCom and presenting it to the MC for its approval:

31.12.11 by liaising with all Regional Assistant Secretaries and all Regional Youth Vice-Chairmen, ensuring that the details of the Regional Youth Wing Members (which with reference to Article 31.6.9 above are recorded in the regional Registers of Membership of all Regional Chapters and the Central Register of Members at the Secretariat) are kept up to date.

Article 39.6 - Each Regional Chapter's bank accounts shall include:

(d) a separate current account for the purposes of Regional Youth Wing activities.

[3.] One other unrelated amendment is necessary, in order to harmonise Article 46.5 with Articles 24.5.5 and 35.1.3:

Article 46.5

With reference to Articles 1.5 and 12.3 of the WMO Constitution, the MC shall inform all of the members of the WMO as soon as is possible of any amendments that have been made to any of the Rules and Standing Orders of the WMO once they have been approved and formally adopted by the BOT.

[4.] Adoption of the Constitution

Article 49 - Adoption of the Constitution:

This Constitution is hereby adopted by the BOT of the WMO on behalf of:

(a) the duly elected Office Bearers of the WMO, and of (b) the duly elected and appointed Members of the Management Committee of the WMO, and of

Management Committee of the WMO, and of (c) all the Members of the WMO, in accordance with their unanimous resolution approving this Constitution passed at the Annual General Assembly Meeting of the WMO held at DoubleTree by Hilton, Ras Al Khaimah, UAE on the 07 of October 2017, on the date recorded in Article 1.4 above and below:

- » Assisted victims of a fire in the month of Ramadan with cash contributions, food and necessities.

LOCAL ZAKAT COLLECTIONS:

Majority of the cases presented to WMO need financial assistance with payments of lights, water, electricity etc. Some cases are regular and dealt with monthly but the requests are increasing rapidly especially from recipients in the Pretoria and Johannesburg region. There is also an escalating need to offer financial assistance of school / madressah fees and books for university students. Many of these cases are Memon and Muslim families in dire straits.

In addition to the annual local Zakat collections, we have initiated the Memon Network Collection, whereby a total of R503 286 was collected and distributed amongst various nonprofit organizations such as WMO, IMASA Durban, SAMNET, Darul Yatama & Medina Institute.

We wish to appeal to Members and the Memon Community to forward their zakaat or even a portion of their zakaat to WMO throughout the year and especially in the month of Ramadan. This will assist us in funding current and future projects.

INTERNATIONAL ZAKAAT COLLECTIONS:

At the last AGM, the Africa Chapter committed to collecting the International Zakaat. Target: 2017 – \$680 000 USD – BOM is working towards raising this amount and Mr Solly Noor has assisted in getting most of the pledges. Donations:

- » R120 000 donated to a Frail Care Centre in Laudium [The Garden] – Muslim Residents with a few from Memon decent. Co-ordinated by Mr Feizul Ayob
- » Shelter for orphans, elderly and homeless in Klipspruit West, Gauteng. Mr Moosa Carrim and family and WMO has generously purchased a mobile unit at approximately R250 000, which consists of X8 rooms, a kitchen, dining room and make shift lounge. Coordinated by Mr Moosa Carrim & Mr Haroon Gutta
- » R100 000 donated to a borehole in the Itereleng community and payment of salaries. Co-ordinated by Mr Feizul Ayob.
- » R60 000 donated towards the Nkandla Event WMO contributed towards the expenses of a mini bus as well as the coverage of the event by ITV Networks. Co-ordinated by Mr Shiraz Gani.

WHEELCHAIR CAMPAIGN 2016:

- » X9 wheelchairs distributed to Muslim recipients
- » X3 wheelchairs distributed to Non-Muslim recipients.
- » X5 wheelchairs handed over to Queens Haven Institute for the elderly and frail Non-Muslims recipients.

» 25 wheelchairs delivered to Al Ansaar for the needy plus 15 Wheelchairs sponsored to individual applicants.

WMO AFRICA CHAPTER LADIES WING:

Since the last International AGM, the WMO Africa Chapter Ladies Wing has continued to participate and coordinate various projects driven by the committee members and continues to make a meaningful impact on the lives of the needy.

» JANUARY 2016

Water Project: KZN had a water crisis in January 2016. On the 29th January an urgent appeal was made to assist the massive Al-Ansaar water distribution to all areas that were in need of this basic necessity. Within 48 hours WMO Ladies Wing raised funds and delivered 400 cases of water on the 30th January 2016.

» FEBRUARY 2016

KZN Picnic hosted their annual Family Day on the 28th February with an amazing crowd of +1000 guests. Alhumdulilah, it can be recorded as an absolute success as far as the WMO KZN BOM and the organizing team were concerned. The idea of hosting such a function is the importance of bringing Memon families from different backgrounds together, allowing them to socialize and meet each other and encouraging the building and strengthening relations of the Memon Community.

» FEBRUARY 2016

Ladies Khatam Meeting & Luncheon: hosted by the WMO Ladies Wing & Jama'atun Nisaa [Apex Body]. This event took place on the 23rd February 2016. Guest of Honour; Mrs Hameeda Allana from WMO India Chapter visited SA this year and attended our ladies meeting and luncheon.

Voter Registration: Mrs Agjee addressed the ladies of the Memon Community and expressed the importance of voting and not wavering the opportunity to vote when the time came. She was applauded when she stated:

The Memon Community is unique that you do philanthropy work as a united group with one voice under your own jamaat or organization. This you will not find amongst our other Muslim communities in SA."

Luncheon: 250 Memon ladies from Gauteng. Polokwane & KZN attended the Luncheon.

MARCH 2016

Victims of Xenophobic Attacks: After an initial large scale relief effort support by WMO we received a further urgent appeal on the 14th March 2017 for immediate response to aid those displaced victims of Xenophobic Attacks. An amount of R50 000 was pledged to SANZAF specifically for the victims to ensure that there was proper control of the pledged monies towards assisting families who needed it most.

On the 14th March 2016, another appeal was made due to the unhygienic conditions of the victims, which was becoming more severe by the day. We made an appeal for food items and other essentials. The response was an immediate reaction from our sponsors. Truckloads of water and food items on behalf of WMO were delivered. Jama'atun Nisaa sponsored diapers. Victims of Xenophobic attacks project overseen by Shireen Arbee. » APRIL 2016

Annual Pamper Day for the Elderly: This annual and very successful event took place on the O6th April 2016. An event organized by 'The friends of the elderly' together with Natal Memon Jamaat, WMO, Jama'atun Nisaa and various other organizations. This event was originally coordinated on behalf of WMO/JNISAA by our beloved sister, the late Farida Osman and all efforts of this event are held in her honour.

Funds towards the meals prepared by Manjra was pledged on behalf of WMO. Fruit packs, kajoor and zam-zam water was sponsored by us. Sisters of Jama'atun Nisaa personally assisted whereby providing transport for some of the elderly. A special thank you to NMJ who sponsored the venue for this event. Annual Pamper Day for the Elderly Project overseen by Jameela Joosub.

» APRIL 2016

Cifts For Cancer Patients: A Cancer Day support for hospice patients was organized by the Cancer Support Group at Al-Ansaar Hall [KZN] on the 16th April 2016. Cifts were arranged by the Ladies Wing to present to each patient. It was wonderful to see our children present these gifts to the patients teaching them at an early age to be compassionate and to get involved in such acts of generosity.

» MAY 2016

In May 2016, the WMO Ladies Wing collected monies towards purchasing 100 burkahs for young girls at the White Blocks Madressah in Laudium Gauteng. On the 26th June 2016, the Ladies Wing together with Purposeful Giving [APEX Body] once again visited the Itereleng Madressah to deliver our shoebox gifts to the children of this wonderful community. This year we included a WMO branded bag for each child.

The Ladies Committee are to be commended for their efforts ensuring a well-organized event. Active participation by the WMO youth is required for future events of this nature.

Mr Yunus Suleman did the inauguratory honors as he discoursed upon the various WMO Projects. The inspiring oration was ensued by Ms. Dania Hanif; who flew from Pakistan with her parents Mr. Hanif Ahmed and Ms. Samina Hanif. She articulated about her active involvement in the marketing and educational facets of The WMO youth world-wide. She also endeavored to cajole the youth to dedicate time, energy and devotion to the community. AMKA Products and Ladies Wing representatives contributed towards the expenses of the event.

Inspiring ladies [such as Zafreen Ayob, Raeesa Gutta, Dr Taheera Hassim & Kareemah Maphasa] took the floor to elaborate on the objective of the programme.

The feedback was phenomenal and positive as many of the women present thoroughly enjoyed the ladies only initiative and the concept of the programme. They requested regular events of this nature and offered their support of future women empowerment programmes and courses.

» **Debate Championship:** This event took place over 2 days [23rd & 24th July 2017] at the Wanooka Auditorium in Gauteng. MEETINGS

We had four board meetings, four meetings of the office bearers and 7 conference calls between office bearers. Three meetings took place between office bearers and the auditors. Numerous calls between office bearers took place in the course of the year to sort out various issues pertaining to the WMO.

WMO Europe Chapter since the inception of WMO has been entrusted to take care of the Audited Accounts and other statutory responsibilities for the Organisation and the Trust which Alhamdulillah they have fulfilled.

ZAKAT COLLECTION

The WMO in conjunction with the Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester made great efforts to collect Zakat. Around five hundred Zakat Appeal letters reflecting the WMO activities were sent out by emails during the month of Ramadan, which resulted in the awareness of WMO among the Memon community. During this period we reveal few new donors, who have committed that in future they would pay their Zakat to WMO. Many calls had been made by office bearers to the potential donors. This is the first time we got good response to Zakat Appeal letters.

We collected US \$332,000 towards our commitment of 2016.

WELFARE ACTIVITIES

The Europe and especially UK has its own welfare system which provides legal aid, housing support as well as different kinds of assistance and medical. However, for our Memons who cannot afford, we are providing free legal, medical, dental, etc services by respective professionals which are also advertised on the website. We intend to have regional advisors giving advice on matrimonial and family disputes. We have advised and assisted community members regarding their housing, welfare benefits, immigration and family matters.

We support Memon's with hospital expenses and funeral expenses when required.

A Memon Connection service introduces young adults and their families to prospective partners. Eight ladies from the Ladies Wing have been designated to operate this service under the supervision of the Convenor of the Welfare Department. Every year at least 25 to 30 introductions take place.

YOUTH WING

The Youth wing of WMO Europe Chapter consists of Youth Wing of Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester.

The Youth Wing has been active with cricket, volleyball, basketball and badminton activities at both the Memon Centre in London & Leicester.

We have organised a total of 4 events and these have been very well attended by both the youth and members at large. The youth have taken a key role in assisting with the organising of social events and their input and participation is ever increasing, Alhamdulillah.

In 2016 following activities have been undertaken by the Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester in collaboration of World Memon Organisation (Europe Chapter):

- 1. Badminton every Tuesday at the Memon Centre London ["MC London"]. There is now a waiting list for participation.
- 2. Youth cricket is every Thursday's at MC London
- 3. Volleyball on Wednesday's at MC London. There is now a waiting list for participation.
- 4. Ladies and Ladies Youth Football & Basketball classes with a qualified professional every Monday at MC London
- 5. Regular youth meetings at MC London
- 6. Outdoor Football for youth from September in London
- 7. Regular cards and pool sessions at MC London
- 8. Cards played every Wednesday & Saturdays at different venues in Leicester
- 9. Football training for under 16 in Leicester
- 10. Indoor Football on every Friday in Leicester
- 11. Outdoor Football on every Friday in Leicester
- 12. Talim classes for youth in Leicester every Monday at MC Leicester
- 13. Youth Club gathering every Friday in Memon Center Leicester.
- 14. Mehman Lunch Club at Memon Center Leicester on every Thursday.
- 15. Whole month of Ramadaan, Taraweeh was held at Memon Center Leicester with 10 youth Hufaz reciting 2 rakats each.
- 16. Leicester provides free Memon Centre for funeral services.

Memon Association Leicester is going through a very large extension for sports centre, once we have our own purpose built sports centre completed will be able to increase our youth activities and invite Memon's worldwide for sports competitions InshaAllah.

As can be determined from the above list, youth activities have been extensive and vibrant and further improvements are planned to increase the engagement with youth for future, InshaAllah.

It has also been identified that there is a lack of a formal structure and participation to youth in this chapter as indeed globally and this will need to be addressed within the coming weeks and months ahead InshaAllah.

LADIES WING

The Ladies Wing is very active with the Memon Connections and organising various charity events. Several functions were held and funds were raised. They have contributed for different projects in India, Malawi, Syria and Nepal, specifically focused on Women Empowerment, providing jobs, supporting widows and the destitute & sick people.

They have collected £6000 for India and £11,000 for Malawi before Ramadan for following projects:

Projects in India:

- » Dall Mill Project in Lohara. Women Empowerment project was completed in July 2016, and the Dall Mill was set up to provide work for the needy.
- » Money was donated to 'Lohara Girls Orphanage' for the upliftment of the orphan girls in Dar-ul-lum.
- » Widows Charity supporting 400 widows with food packs in India during the holy month of Ramadhan.
- » Food and fruit packs were donated in hospital for the sick in Mumbai.
- » Vasai project was initiated in Mumbai, creating work for the destitute women, and funds were donated for the canteen equipment.
- » Funds were donated for Biwindi Centre where women workshops are conducted.
- » Eye operations were funded in Kashmir.
- » 2 Water wells were built in the remote areas of Maharashtra costing £2000 each.
- » Ration Kits were donated to the homeless in the firestricken suburb of Mumbai, Govandi in December 2016.
- » Funds were given to an Orphanage in Mumbai, which was used for rebuilding the Centre.

All these projects were done under the supervision of the Ladies Wing India Chapter.

Projects in Malawi:

- » Money was donated to 'Road to Relief Charity, which is run by the Memon Ladies group. The money was used towards Ramadhan Food packs and a hospital ventilator.
- » Money was donated to Malawi food relief. The funds were used for tents and food parcels.
- » Kaffan project for the poor in the villages in Malawi has been set up recently

Projects for Syria:

- » £3000 was raised for medical aid in Syria. A cheque was handed over to Mr. Sikander Sattar, VP for Europe Chapter, which was used for Blanket transportation for Syrian Refugees.
- » £2800 was donated to Medical Aid for Syria and funds were raised at the event, organised by the Memon Association UK Ladies Wing. The funds were given to Dr Rashid Gatrad for Midland International Aid Trust for distribution.

Projects in Nepal:

» £1400 was donated to "Midland International Aid Trust" for roofing shelters in Nepal for Earthquake victims.

Projects in UK

» On 26th November 2016 WMO Europe Chapter Ladies Wing held Hi-Tea Function which was a great success, raising Funds for the refugees in Lambeth. Mayor of Lambeth Cllr. Saleha Jaffer, Cllr Diana Morris and several other interfaith members of the Borough attended it. A cheque of £1000 was donated to the Mayor of Lambeth at the Refugee Centre in Streatham.

The Ladies helped in organising the Family Funday Event at the Memon Centre, which was well attended by our community.

In November 2016 the WMO Ladies Wing was awarded the BATCA award, in recognition for their charity work.

The ladies committee of UK has raised donations under the supervision of Mrs. Shamim Osman for the victims of recent crises around the world.

MEMBERSHIP

Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester are assisting the WMO Europe Chapter to achieve its target to maximise the membership of WMO. We got new commitment from Memons to become members.

Currently we have 54 members including four Trustee and three Patrons, who have paid their subscription in full or paying in instalments. We also have couple of new life members from Leicester and London.

At functions and events in London and Leicester we have specifically introduced the work of WMO by showing video clips of our meetings.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

The Memon Association UK and World Memon Organisation Europe Chapter are also carrying out activities such as badminton, ladies basketball, indoor volleyball, indoor football on a weekly basis so as to get Memon Youth involved.

They also hire venues externally so that the Memon Youth can get the outdoor experience in the field of Cricket and Football. An outdoor football activity has been carried every Friday for the youths of various age groups where an exprofessional football coach provides training sessions for the younger age group.

They have also organised tournaments and competitions in badminton and football.

WMO-FC PROJECTS

Micro Financing.

After observing a success of previous phases of Micro Finance Loan scheme, now Far East Chapter has started the 4th phase. This scheme to support Small Time Entrepreneur in the community has helped lending to around 50 to 60 Memons. The current total lending is approximately LKR 14.1 mn at the end of this year.

Alhamdulillah, indeed happy to report that there are few beneficiaries have now become financially self-sufficient. The RMC has appointed a committee to monitor the reimbursement and to ensure a greater success of this project.

Darrussalam Maha Vidyalaya (DMV) Project

WMO FC is continuing to provide assistance in the following areas;

- » Needy students with daily breakfast for nourishment.
- » Provides extra classes for Students facing major exams
- » Providing additional classes after school hours
- » Supporting to uplift sports activities, (Sport instruments, Practice Session, Coach salary, and meals to maintain stamina)

Total estimated cost for all the above schemes per annum would be LKR $\operatorname{6mn.}$

WMO FC had also under taken to develop the Infra structure of the said school with a total estimated cost of \$ 1.6mn over period of 2-3 years. This development is based on a Master plan to take this school to a new level with improved infrastructure and other facilities. However this project is being reviewed as the school is coming under a government initiated development program and it necessary to make sure the both development programs are in sync.

The Master plan is to provide 39 class rooms, Auditorium, Fully equipped Science Laboratory, Library, and with other amenities such as toiletries and dining area.

YOUTH WING ACTIVITIES

Futsal Tournament

A Futsal tournament was organized for the first time for the Memon youth of the community. This was held on February 07, 2016 at the Colombo Futsal Club. 8 teams participated in 2 group of which 4 teams qualified for the knockout stages.

The organizing team was led by Imran Yakoob with Saad Mulla, Aamir Gadit, Yoosuf Sulaiman and Sikander Rafeek supporting him.

Debating Competition

The Project chairperson Annum Anjum and her team conducted this event as part of the preparation the planned International Debating Championship, WMO FC Youth Wing had the preliminary round of debates with the 8 participating teams on 17th February 2016.

After some very interesting debates the semi-finals were held on 20th February followed by the Finals on the same day. The winning team consisted of Mehek Sangani, Shehla Sangani and Emad Sangani.

LADIES WING ACTIVITIES

The Far East Chapter Ladies Wing organised the following projects as their local activities;

- » Women Empowerment Programme Phase One Sewing Classes
- » Women Empowerment Programme Phase Two Spoken English Classes
- » "She Is More" Luncheon create awareness about depression through the means of a skit and a Workshop

The Ladies wing was facilitated to operate a bank account with an allocation of Rs. OI million for use in their projects. The funding needs to be approved by the Ladies Committee and of which quarterly report together with Accounts are submitted to the RMC by the LW.

FLOOD RELIEF PROJECT

WMO & MASL JOINT FLOOD RELIEF PROGRAM 2016

The WMO FC Zakat contribution was fully spent on the Sri Lanka flood relief program, and below is the brief summary of the project.

Cyclone Roanu struck Sri Lanka with devastating force at daybreak on 15th May 2016, pummeling the country, including the capital city of Colombo and heaping widespread damage across the nation. Which resulted in many Memon families living in region from Wellampitiya to Kaduwela being severely affected. Most houses were submerged in water up to 8 feet. Almost 250 Memon houses were affected and nearly 500 families were forced out of their homes. Memon Association of Sri Lanka (MASL) along with WMO FC came forward immediately to remedy the situation with a relief program for those affected by this catastrophe.

FUND RAISING

Through a fund raising meeting, which was attended by generous Memons of Sri Lanka, we were able to pull together solid pledges closer to LKR 100 million (Approx. US\$ 690,000) out of this WMO FC committed to contribute over US\$ 300,000.

World Memon Organisation (India Chapter) was incorporated in the year 2014 under the Companies Act, 2013, with the ultimate aim of uplifting the underprivileged section of the Memon Community by providing financial aid for education, housing, medical and other social activities. The Organization is working with selfless dedication for the welfare and wellbeing of the Community Members.

As we all agree that Food, Clothing and Shelter are the basic requirements of a human being. However, these basic needs are not easily fulfilled. Many people stay in cramped houses with joint families and little space. It was observed that major part of people's earning goes in paying rent and thus they have little money left for other expenses. Considering Housing as the most demanding and yet an unaffordable need of the community, many people approach WMO-India Chapter to help them achieve this need.

World Memon Organization-India Chapter aims in helping these deserving families achieve their dream of having a safe and decent house. This will enable them to look after other unavoidable and sudden exigencies.

ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN THROUGH OUT THE YEAR

» Receipt of Obligatory Certificates

WMO India Chapter has successfully received the 12A and 80G certificate which is a exemption to the trust as well as the donors from paying taxation.

» Membership Drive

On the 11th November 2016, a Gala dinner was hosted by the WMO India Chapter at the JK banquet hall in Mumbai, to honour the foreign delegation, Mr. Nowsad Gani (Deputy President), Mr. Ashraf Sattar (Deputy Chairman - Board of Trustees) and Mr. Shahid Sangani (COO). More than 200 guests attended the function arranged for creating awareness about WMO.

- » Youth Wing
 - Medical Camp: Medical Camp was arranged by Youth Wing at Cutchi Memon Jamat. 300 people visited to avail free checkups and medicines
 - Ramzan Camp: 300 Food packets were distributed to the poor and needy individuals during Ramadan

Pakistan Chapter is the largest Chapter of the World Memon Organisation. The Charity and the welfare activities carried out by the Chapter are much more than the Charity/Welfare work carried out by all other Chapters together.

WMOPC has now become a ray of hope for the needy and distressed families of Memon Community living in Pakistan. Be it educational need of the children or housing needs of the shelterless families of the Memon Community or the medical needs of the poor members of the Community everybody resorts to WMOPC

2. Education is our top priority. We welcome all the students of Primary level, Secondary level or Higher level. We thank Almighty that so far we have never refused any student that we will not give him or her educational any help. The accumulated Registered students up to Intermediate level has increased in this year. We expect that the number of students will reach 20,000 in next 10 years. Our goal is to achieve 100% education in the community by 2020 Insha'Allah.

- 3. In the same manner, we are encouraging the students to go for higher and professional education. The number of Registered students has increased. Our aim is to raise the number of students getting higher education to over 2,000. In that case, 500 students will qualify annually helping their families to come out of poverty and distress.
- 4. The other important activity is to provide housing to the shelter-less community members. A poor family where the bread earner is only one person, cannot afford to pay monthly rent of Rs. 5,000 to 7,000. We have to help such poor and needy families.
- 5. The welfare work of the WMOPC has spread over many diverse activities. We are pleased to give the details of such activities so that one can appreciate the volume of welfare work carried out in WMOPC for the benefit of the Memon Community in Pakistan.
- 6. Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI)

MITI has now become a symbol for the technical training to young people of Karachi. Thousands of students are getting technical training in more than 67 trades. MITI has also started Diploma course of three years duration.

We have given details of the technical training given to the students of the Country. It is our humble contribution, to the nation building. MITI is open to all without any discrimination of caste, creed or religion.

REPORT OF THE WMO EDUCATION ENDOWMENT FUND COMMITTEE

In 2015 the World Memon Organisation, Pakistan Chapter (WMOPC), continuing its efforts to promote education in the Memon Community, established the WMO Education Endowment Fund (the Fund).

The principal purpose of the Fund is to provide non-Zakat based financial assistance to the middle income group of the community to enable it to finance the cost of education of their children.

The Fund seeks non-Zakat contributions (Lilah) from the WMO members and non-members by issuing certificates to the donors. The main idea of this scheme is to collect the Endowment Fund by appealing small donors, who have some occasions like marriages, or those students who have earned enough to return their obligation, or WMO

non-Pakistani members for example from USA, UK, South Africa, etc., to buy one certificate of US\$ 5,000 each, which is relatively not a significant amount for them to contribute for this noble cause.

The funds received are kept in term deposits with a reputable Islamic bank. It is stipulated that eighty per cent of the income from the term deposits shall be utilized to give financial assistance in the form of mark-up free loans to the eligible students of the community. These loans will be repayable in easy installments once these students complete their studies.

Education Endowment Fund Committee (EEFC) was established as required by the bye-laws in late 2015 to undertake collections of the funds. The funds collected and the income earned to date are as follows: The first EEFC was formed comprising the following members:-

REPORT OF REHABILITATION COMMITTEE

In order to address the housing problems faced by the Memon Community, the World Memon Organisation launched the WMO Rehabilitation Scheme in 2004, which received an overwhelming response with 7,225 applications pouring in within a few weeks. The numerous applications are itself proof of the existence of large-scale housing issues faced by the Memon Community in Pakistan.

Since 2004, the WMO Rehabilitation Committee has scrutinized and processed 3,278 out of the 7,225 applications and approved financial assistance to 1,372 applicants. It means WMO at present has 3,947 applications to process.

The Rehabilitation Scheme is one of the largest projects of the WMO Pakistan Chapter. It is indeed a very tedious and long task to deal with 7.225 applications.

Till date 3,278 applications have been scrutinized with 3,947 applications still to go.

Initially, the WMO Rehabilitation Scheme used to provide a maximum of Rs. 400,000/- per applicant but this has been increased to Rs. 700,000 due to rising costs. It is estimated that out of the remaining applications, about 1,750 applicants will be provided with financial assistance for housing, for which an amount of Rs. 1.23 billion (US \$ 12.3 million) will be required.

REPORT OF THE 'EDUCATION FOR ALL' COMMITTEE

The World Memon Organisation Pakistan Chapter has started Education For All Program since 2008. Under this program, students from Montessori to Intermediate level are financed.

At present about 11,000 students are registered under this program and the entire annual fees is being paid by WMO to the respective schools. However, at present the maximum fees financed by the WMO is Rs.2000 per month per child. In case the fees of any school is more than Rs.2000 students have to contribute the balance amount.

We regularly evaluate the standard of Education of all the schools. Those schools whose standard is below average, such schools are delisted.

We give below the number of students and the financial assistance given to them from the year 2008-9 to 2015-16:-

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR HIGHER EDUCATION & PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

The World Memon Organisation, Pakistan Chapter (WMOPC), has been striving since 2004 to help the youth of the Memon Community to acquire career-oriented graduate, post-graduate and other professional qualifications.

Under this Scheme, financial assistance up to Rs. 100,000 (approximately US \$ 1,000) per calendar year is given to each needy and deserving Memon student, on the basis of past academic performance/results.

This assistance, which is provided from the Zakat fund, is given in the shape of direct payment of fees to educational institutions. Further, any additional expenses such as purchase of books, transport, etc may be given in very special cases.

The criteria for disbursement of financial assistance is as follows:

- a. The beneficiary must be a member of a recognized Memon Jamat;
- b. The beneficiary must be eligible for financial help from the Zakat fund:
- c. The beneficiary must have an admission offer from a recognized and well reputed educational institution; and
- d. The beneficiary's past academic performance should justify the level of the financial assistance sought. The following table shows the percentage of financial assistance given to the students out of the total requirement of fees, on the basis of academic performance of the students:

e. In case the student fails in a particular paper/semester/ term, the WMO does not pay his/her fees for that term and the student has to bear the expenses himself or herself until a satisfactory result is achieved.

Students seeking financial assistance are required to complete a comprehensive application form and submit it with the required supporting documents. The students are

called for interview within one week of the submission of the application.

The Higher & Professional Education Committee holds weekly interviews of the students seeking the financial assistance and the applications for the financial assistance are dealt with. Disbursements of the funds are made within one week of the interview without any hustle.

WMO MICROFINANCE SCHEME

The Microfinance Scheme of WMO Pakistan Chapter was launched in the year 2009 with the support of some of the honorable Trustees and Patrons of WMO.

The Scheme was initially run on a trial basis wherein about 40 small entrepreneurs were given loans of up to Rs.10,000/each. These loans were repaid by the applicants in 12 easy installments of Rs.833/- per month or installments of Rs.1000/in 10 months.

In 2016, the Microfinance Scheme continues to provide loans of up to Rs. 10,000/- to first-time applicants. Besides, WMO is following-up the micro entrepreneurs of previous years who have repaid their loans and has provided some of them with bigger loans of up to Rs. 25,000/- Some entrepreneurs of previous years are doing their small-scale businesses extremely well and have also proved their honesty and commitment to repay the loan on time. Therefore, the WMO Micro Finance Scheme has provided them with a bigger loan of up to Rs.25,000.

The Rozgar Scheme was launched in May 2011. Under this scheme, Auto Rickshaws and Sewing Machines are provided to poor and deserving families of the Memon Community to help them earn a decent livelihood.

A Population Census of the Memon Community is a need that had to be addressed immediately and that is why WMO Pakistan Chapter has taken the initiative. A far reaching decision was taken by the Board of Management of World Memon Organisation (WMO), at a Meeting held at Mombassa in July 2004, to conduct a thorough population census of the Memon Community around the world.

The census data will also help the concerned to reach out to the poor and needy Memon families. All those concerned with the welfare and well-being of this community will be able to make concrete long- term decisions for the betterment of the Memon Community based on this data.

Regarding the progress of the WMO Memon Census Committee, the Memon Census Project is an ongoing process and so far data of over 39,973 families (177,195 individuals) has been collected

THE YEAR IN FOCUS 2016

Global Career Guidance Program "WMO International Youth Education Program" (IYEP) is committed in equipping the youth of our community for a challenging and successful future therefore it is vital to conduct a global career counseling session for the youth of our community to help them make the best career choice according to their personality and preference.

IYEP intended to conduct this career-counseling event to help Memon youth devise focused and well-defined plans to better empower and enable the youth to take control of their destiny. Proficient career coaches; faculty representatives of different programs from prestigious universities of the country; young entrepreneurs and motivational speakers graced the event with their presence. However, unlike conventional career guidance programs, IYEP intended to make it significantly effective by introducing "PERSONALITY TESTS" for the first time to Memon youth. MBTI (Myers Briggs Type Indicator) is the most widely used personality test, which increases self-awareness and self-perception and generates a report for each individual based on 93 questions asked.

IYEP Global Career Guidance project aspired to have the most constructive program where individuals self assessed themselves based on talks of career coaches and professionals from different fields and also attained a personality report given which proposed possible career choices suiting their personality type. The event was conducted at the Karachi School of Business and Leadership KSBL auditorium on April 17, 2016 led by Dania Hanif.

MEMON INDUSTRIAL AND TECHNICAL INSTITUTE (MITI)

This performance report provides an insight into the activities undertaken and completed during the year 2016. These activities are undertaken to further the cause of the World Memon Organization (WMO) and its Trustees, patrons and office bearers. Their mission is the welfare and rehabilitation of the less fortunate among the Memon community and all Pakistanis in general. The Memon Industrial and Technical Institute (MITI) is a project which was conceived to impart technical and vocational training to rehabilitate the less fortunate youth who could not complete even their high school education and were fated to become street children with all the risk factors involved especially leading to violence and extremism.

MITI came into existence as a project of WMO-PC in 2009 at the premises provided by CDGK. It is now 7 years since MITI opened its gates to 254 students in June 2009 in 7 courses for boys only; and since then the management has remained focused towards achieving the goals of World Memon Organization and MITI. These inter alia included providing affordable and quality vocational education to the youth of low income group and continuous improvement in quality and services of the Institute while strictly adhering to the WMO principles of charity, welfare and service to humanity.

As such, MITI has a highly subsidized fee structure but for deserving students it is still free. In the early years, financial viability of MITI remains linked to the philanthropic assistance of WMO and other business organizations that may be referred to as our partners. However, the management strived to increase admissions and explored other areas of income generation for coming close to achieving financial sustainability. However, it remains in need for funds for further development.

MITI has been progressing steadily in providing good quality vocational training to boys and ladies. Initially, our focus areas were Landhi, Korangi, Shah Faisal Colony and Malir. This has also expanded to other towns such as Lyari, Sultanabad and in fact all of Karachi.

Government and international training organizations, impressed by our facilities enlisted MITI as their training partners. Consequently, MITI is now service provider for Benazir Bhutto Youth Development Scheme, Karachi Youth Initiative, UNDP and Prime Minister's Youth Development Scheme. As a result, MITI has been able to come close to achieving selfsustenance without sacrificing the ideals for which

MITI was built. And by the Grace of Allah SWT, we are successfully progressing in that direction by strict financial discipline.

MITI has two major goals: Continuous development and increasing admissions. Several initiatives in this regard are summarized below. The success of these efforts is visible in the steady increase in admissions over the years to 2100 and 4000 in the Boys' and Ladies sections respectively by December 2016. As another milestone in its operation, the admissions figure has reached more than86103 boys and ladies who have benefitted from the facilities of MITI since its inception.

g. Launching of 3 Years Diploma Associate Engineer DAE

After the great success of the vocational training system, MITI launched into formal technical education. Although hard pressed due to lack of space and finances, MITI embarked upon the journey to becoming a hard core technical college and further to a technical University. As a first step, the Polytechnic was launched from September 2015. From 2016, the 2nd year admissions were taken.

To start with, we had to get affiliation withSindh Technical & Vocational Training Authority(STEVTA) and Sindh Board of Technical Education (SBTE) which are the governing and controlling bodies for the 3 years Diploma (DAE) studies.


It was a very satisfactory beginning as we were able to attract 160 students in the first year. Admissions were opened in following technologies:

- 1. Electronics Technology
- 2. Auto & Diesel Technical Technology
- 3. Electrical Technology
- 4. Mechanical Technology
- 5. Refrigeration & Air Conditioning Technology

Computer Information Technology 145 students got promoted to the 2nd year. In the new 1st year, 225 students were admitted. As such the total student numbers is now 370.

It may be appreciated that for the 6 technologies, a minimum of 6 class rooms are required




besides other labs and workshops. Next year, this requirement will increase to 12 and in the third year to 18. It is quite apparent that we need funds to embark upon the expansion of space.






Results:

The management staff comprises Administration, Accounts, Security, Maintenance, Procurement, etc. and manages the overall activities of MITI.

Recreational activities are part of every institution's life and MITI also encourages such constructive activities.

THE FUTURE

MITI prides itself in becoming a premier institution for vocational training in the country and the management and staff of MITI are committed in its continued growth to help the destitute people of society for upward mobility.

We are humbled by the achievements and are grateful to Allah SWT for guiding us in the right direction and giving success in our ventures.

But the progress of MITI lies in continuous improvement and development. As such a road map of future strategy has been made as given below:

Expansion and Renovation of Facilities

By the grace of Allah, MITI has completed 7 years of operation. In these 7 years, we have served more than73689 students. The graduating students have been well received by the industry locally as well as internationally which is due to hard work and commitment of the management and our faculty team. To achieve these objectives, our workshops and other facilities were built with limited investment to satisfy the training needs of the time.

In the last 7 years many other similar institutes have come up in the city who have taken inspiration from our experience. Some of them are smaller clones but some of them are in a similar class as ours and although we would not like to admit it, they are competing with us in real terms.

During these 7 years, MITI has focused on increasing admissions and have been successful to a large extent. However, we have not been able to do much in the area of further development of our facilities and curricula. Although MITI is now able to meet its operational expenses by its own means, it cannot finance the development expenses. Management specialists know that either you progress and grow or you die. There is no status quo. The time has now come when we are faced with the reality of the following:

1. Attrition of equipment:

Many of the equipment and facilities have become old while new ones have not been added. The present facilities are falling behind the requirements and advancements in industry.

Computer hardware is another big area, which requires up gradation. Our computers are no longer compatible with the software that are now available and have become standards of the industry and which we are teaching. So far, we have been coping with these requirements by local up gradations but this has a limit. This includes all the computers in our classes as well as the servers in the I.T. room.

2. New Courses

To remain competitive, it is necessary to keep pace with the needs of the students and employers and introduce new courses from time to time. We have not introduced any new course in the last 2 years. We badly need to begin the following courses, which are demands of the industry:

Diploma of Associate Engineer – 1st year already in progress, admissions for new class in progress:

Industrial Electronics Instrumentation Fashion Marketing & Merchandizing Auto body Refinishing Alternate Energy

3. Expansion of Facilities:

Besides the academic needs, there are needs of building and facilities.

Our power bill is very high. The only solution is to go solar. This solution is most economical in the long run but initial investment is high. We require USD 100,000 for this project. The fiber glass roof is leaking badly and needs to be replaced. We also need a fully functional and well-equipped Auditorium. Your valuable contribution in this cause is the dire need of MITI, which can rightly be called the flagship project of the World Memon Organization.

AUDIT, FINANCE & ZAKAT COMMITTEE REPORT FOR YEAR 2016

"Assalamu Alaikum Warahmathullahi Wabarakathuhu"

On behalf of the Audit. Finance and Zakat Committee I hereby present our Annual Performance Report for year 2016.

AUDIT

It is with pleasure I report that, this year too we have prepared the Consolidated Audited Financial Statements for WMO, incorporating the Audited Accounts of WMO CF, WMO EC, WMO MC and WMO PC.

For the current year 2016, the Compiled Accounts presented include the Audited Accounts of all the 07 Chapters, including India and North America (Last Year Compiled Accounts were excluding these 2 chapters).

Both the Consolidated and Compiled Accounts are presented in the WMO Annual Report for Adoption by the General Membership.

We have managed to have much better consistency in the policies across the chapters and improved the presentation for better transparency and accuracy of the Audited Accounts. Pakistan Chapter Accounting policies and estimates has been revised to be in line with the accounting standards and its recommended practices. There are few inconsistencies in the presentation of financial statements of Middle East Chapter due to the Auditor's practice in the region. MC Auditors are strictly following the traditional methods and not in line with the modern presentations and disclosures practiced under the latest IFRS Rules and this matters needs to be addressed before the next Audit.

Similar to previous year there has been the close communication between the Auditors of all Chapters, Regional Treasurers, WMO Treasurer and Deputy Treasurer and WMO CFO in the preparation of the Audited Accounts. However there is still considerable room for improvements. Insha Allah the 2017 Audited Accounts will be with improved presentations and disclosure as per the WMO group policies.

The Compiled Balance Sheet has reduced by \$268,000 due to higher disbursement of Zakat compared to the previous year.

FINANCE

The year 2016 was spent on implementing Sage Accounting software and getting the chapter activities and transactions recorded and updated online real time.

Quarterly Management Accounts submissions were done through Sage starting from the 2^{nd} quarter by few chapters and all of the chapters complied from 3^{rd} quarter submissions.

The attention paid by the Regional Treasurers and the RMC towards Management Accounts was not satisfactory and if we are to progress as an International Charity the RMC officials will have to pay more attention to this shortcoming.

The implementation of WMO Policies prepared with the support of KPMG South Africa were delayed by all the chapters and few of them complied during the year 2017. WMO CFO prepared Check List for Financial Policy & Procedure to make the monitoring of the Policies easier, there on improve the implementation. However even the feedback on this was very poor form the Chapters. The Finance Policies and procedures compliance checklist was completed only by three chapters, and rest of the chapters are not shown any interests in implementing the said policies.


It is very critical all WMO Policies are implemented in a very strict manner and it is hope the new incoming RMC and the MC will pay serious attention to this matter and ensure from 2018 there is much better compliance.

Zakat

We would like to express our gratitude to the Donors who have chosen WMO to donate their Zakat from and we pray May Almighty Allah accept all their deeds and shower his blessings on all.

Alhamdulillah the Zakat Collections recorded a total of over US\$ 4mn for 2016, a growth of 20% compared to previous year. This continued a progressive trend for the 6th consecutive year thanks to the support of the Chapter Management Committees and the Office Bearers who have worked hard to keep growing our Zakat fund.

InShaAllah we expect a further increased contribution of Zakat with a similar commitment of US\$ 4.4mn as committed at the 14th AGAM in Dubai by all Chapters.



Zakat Policy

There was no change in Zakat Policy for the year 2016.

But there is a significant change to the policy for the year 2017 as agreed at the 2016 AGAM in Dubai. The Management Committee have on the recommendation of the Office Bearers decided to follow a Project based Zakat distribution where the Donors have the option of pick and choose the projects they want to support from a menu of projects submitted by the Chapters and approved by the Zakat Committee. In order to facilitate this the Marketing and Communication Committee has created a Menu of Projects based on the chapter wise projects which was approved by the Zakat Committee are listed in the Website and Mobile App from 2017. The Donors have the option of selecting the chapter and the project to route their Zakat to or pay to the general Zakat fund and the Zakat committee will have the option of disbursing these funds based on need and priority.

Zakat Collection


Out of the total commitment of US\$ 4,400,000 a sum of US\$ 4,009,988 was collected for year 2016. This reflects an increase of 20% from 2015 (US\$ 3,350,346) and an 90% success rate of the commitments. Zakat collections would have been much higher than the above if not for the weaker exchange rates in certain chapters.

Also the issue of Zakat contributions not spread through the Calendar year, continues to be a challenge and Chapters need to work hard to resolve this and ensure the collections are done throughout the Calendar year and not leave it only for Ramadan.

Zakat collected during the calendar year only goes into the financial statements which is prepared on cash basis. Hence there is a difference between the Zakat collection for a particular year and the disclosure of same in the financial statements.

We should commend the collection of Middle East (21%) and Far East who have collected in excess of their commitment for the year 2016. Even with a shortfall to the committed sum, Pakistan contributed the maximum to the Kitty with US\$ 1,046,118 including the local Jamath's contributions for Education and Housing projects. India has failed to collect the entirety as previous years due to the slow pace in progress of housing projects and delayed released of Zakat from the center.



Alhamdulillah overall all the chapters have done their best in comparison to 2015.

Zakat Disbursements



Out of the US\$ 1,059,680 disbursed from the Centre to Pakistan, majority was for Education, with Empowerment projects and Ramadan Help balance 9% of the Zakat.

WMO continues to Fund for Pakistan Chapter Education as the foremost activity, which supports more than 12,000 students from Primary to Tertiary education. Housing collectively in India and Pakistan comes to 46% of the Zakat utilization.

The entire collection of the Far East Chapter was donated towards the Flood relief in Sri Lanka which devastated the Country in May 2016 and left countless dead and homeless including many members of the Memon Community. As usual the WMO was in the forefront to assist the effected families in partnership with the Memon Association of Sri Lanka

The Africa local projects includes the Medical Assistance and Bursary for Education as well.

Middle East (UAE) funded Ramadan projects through their local Zakat collections amounting to \$ 79,130.

The International Ladies Wing contributed \$13,276, for Ambulance projects in India and \$10,000 for MITI during the year 2016.

All Zakat Collected by WMO is disbursed within one Calendar year is as required by Shariah.

INVESTMENT COMMITTEE REPORT FOR YEAR 2016

Assalamu Alaikum Warahmathullahi Wabarakathuhu

It is with pleasure that I present the Investment Committee Report for the Year 2016. I would like to place on record my sincere appreciation to my fellow Committee Members for their support and enthusiasm in carrying out our task.

The source of funds for WMO Investments has been the Trustee Fees, Patron Fees, Donations and Profit earned on these funds.

Alhamdulillah! Our total funds invested stands at over US\$ 6.7M, a significant sum which will ensure the future success of our organization and help in realizing our Moto "Serving Mankind". Our gratitude to our Trustees, Patrons, Members and Donors who made this possible.

WMO Investment can be divided into the following Investment Classes;

- 1. Property
- 2. Equity
- 3. Bank Deposits
- 4. Funds

PROPERTY

This consists of the largest asset class and represents 60% of the total investment portfolio of WMO. Of this portfolio, majority is invested in International City in Dubai, UAE in commercial properties and giving monthly cash returns by way of rentals.

International City Dubai, UAE

Properties in Dubai, which consist of 14 Apartment and 16 Shops, are been strictly monitored and reported on an efficient and timely manner. The revenue from these properties as rental income has improved approximately 7% for 2016. The collection of rental and the entering/renewal of tenancy agreements are all under control without any major issues.

In the year 2016, the value of the properties in Dubai was remained similar to that of previous year at US\$ 3,102,092. The fair market value hinges upon the Dubai real estate market conditions.

A decision to be made on the 19 units held in the name of WMO Trustee and Deputy Treasurer Mr Ismail Abdul Karim Gadit, who is holding these in trust for WMO. The Investment committee is working on few possible options which will be best suit for WMO in terms of better prospects and governance.

The Investment Committee is closely monitoring the Dubai property market and will make this decision at the right time.

Sports City - Dubai, UAE

WMO has right of ownership to an apartment in the Champions Tower III, (Unit 312, 3rd Floor, R4-13, Dubai Sports City, Dubai.) comprising of 805 Sq. Ft. This was received in 2013 as the settlement of outstanding 02 Trustee's fee for the value of \$ 145,600. This unit is not taken into the books of accounts as yet, since it is pending completion and handover of same.

PAKISTAN

Property Land and Building

WMO House - The fair value of Land and Building is PKR 36mn. There was no impairment adjustment done during the year.

WMO PC is operating out of this property hence there is no income generated from the property. Pakistan Chapter, has on a number of occasions made proposals to dispose of this property to shift to larger premises due to space constraints. However due to the lack of funds for investments in a larger premise this has not been possible as of now.

Pakistan Investment Properties

- 1. Fatima Manzil Residential flats having constructed area of 5 floors situated at Liaquat Colony. Lyari Quarters, Karachi. The fair value assessed by the valuer is Rs 2.210 million. A decision has been made to dispose of this property since WMO is not earning any income from the property and it is unlikely to appreciate in value in the near future. PC Officials are looking for a buyer for the property.
- 2. Ruby Beach Pride Flat No. 406-2 on fourth floor in Block No.2, in the building known as Ruby Beach Pride located in Block-1 K.D.A improvement Scheme No.5, Clifton, Karachi was donated to PC by WMO India Member Mr. Taufiq Haroon Lakhani 2012. The fair value assessed for this property is Rs 2.6 million and this too has been placed in the market for disposal since the property is still not ready for occupation and it is unlikely there will be any good return from this property by way of rental or price appreciation.
- 3. Rabia Enclave –This property has been given back to the Donor on the understanding US\$ 65,000, the value of the property at the time of the donation will now be given to WMO in cash.

AFRICA

Africa Chapter has 2 properties in its portfolio, both being Donations from WMO Trustees.

Claudius Property:

Donated by Trustee Sayed Mia. Due to concerns on the poor ground condition based on Geotechnical Reports, and Annual expense/rates & taxes of \$25,000/ it has been decided to dispose of this property.

This property carries a value of US\$ 219,780 as at the end December 2016 on the Balance Sheet of WMO Africa Chapter.

This property was eventually sold in March 2017 for ZAR 3,000,000 (\$230,800)

Erasmia Property:

Donated by Trustee Haroon Karim. Master plan is to be developed for a long term development of this property. Zoning of the land is yet to be completed and only once this is done will the property get transferred to WMO and shown in the Africa Chapter Balance Sheet. This was initially to be developed as a WMO Educational Centre, however final decision will be made once the zoning approval is received.

"2016 was a challenging year for the real estate sector. GDP growth declined from 4.5% in 2015 to just 2.3% in 2016 and employment growth remained relatively flat at 1.5% in 2016, as companies consolidated their operations, particularly in the oil and banking sectors. Dubai is also benefiting from increased spending on real estate projects in the lead up to the Expo 2020. Data from MEED projects suggests that new construction tenders across the UAE could increase by more than 95% in 2017 to reach USD 100 billion, although not all of these projects are likely to materialise. The majority of this additional spending is on projects in Dubai (USD 66 billion)"

INVESTMENTS IN EQUITY MARKET

African Chapter has continued to increase its portfolio in equity investments during the year. The total cost of the investments up to December 2016 was US\$ 192,313. This had a fall in value when marked to market, the fair value as at 31st December 2016 was US\$ 163,660 with an unrealized loss of US\$ 28,750.

On a positive note these equity Investments plus the additional investments during the year 2017 which have gained in market value during the 1st half of 2017. African chapter is continuing to make these investments selectively within the permissible territory.

BANK DEPOSITS

A. Trustee Funds

i. Sri Lanka

Trustees' funds of \$ 750,000 from Dubai Bank Account was invested in Amana Bank Sri Lanka, as these funds were not earning any returns for the past few years in Dubai. Amana Bank gives a return of 4% per annum on average (this is invested in US\$) and the tenure is 6 months with a rollover option.

Far East Chapter Trustee funds as at 31st December 2016 amounting to \$ 201,342 was invested and available in the form of Fixed Deposit at Amana Bank. This earns a profit return of 9-10% per annum. The total return for the year 2016 from this fund was \$ 13,500, this will be reinvested.

B. Education Endowment Funds

i. MH OMAR Education Fund - Far East Chapter

Currently this fund is placed in Fixed Deposits at Islamic Banks. The fund is maintained in the form LKR and earning an average return of approx. 9-10% per annum until a project for use of these funds as stipulated by the Donor are confirmed by the Chapter. The return on this investment in 2016 was \$ 87,000/=, this too will be reinvested. ii. Education Endowment Fund - Pakistan Chapter

The WMO PC Education Endowment Fund called, based on non-Zakat funds, was created in October 2014 so as to enable the PC to provide non-Zakat financial assistance to needy white-collared students in Pakistan. The fund was created with WMO PC Trustee Fee Fund of \$129.615/ and PKR 2.5M seed money from WMO PC. As of Dec'16 the fund had an accumulated balance of \$ 233,333/- and these funds were invested in the forms of TDR. The returns earned through the deposits are on average ranges from 6-8% per annum. The main purpose of this fund to provide scholarship to the needy students is yet to be achieved.

MUTUAL FUNDS - PAKISTAN CHAPTER

A sum of PKR 20mn (US\$ 190.476) is invested in Meezan Islamic Fund and NAFA Funds (Mutual Funds). Since these are Islamic funds the rate of return ranges from 8-10%. These were out of the fees received from Karachi Youth Initiative (US Aid) and the endowment amount from Parekh foundation and the previously held TDRs which were matured.

LEGAL & COMPLIANCE COMMITTEE REPORT FOR YEAR 2016

Assalamu Alaikum Warahmathullahi Wabarakathuhu

It is with pleasure that I present the Legal and Compliance Committee Annual Report for 2016. My sincere appreciation and thanks to my colleague Mr Bashir Sattar for his unwavering support.

CONSTITUTION

It was resolved at the 5th Management Committee Meeting and the Board of Trustee Meetings held during the 14th AGAM in October 2016 to amend the WMO Constitution to split India Chapter into 2 chapters, namely North India Chapter and South India Chapter.

The Resolutions for this purpose has been prepared with the assistance of the WMO Legal Counsel and Insha Allah we will see the creation of a new Chapter in October 2017 and thereafter the number of Chapters' will increase to 8.

As reported last year the merger of WMO and WMO CF was concluded, however the dissolution of WMO post merger is still pending the transfer of WMO PC license from WMO to WMO CF with the relevant local authorities.

STANDING ORDERS

Amendments to the Standing Orders approved at the 14th AGAM in October 2016 were filed with the Charity Commission through the WMO Legal Counsel.

REGISTRATION OF WMO PC

Subsequent to the decisions of the BOT at the last AGAM, it was decided to register WMO PC as an iNGO as opposed to a Sec 42 Company under the Pakistan Company Act. The main concern of not registering as a Sec 42 company was, this would make PC a separate legal entity and not subject to Legal Compliance with the WMO Constitution and would also restrict the ability of PC to receive funding from overseas without special approval from the Ministry of Interior.

As a liaison office of WMO under iNGO registration there are restriction in collection of local funds, but this hurdle can be managed with special approval of the Ministry of Exterior of Pakistan.

Subsequently WMO PC entered into a MOU with Government of Pakistan on 17th March 2017 and was registered as a iNGO for a period of 3 years.

REGISTRATION OF WMO IC

The Registration of WMO India Chapter was completed in 2016 under the India Company's Act. As reported last year the application for Tax exemption certificates (12A and 80G) was not received by end of 2016. However these two exemption were subsequently received in March 2017 and now the Chapter enjoys full tax exemptions on donations received.

CONSTITUTION COMPLIANCE

While the overall compliance to the Constitution and Standing Orders is satisfactory considering the diversity within the chapters, there is a need for the Regional Office Bearers and Board Members to be become familiar with the Provisions of the Constitution and Standing Orders. There is lot of room for improvement if this short coming can be addressed by the new RMC's taking office after the 15th AGAM. One area of concern highlighted in the last year report, namely finance remains unchanged specially regard to the operation of Bank Accounts. Insha Allah once the new office Bearers take office after the elections, this matter can be addressed once and for all.

In conclusion, I place on record the appreciation of my committee on all the Office Bearers and the Regional Management Committee Members for their support and corporation to carry out our duties

We are very humbled with the response and it's our constant endeavour to make each edition better than the last.

- » WMO Twitter (<u>https://twitter.com/wmoworld</u>) WMO Tweets earned a total of 34k impressions during 2016.
- WMO App A mobile App was created by Eazi-Apps, courtesy Mr.Zakir Daud and Mr.Khalid Jussab that increases connectivity, allows easy access to updates, events, programs and projects conducted by the WMO. In 2016 we had a total 415 app downloads. Top app users are from India (1389 sessions) and Sri Lanka (1120 sessions) followed by UK(633 sessions), South Africa (444 sessions), United Arab Emirates (395 sessions), Pakistan (337 sessions) and United States (149 sessions)

We have firmly established our mediums of communication with the WMO Website, Social Media, App and the E-Magazine. We have almost doubled our following on Facebook as well as readership of The Memon magazine in 2016.

Appointment of Mr. Shazly Makeen as Designer and Farzana Mahomed as Editor for cocreating The Memon has delivered on it's promise of better content and production value for the E-Magazine in the year 2016.

Another positive in the numbers is considerable no of long standing members in arrears were removed from the Membership register with the implementation of the Membership Database hence the actual growth in new members is more than 163

Africa and Pakistan have contributed the maximum to the growth with Europe recording a negative growth

The majority of the growth in the Membership has been in the Friends of WMO category. If the RMCs takes this as an opportunity, the Friends of WMO are an opportunity waiting to be converted into Annual or Life Members, but an effort is needed for this conversion.

During the year, 02 Trustees joined WMO include one Patron upgrading to Trustee. However, based on a decision taken by the BOT at the last AGAM, number of Trustees will reduce in 2017 once the Trustees in arrears are removed from Trustee Register

STRATEGY FOR FUTURE - 2018 AND BEYOND

Since this report covers the period 2016 and will be presented to the Memebers only in October 2017 given below are some suggestion for implementation for 2018 and beyond. It is hoped the New Office bearers and Board Members at the Regions and Center, will make Membership Development a priority and implement the below strategies to at least double the Members by end of 2018

- 1. Convert the "Friends of WMO" into Annual/Life members by personal engagement of the Office Bearers or Membership Development Committees at the Chapters.
- 2. With the change in the Zakat Policy from 2017, use it as a tool to attract new Donors to WMO and thereafter convert these donors to Members
- 3. The Number of Youth within WMO is very little, and this is both a big concern and a big opportunity. The RMCs need to figure out how to make WMO more relevant to the Youth and how to appeal to their aspirations in order to attract them to become part of WMO. I suggest we create one seat at RMC in very chapter similar to the Ladies seat
- 4. Make maximum use of Memon B2B Conference to attract high profile Memons to join WMO
- 5. Spread the net wider globally, this is especially needs to be done by Africa (Malawi, Kenya, Zimbabwe etc.), Europe (Portugal & Scotland) and Far East (Bangladesh, Myanmar, and Malaysia). There have been commitments in the past by the respective RMCs to travel to these regions and conduct road shows, but so far action is lacking
- 6. North America and South and North India, the three new Chapters starting from a low based have the huge potential to get membership in big numbers, this should be explored and implemented quickly

MEMBERSHIP SYSTEM

Although the system has been operational since beginning of the year the full use of this has not been made by the Chapters. Members details and the Payments are not updated on time and the System Data not used effectively by the Regional Management Committees to drive the Membership Numbers

The system had few bugs which were fixed during the period and it must be admitted it is not the most robust system, but is sufficient for our needs at the moment. If and when the Chapters do start to use the system fully then it would be useful to consider switching to a better system

In conclusion I wish to thank the Office Bearers headed by Solly Bha, the Management Committee, RMC and my committee for all the support and cooperation

The meeting commenced with a dua and a warm welcome by ME Ladies Wing Chair: Shabana ARY of the hosting country and it further continued with Mrs Fazila AK Ismail [Chair of the International Ladies Wing] addressing the ladies by elaborating on how women have played a vital role in the success of WMO and today, through tireless efforts and determination we are recognized as a driving force behind many successful projects under the banner of WMO. It being imperative for our Memon womenfolk to set higher goals and we are amongst the fortunate to be afforded such opportunities under the banner of WMO. Thereafter the meeting continued as per the provisional agenda with WMO Representatives of each country giving a brief presentation on the current activities of the Ladies Wing in their respective countries.

- Fazila AK Ismail briefed everyone on the efforts made by the Africa Chapter Ladies Wing who simultaneously plays a vital front role for both local and international projects.

Sadef Vahedna was given recognition for her role as Admin in the Memon Connections Project and Aisha Anwar as head of Cookery Book Committee. Aisha Anwar elaborated on the process involved in the collection of recipes for the Cookery Book Project. Sana Fayz & Rubi Darversh inspired the audience with an excellent video presentation by the Kids of WMO member and last but not least. Mehoona Darversh gave the official vote of thanks on behalf of the hosting country.

Our Chair, Fazila AK Ismail thanked all the Coordinators of the AGM from the Middle East Chapter Organizing Committee for their warm hospitality and excellent organization and she continued to thank the Chapter Representatives for their informative presentations and for the sterling work done throughout the year. A special thank you to the heads of specific projects. Fazila AK Ismail introduced the Memon Connections Representative from New York; Yasmeen Mozawalla and briefed the ladies of the selfless efforts of these individuals and groups who constantly go the extra mile making these marriage connections possible.

In conclusion Fazila AK Ismail had mentioned that it was quite evident that the ladies of the ILW were now actively making their mark and are now more than ever more determined to take it to the next level Insha Allah.

Women Empowerment:

This project commenced after a visit by Fazila AK Ismail accompanied by Raziya Bai Chasmawala to one of the Shabana Darveresh's Projects in Biwandhi- India. The primary objective of this visit was to see firsthand the work carried out by women in Biwandi.

» Bhiwandhi Empowerment Women Project – Overseen by: Shabana Darversh

Background - The Bhiwandi Group is purely secular and mainly focusing on poor and deserving women. The mission of this group is to ensure that women are literate offering them good employment options so that they are empowered, self-motivated and can contribute to their families and society at large. Their work assignments include the following:

- Embroidery Handwork Packaging Pickle
 making
- Stitching Mehndi classes Fabric painting
- Arabic classes

It was an overwhelming experience to witness how business minded these women have now become after being given this golden opportunity to become self-supporting but also creating more jobs for other women in their community. The initial manufacturing of their home industry products has now expanded when they were approached by a Wholesaler of ladies' garments who wished to outsource their packaging on consignment. This has contributed towards building the confidence of these women who are now putting shoulders to the wheel and working shifts to meet their deadlines. In addition to this initiative, they have started a feeding scheme to provide these ladies with nutritious meals during a busy working day and feeding the locals in the area. This has given these women an opportunity to empower themselves and give back by devoting a portion of their time to cooking and feeding the community, Alhamdulillah.

On seeing the success and perseverance of these women, a proposal was put forward to ILW who now raised the full amount of \$8 000 USD for the extension of their workplace premises. Unfortunately, the Municipality rules and regulations did not allow us to extend and therefore the monies raised will now be utilized for renovating the classroom where Hifz classes are conducted and the balance will be used for other projects at hand. The parents of these students attending these classes are now motivated to attend Tafseer classes on Sunday and have completed One Dohr of the Quran in Bhiwandi. Ameen. These classes are personally facilitated by Shabana Darveresh.

Vasaai Empowerment Women Project - Overseen by: Raziya Chasmawala

A Ladies Industrial Home: Razia Bai Chasmawala has been very passionate about this project and has initiated this Women Empowerment Programme in Vasaai.

Background - Vasaai Skill Training Centre caters for poor, deserving and destitute ladies of the community. It began with courses on how to generate an income with these women gaining skills to make them financially independent. It then followed with renting a premise with all the basic infrastructure to start a Ladies Industrial Unit. At the Inauguration of the "Ladies Industrial Centre" Fast Food Centre in Vasaai Unit, which saw the upliftment of poor families' income. Thereafter the expansion of the Vasaai Unit by installing the latest sewing machines to manufacture ladies' garments as per orders for readymade dresses, bed sheets, scarves, uniforms etc

Exhibiting opportunities were arranged for these Memon women who were taught to make products at our centers. For the first time these women became Entrepreneurs, with a result of sold out products and more orders to follow Alhamdulillah. The opening of the Industrial home at Vasaai was attended by Shamim Osman from the U.K. Fazila AK Ismail also visited Vasaai with Razia Bai to do a follow up survey so that they could focus on the additional needs to continue empowering these women and with this said; Alhamdulillah, the Africa Ladies Wing raised \$4.000 as an ILW contribution towards the Vasaai Empowerment Programme. A proud moment for the ILW team who opened up doors of opportunity for women who are now working at the Empowerment Programme and assisting us with our ration distributions in Vasaai.

Children of Special Needs in Bangalore Sponsorship of Van:

An appeal was received for the sponsorship of a vehicle to transport the children who were diagnosed with extreme non-mobility, rendering these children unable to use public transportation to school. Fazila AK Ismail personally visited the school conducting a needs analysis and meeting with the respective parents. On hearing the plight of these physically disabled children, struggling to board normal public transport with queues of working people waiting impatiently leaving these children more vulnerable and the parents more frustrated led to the decision for ILW sponsoring a mini van.

Fareeda Azeez and Azeez Bha were requested to make the necessary enquiries and Alhamdulillah, the funds were raised by the WMO Africa Chapter Ladies Wing and this dream soon became a reality. We had arranged for Mr & Mrs Azeez Mohammed of WMO Bangalore to be present on behalf of ILW at the handover of the vehicle to the school. The vehicle was delivered on India's "Independence Day" where the parents were invited to the school to participate in their celebration.

Fazila and husband: AK Ismail then revisited the school to see the progress made by the students and were presented with beautiful thank you notes and hugs of appreciation for the support shown to these wonderful and special children.

A special vote of thanks to Mr & Mrs Ambareen Nazim of Salaam Trust, Mr & Mrs Azeez Mohammed of Bangalore, Mr Farouk Kassim for facilitating the transfer of funds, Shahid Sangani COO of WMO, Khashiefa Martin of the WMO Africa Chapter for all the admin work undertaken for this project and Fazila & AK Ismail for raising the funds for this project.

Wheelchair Campaign for Children of Special Needs:

Mr Yusuf Kamdar, Solly Suleman, Fazila AK Ismail, Fazila Kamdar & Jameela Joosab handed over 30 standard wheelchairs for the elderly and the frail plus 15specialized wheelchairs for children suffering from cerebral palsy at the Natal Settlers Memorial Home in KZN, South Africa. An additional 11 specialized wheelchairs were donated from our APEX Body; Jama'atunNisaa.

Medical Assistance:

Assistance offered to the precious, baby Safwaan: WMO Ladies Wing responded to an appeal for aid of a four-yearold baby who underwent major heart surgery. Unfortunately, after many days of being critically ill, Baby Safwaan did not survive. We make dua that Allah [SWT] grant his loved ones the sabr and strength to overcome their loss AAMEEN.

Visit to Ma Ayesha School of Special Needs in Pakistan:

A few years back ILW had sponsored some funds to the above-mentioned school. A personal visit and fruitful discussions between Fazila AK Ismail and Hawa Abdulla took place with the Educators and Therapist in regards to the progress made for those children undergoing physiotherapy. With this consistent treatment, it was evident that there was remarkable improvement in these children. It has made a positive impact in their attempt to lead a life where they could be independent of help from their parents in daily activities.

Request for refurbishment of home for a child of Special Needs:

Shabana Darveresh conducted a survey with Fazila AK Ismail whist on her visit to India at the home of a special needs child whose mother was a participant at the "Women Empowerment Programme". We had decided to uplift the conditions of the family by doing a complete renovation to their house making it user friendly for the child. With the everyday struggles and financial burden of the mother maintaining a fulltime job and admitting her physically challenged daughter into a special needs school, we took a decision to also alleviate her expenses by contributing towards the school fees. We pray Almighty Allah guides us to realize this goal AAMEEN.

Medical fees assistance for special needs child in South Africa:

Children of Special Needs Project funded a hearing implant operation. This is a WMO Ladies Wing International Project, which the Africa Chapter Ladies Wing plays an active role in raising funds to contribute towards the project. This year we received an appeal from a Memon family for their four-yearold son who has a hearing disability. The need was an excess amount which their medical aid could not cover and required the family to pay. Alhamdulillah, the monies were raised:

Ladies from the International Ladies Wings (ILW) renewed their commitment to making our Memon Connections service global in a more aggressive way. It was agreed that all the relevant ladies managing the Marriage Bureau would co-ordinate their efforts to make more cross border marriage connections especially given that the Memon youth of today are globalized. The WhatsApp group chat has thus far been the most successful initiative because all the ladies in the Marriage Bureau find it much easier and a practical medium solely created to facilitate easy sharing of data along with pictures of boys and girls between the various chapters. So far this seems to be well used and has worked to encourage the ILW to keep in touch with each other about potential matches. Regular communication and sharing of data is accomplished. All the ladies on the group have undertaken an oath of confidentiality. We do however need more volunteers to assigned to uploading the database regularly from the group chat to the centralized database as this is a very time consuming process. Regular follow ups are necessary to ensure that applicants are using a standard form to submit information. Sadaf Vaheda should be commended for her efforts in compiling the current database. Alhamdulillah, the ILW Memon Connections group is being approached more and more by boys and girls looking to find partners outside their home countries.

The year 2016 has seen the highest number of applicants looking to settle abroad and through the dedication and efforts of our respective representatives in the various Chapters, the following meetings has been arranged:

Success Stories:

- India under the supervision of our most dedicated Memon Connections Representative; Raziya Chasmawala has seen tremendous results this year. One of our recent success stories have taken place under the supervision of Raziya Chasmawala from India and Feroza Mohammed who represents Africa. A special thank you was conveyed to Raziya Bai and the South African team; Feroza, Jameela, Shireen and Fazila AK who facilitated the process of this wonderful match.
- » Another engagement took place between a widower and a widow whose meeting was facilitated via the WMO Memon Connections.
- » A marriage took place between a girl from India with a boy from the USA. Alhamdulillah, Raziya Chasmawala facilitated all the meetings and the match making.

PROJECTS / ACTIVITIES overseen by Shabana Darvesh [India]:

- Provided Sehri meals to needy families during the month of Ramadan.
- Provided Eid meals and clothing to needy families and orphans.
- Provided meals to 50 people daily, gradually increasing to 150 people.
- Uplifted a needy family by assisting them with monthly groceries, sewing machine to earn a livelihood, school fees and bicycle for her son to attend school.
- Managing packaging unit in Ladies Industrial factory, wherein 35 women are manufacturing customized towels, bed sheets and bags.
- Provided school books and uniforms to needy students.
- Provided monthly rations to 85 deserving families.
- Visited a ladies' prison and distributed 500 blankets.
- A school based in Bhiwandhi, due to lack of pure water, students were falling ill and we installed a Water Purifier and a Cold-Water Plant providing pure and cold water to +- 2500 students.

- Women hired to make rotis, vegetables and lunch boxes for office & home deliveries. Instead of receiving Zakaat, they have become financially independent and living their life with dignity Alhamdulillah.
- Free distributions of rotis with vegetables and fruits are distributed to the needy and deserving patients in Government Hospitals and to the elderly and handicapped persons throughout the year.
- Distribution of rations and clothing to needy families during the month of Ramadan and Eid
- Widows were provided with financial aid to start businesses at small scale level.
- Distribution of hygienic goods to deserving women on "Women's Day".
- Phookni Making Unit in Jogeshwari, Mumbai.
- Opening of Marriage Bureau Centre Cross Borders Weddings. Contributions in Mass Marriages (2017) where gifts are presented to deserving brides to be and financial help to parents assisting them in

the marriage costs. Every Saturday approximately 20 parents & candidates would meet and one engagement would take place fortnightly - Local & International. This consisted of all age groups including widows, orphans, divorcees, handicapped etc Provide Counselling to students, parents, children and those who are eligible for marriage and counsel to prevent divorce cases. Honahar Beti Course: This course is a grooming course specifically designed with the help of experts covering various subjects like basic Computer Skills, First Aid Training, Cooking, Tailoring & Personality Development so as to transform a girl child into an equipped wife.

• A well-deserved award received by Raziya Chasmawala in recognition of her selfless efforts of uplifting the community and women on International "Women's Day".

PROJECTS / ACTIVITIES overseen by Aisha Anwar [Pakistan]:

Mrs Hameeda Shoaib Ismail hosted a dinner for Fazila AK Ismail and members of PC Ladies Wing Exco Members at her residence. It was an excellent network opportunity and ladies could discuss the indepth plans of hosting a Cookery Competition, whereby the criteria for judging and selecting recipes for the ILW initiative of printing a Cookery Book. Hameeda also prepared various dishes that could possibly be used in the Cookery Book.

Ladies Get Together hosted by Hawa Abdulla - 16th November 2016]:

Hawa Abdulla had graciously invited various members and non-members who were cooking experts and some were authors of cookery books to a get together at her residence to exchange ideas and discuss the way forward for the upcoming Cookery Book Competition. The ladies were abuzz with excitement and showed a great interest in the brainstorming session. A few ladies even went the extra mile and voluntarily presented a variety of dishes prepared by them and humbly requested that these recipes be considered for the Cookery Book.

Aisha Anwar addressed them briefly and Fazila AK Ismail further informed them about the procedures to be followed ie; a selection panel to be elected including a few authors of various cookery books and cooking class tutors who will be invited to sit on the judging panel. After intense scrutiny and discussions by this panel, the best recipes will be selected for the WMO Ladies Wing Cookery Book.

Trip to MITI - 19th November 2016] - Fazila AK Ismail, Hawa Abdulla, Bilqis Tabani & Aisha Anwar:

Fazila AK Ismail visited MITI with members of PC Ladies Wing and intense discussions took place as to how they can market products made at MITI in collaboration with our Ladies Wing Trade Exhibition. At MITI, we were honoured with the presence of Memon Artist: Mr Furqan Lasherwallah. It was a pleasant surprise to discover the artwork of a talented young Memon Artist. This left all the ladies feeling inspired to try and get his work exhibited, In Sha Allah.

Cookery Book Competition hosted by Hamida Igbal and Aisha Anwar:

Aisha Anwar coordinated this event for II W and was in constant contact with Fazila AK Ismail. Hameeda Igbal volunteered the use of her bungalow for this event and Anum; her daughter in law was the MC at the function. It was a fun filled afternoon with lots of activities arranged for the ladies as they awaited breathlessly for the results of the competition. There were more than 50 entries and there would have been more entries if it was not for the restriction of only one dish entry per person. The experienced panel of judges found it difficult to come to a decision due to the extent of the competition and wonderful dishes presented and eventually 14 entries were selected as this was just the first selection of a few more selections to take place every three months at such events. After the judges' results were announced and all the winners received their prizes, the ladies continued to enjoy the event with a scrumptious lunch and +- 50 taste dishes and a main meal prepared by Aisha Anwar, Hameeda Igbal and rest of the PC Cookery Team. We would like to commend the hosts for a very successful and well coordinated event. Ladies were motivated to join as members and were informed of all the activities of the various WMO.

Global project leaders have left no stones unturned to ensure quality events were done in different chapters to benefit the youth of our community. With phenomenal accomplishments achieved in the wake of the inaugural debate competition; subsequent episodes were created in other chapters including Africa and Sri Lanka.

We conducted free personality assessment tests to help young ones make better career choices and we will continue to have similar career guidance workshops done in other chapters in upcoming year. Women enlightenment and empowerment were also amongst the principle objectives of 2016. Women play a significant role in today's society; an empowered woman gives birth to a civilized and educated nation; By conducting various WOW (wonder of women) workshops in different chapters of youth wing to empower women; WMO Youth wing has fulfilled its onus with remarkable formidability. Sports activities helped us connect and forge stronger relationship; MPL India, Futsal Championship and Dubai sports championships were some of the highlights of sports activities conducted this year. All of this has been possible because of the reassured support and benign assistance of our President Mr. Suleiman Noor and our WMO BOM.

Memon Youth Conferences were held in different countries to brainstorm ideas for all five international youth wing initiatives to strategically plan it's annual goals. Youth members from diversified backgrounds engaged in healthy discussions as they chartered a course for the accomplishment of their goals for the upcoming year.

Dubai Youth Conference (April 2016)

The Dubai Youth Conference was the first ever local conference organized by the Middle East Youth Wing to encourage the youth to come forward and share their knowledge. Four teams were made and each team was given an hour to brainstorm an idea which was later challenged by other groups to rectify any loopholes and formulate a concrete plan for each of the teams. The 4 teams were

- 4. Women Empowerment Mentor: Mrs Faizal Kamdar

South Africa Youth Symposium (April 2016)

This Conference took place in the expansive abode of Mr Sayed Mia on 23rd April 2016. Mr. Yunus Suleman commenced proceedings as he discoursed upon the various WMO Projects. Mr. Yunus emphasized that the clarion call of time demanded that the WMO African rise to the occasion and serve the community in an unprecedented way; so that it can go shoulder to shoulder with other operational wings across the world. All these activities were also destined to restrengthen the Memon Solidarity and uphold the Memon Culture. The inspiring oration was ensued by the appearance of Dania Hanif; who had flown from Pakistan to be a part of this iconic conference. She articulated about her involvement in the marketing and educational facets of The WMO youth world-wide. She also stressed upon the need of the youth dedicating time, energy and devotion to the community. Azim Omar and Ridwan Mia initiated an interactive session with the youth to address their issues and encouraged the youth to take part in upcoming activities to bring Africa youth wing at par with other WMO youth wings.

International Youth Meeting in UAE (October 2016)

The symposium was bejeweled by the presence of many youth members; and the ambience was further accentuated by the benign attendance of many a board members such as Mr Haroon Karim, Mr Bashir Sattar, Mr Gulaam Abdoola, Mr Ashraf Sattar, Mr Yunus Suleman and Mr Shoaib Mangroria. Dania Hanif set out the various WMO youth Projects. Mr Yunus Suleman engaged all the youth to brainstorm ideas for coming year. Global Youth Projects 2016

International Youth Education Program (WMO IYEP)

As Nelson Mandela said "Education is the most powerful weapon we can use to change the world", WMO has always given prime importance to this sector as the progress of the community can be no swifter than the progress in education.

IYEP has provided a platform for Memon youth with focused and well-defined plans to better empower and enable the youth to take control of their destiny. With increasing percentage of global Memon youth drop-outs from schools and colleges to assist in family business or for various other reasons, it is only vital for IYEP to create strategies for global knowledge sharing and to formulate ways to ensure much emphasis is placed on the gravity and seriousness of not only pursuing education but also to excel in their area of expertise to be celebrated in this competitive world.

To achieve its objectives, IYEP have proposed plans for Memon youth which are global and interactive, thus fueling the type of intellectual curiosity that anchors mental agility that is helpful in today's fluid world. One such proposal is of WMO International Debate Championship (WMO DC)

WMO International Debate Championship

"Democracy must be built through open societies that share information. When there is information, there is enlightenment. When there is DEBATE, there are solutions. When there is no sharing of power, no rule of law, no accountability, there is abuse, corruption, subjugation and indignation"

Not undermining the importance of public speaking, Dania Hanif took upon herself to revive the wizardry of this forgotten trait by orchestrating a first of its kind debate competition in all WMO Chapters to bestow upon the youth with the opportunity to overcome their diffidence and reticence, at the same time, allowing them to put into exhibition their prowess and preen their potential.

The core of competitive debate is to examine every side of important and controversial issues in an atmosphere of reasoned argument and respectful discourse. The enormous effort that a participant put forth to succeed in this intellectually exciting activity was truly inspiring. Efforts put into research and discussion on various topics during debate helped IYEP (International Youth Education Program) fulfill following objectives.

- 1. Instigate rigorous and critical thinking
- 2. Provides Mental and Emotional Maturity
- 3. Improves persuasive skills\
- 4. Encourages Team work
- 5. Debaters today, Leaders tomorrow: The skills and experiences the youth gained through debate were essential for success in the today's world. The ability to think strategically, take on varying perspectives and persuade; can prepare our Memon youth for leadership positions in the real world.

Far East Debate Championship (14 February 2016); Far East chapter accepted the challenge of bringing out their most talented youth to represent Sri Lanka in International Debate Championship. Orientation Day was conducted at Edulink International campus Colombo on 24th January to educate the youth about parliamentary style of debating.

IYEP is trying to induce a culture of debate and dialogue, to replace dogma with thoughtful discussion between people of varying views to bring about a positive change in our society. Debate Competition was held in Sri Lanka on 14th February which was led by Annum Anjum. WMO (FE Chapter) did all efforts to execute a successful tournament and they raised the bar high by selecting an adjudication core of the most proficient debaters who helped select the most adept debaters of the country.

Africa Debate Championship; The phenomenal accomplishments achieved in the wake of the inaugural debate competition in Pakistan Chapter and the sensation the subsequent episodes created in Far East Chapter, replication was planned in Africa chapter.

It was a two-fold competition and wasstylized in a parliamentary format. Choosing not such a rife type of debating design was done after much deliberation and cerebration; as this format of debate is the officially adopted academic debating style of WSDC (World School Debating Championship) and WUDC (World Universities Debating championship). The response was exceptionally overwhelming. 8 teams, comprising of 24 debaters entered the competition, along with a carefully chosen set of 9 adjudicators with rich debating experience. Oliver Dickson was trusted to take charge as the Chief Adjudicator who is not only a renowned African debater but a leading debate coach. Oliver along with an adjudication core with rich debating experience helped select most eloquent speakers.

Each team had to first partake the two initial rounds, and based on their faring, which was justly and unanimously done by the seasoned campaigners taking the jury stand, the teams advanced into what may be termed as quarter finals. 6 teams were adjudicated to progress into this round. The motion of the debates were also picked very clinically, and were discussed umpteen time with the panel of judges to ensure that either side stand a good chance to present arguments against the other and defend their own clause. Though every cog in the regard deserve applaud, but the relentless support of Dania Hanif, Zuhayr Tayob, Khashiefa Martin and Muhammad Essa deserve a special mention in organizing the event.

India Debate Championship; India has planned a national level debate championship in Bangalore in collaboration with YMA Bangalore at the end of 2017 where proficient debaters from all across the country will take part in the competition. National championship winners will represent India in WMO International Debate Championship.

A debater is an asset of a nation, so runs a cliché. The exemplary response and the flare of youth as discerned in the competition held in Sri Lanka and Africa, prompted the youth-leadership to keep the juggernaut in motion, so that the youngsters continue to hone their oratory skills. Therefore, similar debate championships are planned in Middle East, USA and Europe Chapter. Competitions like these for the youth of our community will create opportunities for Memon youth to allow the unsung heroes to bask in glory.

Global Career Guidance Program

"A mind troubled by doubt cannot focus its course to victory", so runs an old adage. It is of prime importance that we guide the youth to make the right career choice at the right time as they usually embark upon careers that do not, even distantly, suit their skill-set or dread the professional lives so badly that they start musing following a vocation in academia.

Dania Hanif (IYEP Lead) is committed in equipping the youth of our community for a challenging and successful future and thinks it is vital to conduct career counseling sessions in all chapters for the youth of our community to help them make the best career choice according to their personality and preference.

IYEP took a novel approach as they endeavored to call for an arrangement that could actually help the youth decide the future prospects that would suit their prowess and potential better. First of its kind, Career Guidance Program was conducted in Pakistan and the hallmark of the show was the Personality Assessment Test. MBTI (Myers Briggs Type Indicator) is the most widely used personality test which increases self-awareness and self-perception and generates a report for each individual based on 93 questions. Proficient career coaches; faculty representatives of different programs from prestigious universities of the country; young entrepreneurs and motivational speakers graced the event with their presence. Saad Masood; MBTI Certified Professional and a career coach; was invited at the event to explain 16 personality types of MBTI to a large audience of 200 Memon youth where they self-assessed their personality.

However MBTI testing was done at free of cost for 50 students where they were made to fill a questionnaire of 93 questions. Customized personality reports were generated from MBTI software which highlighted each individual strength and weakness and career options were proposed based on their personality. This process helped reveal hidden talents of individuals and one-on-one session with career coach: Saad Masood helped students set career goals which they aspired. The pilot edition of the career counseling session in Pakistan was an epitome of success therefore similar career guidance programs with personality assessment will be planned in other WMO youth chapters.

International Youth Sports Program

They say "Sports serve society by providing vivid examples of excellence". Engaging the youth in sports activities not only provides health benefits but it also makes them learn team management skills where they give individual performance for the combined goal and purpose. It also helps them to learn conflict management which arises due to difference of opinion in the team. Sports team teach the youth of today to not just have the will to win, everyone has that, but to have the will to prepare to win.

Many sports competitions were successfully executed this year in different chapters. Middle East Chapter are the champions at conducting sports activities and every year they arrange many competitions for both male and female Memon youth. International Memon Billiards Championship was planned for 2017 and its first competition was done in Middle East on 18 Sept: overwhelming response was received from Middle East chapter Memon youth which resulted in competitive selection for the 16 slots for participation. ME chapter also conducted 8 Ball Championship on 22 January. To support this global youth initiative India conducted its first MPL (Memon Premier League). MPL- India served as the ideal platform to bring all the Memon youngsters together and bridge a network for the youth, across different states in India.

Healthy sports activities are planned for upcoming year along with Sports based Scholarships for Memon youth.

WOW (Wonder of Women)

Female entrepreneurs are making waves on the startup scene and are becoming an increasing force to be reckoned with in the Memon Community, but it goes without saying that there are still miles to go in addressing the global gender gap. Women experience a unique set of challenges on their path to success mainly because of lack of capital-traditional sources of finance and inadequate knowledge to start an enterprise. WOW was an international youth initiative to empower and inspire women to realize their optimum potential. WOW workshops were planned in all chapters of WMO. First WOW workshop was conducted in India where 50 underprivileged women showed up to participate in an all-day skill development workshop. Youth wing donated an industrial grade embroidery machine, a motor operated professional sewing machine and a khatla for hand embroidery. The workshop steered towards hand embroideries and various ways in which they can upgrade their existing skills.

Africa Chapter Ladies Wing together with Youth Wing



MEMONI LANGUAGE AND CULTURE

Memoni language needs to be taught to the youth as it's threatened with endangerment and following program has been devised by International Youth wing.

Short Courses:

Second language learning by taking grammar tests and Vocabulary drills have proved to be ineffective therefore WMO will introduce a short-course (10 Day course) which will require user to:

- 1. Hear the language spoken by native speakers in everyday situations
- 2. Users will be required to anticipate answers to questions to truly engage the mind
- 3. Focus on core function words and phrases used in every day conversation
- 4. 30 min per day practice required by users (for 10 days)

Memoni App: Memoni tutorials will be integrated with current WMO app, which will initially have mini-dictionary, with words used in every day conversational Memoni language, days of the week, numbers etc. Memoni Webinars to be uploaded on WMO page which can be accessed by the youth of different chapters at their own convenient time to learn Memoni language.Theatre Performance in Memoni Language by each chapter youth wing.
